District Mourns Passing of Jim Deacon

One of the Allora district's most prominent citizens, Jim Deacon passed away on Friday.

The late Mr Deacon died at his home "Eldersfield", on South Street, the same place he had been born on 18th June, 1923.

His death came just four days short of his 96th birthday.

Jim Deacon's entry into political life followed in the footsteps of his father and his grandfather.

His grandfather, William Deacon, arrived in Allora in 1866 and was principal of the town's first State School.

He became involved in the local Council and was Mayor for many years.

Jim's father, William


Arthur Deacon, commonly known as Felix, became a Member of Parliament, representing the State seat of Cunningham.

One of the late Jim Deacon's greatest contributions to the district was his own involvement in local government.

He had been a member of Allora Shire Council for 39 years and had served as Shire Chairman for 13 years.

His retirement from local government came as a result of the amalgamation of the Allora, Rosenthal and and Glengallan Shires with Warwick City Council to form a new Warwick Shire Council in 1994.

SDRC ANNUAL BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS - PAGES 8 & 9

Southern Downs Regional Council (SDRC), along with the Commonand Queensland wealth Governments, is funding upgrade works to Merivale Street on Allora's western fringe, as part of the Natural Disaster Relief and Recovery Arrangements Betterment Program.

A spokesperson for SDRC said the betterment program aims to increase the resilience of vulnerable infrastructure to future natural disasters such as flooding events.

The works total about \$850,000 and include sealing the previously unsealed section of Merivale Street.

This will allow the road to be reopened more quickly following future flooding events and provide a more flood-resilient link between Dalrymple Creek Road and Clifton-Allora Road.

Crews are also extending the concrete floodway north of the Drayton Street



intersection and upgrading the approaches to improve the resilience and safety of the structure for road users.

Other minor works include drainage improvements, line marking and erecting signs.



Can you believe it is only five weeks to our sequential celebrations? The Allora District Historical and Society 150 Year Committee have planned a packed programme of events. It is also an opportunity for people to "Come Home to Allora" just to enjoy the ambiance of the town and area

Of great significance will be the attendance of the Governor of Queensland. His Excellency Paul de Jersey and Mrs de Jersey. In July 1869, a proclamation issued in the was Government Gazette by the then Governor that Allora was now a municipality. 150 vears later, His Excellency Paul de Jersey will personally proclaim the opening of the celebrations and unveil a plaque to mark the occasion. The plaque will also acknowledge Queensland State the Government's contribution to the restoration of the Shire Chamber building that was opened in 1907 and now used as a historical museum.

Celebrating each fifty years of Allora being proclaimed a municipality has been a significant event in Allora and district. In July 1919. a Jubilee Banquet was held. The 1969 the celebrations coincided with the landing of the Apollo moon landing. The new Allora by-pass "Apollo Way" was opened with a parade crossing the new bridge across Dalrymple Creek. Who knows what form the next celebration in 2069 will take? The opening of the time capsule to be buried during the 150 Year Celebration will be

part of Allora's 200 Year Celebration. Have you made your contribution to the capsule. Local clubs and organisations and businesses are asked to record their stories and include photographs of members or of staff. Family history stories will also form part of the history of the district to be preserved in the capsule for the 2069 opening. SDRC Budget Highlights for 2019-2020

Mayor's Budget Statement 2019-2020



I am very pleased to 2019-2020 present the Southern Downs Regional Council Annual Budget. This is my fourth Budget of this Council term and Lam confident we have achieved a good balance between financial sustainability. replacing and upgrading essential infrastructure and investing in our communities. The 2019-20 Budget reflects the strong commitment of this Council to continue moving our region towards growth and prosperity while keeping rates increases as low as possible.

Council has continued with our community engagement program for the Budget with six information sessions conducted across the region. There were 43 submissions made to the Budget by individuals and community organisations, and where possible Council endeavoured to include

these submissions in the Budget or has provided for them in future budgets. I would like to thank everyone in our community who took part in these sessions or made a submission as part of the Budget process. Council values your input and this is reflected in the 2019-20 Budget

This Budget presents the lowest rates increase since Southern Downs Regional Council was amalgamated in 2008, with an

increase of only 2% for general rates and 2.75% increase of utility charges for water, wastewater and waste collection services. Projected rates increases in the Long Term Financial Forecast remain at 3%, indicating Council intends to continue restricting expenditure.

Council provides a wide range of services to residents and businesses throughout the region, including roads, water, waste water, waste management, parks, libraries, community housing, aerodromes and salevards - to name just a few. In recent years, Council has invested in critical infrastructure such as roads, water, facilities and buildings and this will continue in 2019-20. The 2019-20 Budget has dedicated significant funds towards upgrading and renewing our water infrastructure as Council continues to develop long-term strategies for water security.

The 2019-20 Budget sees the largest Capital Works Program in many years totalling \$35.8M. Aging infrastructure across the region means it is critical that Council allocate adequate funds to upgrading and maintaining these assets.

The following list highlights other significant capital works projects:

- Transport link from East Street in Warwick (\$790k)
 Bourkes Road Bridge
- upgrade (\$652k) • Construction of a new waste transfer station (\$2.30M)

Council is also committed to developing the community through the following initiatives:

- Supporting community events
- Provision of funds for the Community Grants Program
- Maintaining community swimming pools
 Better cycle ways, walking
- and running paths • Construction of mini golf
- facility for Warwick • Construction of Dagg's

Falls Lookout at Killarney These initiatives are just a few of the many other positive projects Council has planned for 2019-20.

The Budget forecasts a moderate operating surplus of \$95k as well as a further reduction of Council's debt by \$1.3M. Council is in a solid position financially which helps to support a range of community programs including the Community Grants Program. The 7.5% discount for early payment of general rates will remain. as well as the subsidy on the General Rates for pensioners. To assist our ratepayers in this current time of drought, Council is extending its payment terms, including its early payment discount period, from 30 days to 60 days for the 2019-20 Financial Year. I look forward to seeing the delivery of the many

the delivery of the many exciting projects allocated for in this Budget, and delivering outcomes that will ensure the Southern Downs grows, prospers and sustains local communities.

AERODROMES ROADS AND BRIDGES buncil will spend In 2019-2020. Council

Council will spend \$545,000 to improve the Warwick and Stanthorpe Aerodromes.

CEMETERIES

A total of \$427,000 has been budgeted for operating and maintenance costs for the region's cemeteries.

FUNDING TO COMMUNITY

Council has again committed its support to local groups and organisations through community funding programs including Community Grants, Events Grants and Fast Response Small Grants to the sum of \$488,325.

LIBRARIES

In recognition of the ongoing high use of Southern Downs Regional Libraries, Council continues its commitment to funding library services with \$188,000 allocated to the purchase of new books.

MAJOR EVENTS

Council will again invest in a number of major events held in the region with a total commitment of \$70,000.

PARKS

A total of \$80,000 to renew parks furniture across the region has been allocated in the Budget.

PEST MANAGEMENT

Council has budgeted \$1.63M for pestmanagement operations throughout the region, including \$97,500 for replacing a section of the wild dog fence and \$15,000 for the control of feral deer. Council will continue paying bounties for wild dogs to assist in the control of these animals as well as \$30,000 for wild dog baiting.

SUPPORTING ARTS,

CULTURE AND HERITAGE Council recognises the importance of a vibrant local arts community, and the 2019-20 Budget will support local arts, culture and heritage with a budget allocation of \$385,000.

in the region. Major projects include \$1M allocated to the water trunk main construction at Storm King Dam, \$747,000 for Connolly Dam repair works and \$742,000 to investigate new water bores and repair existing ones.

WASTEWATER SERVICES

Council has allocated a total of \$7.13M to the upgrade of wastewater facilities in the region. Major projects include \$5.96M to extend the recycled water network within Warwick, \$304,000 to upgrade the Market Square wastewater pump station in Warwick as well as a number of other smaller projects scheduled to be carried out across the region.

WASTE MANAGEMENT SERVICES


Waste Management Services will receive \$3.1M to upgrade waste management facilities in the region. Major projects include \$2.3M to construct a new transfer station within the region, \$250,000 to construct a new waste facility cell and design a new leachate to sewer for Warwick and \$150,000 for the Stanthorpe Waste Facility for batter profiling and capping.

Budget Synopsis

KEY POINTS ON INCOME AND EXPENDITURE - The 2019-20 Annual Budget forecasts a surplus of \$17.05M with \$101.97M in total income and \$84.92M in total expenditure. Some of the key points are:

- General Rates will increase by 2% for the 2019-20 Financial Year, with a discount of 7.5% on the General Rate if the full rates notice, including rates, charges and arrears, is paid within 60 days of Council issuing rates. Ratepayers will be given the option of paying in two instalments but will not receive the discount if they choose this option.
- Council will increase Water, Wastewater and Waste Collection charges by 2.75% in this Budget.
- Other fees and charges will, in most cases, increase by 2.75%.The Budget has allocated \$35.89M towards capital works expenditure, with \$19.59M in funding coming from general revenue, \$12.89M from capital grants from State and Federal Governments, \$784,000 from sale of assets and the remainder from reserves and provisions.
- Council has not planned any borrowings for the 2019-20
 Financial Year.
- Council will undertake reviews of the Budget at quarterly intervals throughout the year and will make changes as appropriate. Each updated quarterly Budget will be presented to Council for adoption.

Major expenditure items comparison – whole of Council



Council forecasts that employee costs will increase from \$23.5M to \$25.2M and expects Councillors' expenses to increase from \$780,964 to \$800,818.

The amount allocated to community grants has increased by \$115,000 from \$1.02M in 2018-19 to \$1.17M in 2019-20. As part of Council's ongoing commitment to the community, Council will seek funding opportunities through the quarterly review process to provide funding and grants to the community projects and initiatives.

Contracts and Services will increase from \$17.07M to \$18.09M which represents an increase in external contracts of \$1.02M while Materials will also see an increase of \$401K.

The Budget forecasts a decrease in finance costs by \$80,000 from \$1.58M to \$1.5M in 2019-20.



At a public meeting held at Gillam's hotel at Spring Creek, Mr. F. C. Easton being in the chair. Mr. J. O'Dea moved a motion "That in the opinion of this meeting, the present site of the Clifton Railway Station is guite unsuited to the requirements of this district, as five

miles of black soil and two creeks (quite impassable in wet weather) have to be crossed to get to it." The motion was seconded by Mr. Thomas Caskey. The motion was passed unanimously following speakers in favour of the motion including Charles Gillam, John Hegarty and John Wilson. A committee comprising Hegarty, F. C. Easton, G. Stable, J. O'Dea, P. Dalton and G. Kuhn was elected to meet with the Minister for Works on the matter.

(At that time, the Clifton Railway Station was sited at King's Creek. Following agitation by the Spring Creek settlers and others, it was moved five miles south to its present location) Colin Newport




