Allora RSL benefits from drought relief funds

Drought impacted communities across the Southern Downs have received some much needed relief thanks to \$1 million in funding from the Federal Government's Drought Communities Programme (DCP).

The \$1 million in relief funding included \$200,000 for sporting and community organisations to replace water tanks and install water saving devices as well as \$250,000 for towns and villages to repair and upgrade their community halls.

Southern Downs Mayor Tracy Dobie said the program also helped boost the regions economy.

"Community halls and the region's sporting and community organisations have now all completed their projects with funding through the DCP," Cr Dobie said.

"With the on-going impact of drought on our communities, every little bit of relief helps.

"These projects used local tradespeople and sourced supplies from local businesses delivering a boost to the local economy."



Lyn Wright, Secretary of the Allora RSL Sub-Branch, said the DCP funding they received helped preserve an important part of Allora's rich heritage.

"We're trying to maintain a building that the people of Allora built a long time ago. Our hall is a part of the community," Ms Wright said.

"We used a local business to upgrade our waste water system.

"Now we can offer more welfare services to



our community because we don't have to spend so much time and money on maintaining our hall."

The funding also included \$200,000 for the Leyburn Auxiliary Water Treatment upgrade, \$200.000 to install 24-hour drinking water dispensing stations across the region with works on the projects currently underway as well as \$150,000 dedicated to carting water to rural residents not connected to the urban water supply.

Salevard Coordinator Bernie Brosnan said the new infrastructure will allow for a much smoother selling process

"This year alone we have consistently been varding in the 3000 to 4000 range, and have only had about four sales this year with less than 2000 head," he said.

"When we get over 4000 head it usually gets pretty concested so the new pens will certainly help to aleviate some of the congestion and allow producers to present

the sheep in better lines and hopefully achieve a better result.

"The new loading ramps certainly meet the animal welfare standards and as far as flow efficiency goes it helps them move along a lot easier and guicker.

Southern Downs mayor Tracy Dobie was on hand to discuss future plans for the Warwick Saleyards and spoke of its success over the vears.

She said the plan is all about enhancing the facilities for the producers and ensuring the welfare of livestock.

master plan we have done for the saleyards and it's all about making sure the saleyards stay current into the future because we want to make sure our farmers and producers here get the best places to buy and sell their livestock," she said.

"The Warwick Saleyards are more than just a place where our primary producers come to buy and sell, this is where they come to meet, catch up with what's happening in the region, and of course enjoy each others company.

"There's no doubt that in this time when our region is so badly effected by drought that a facility like this is really important," Cr Dobie said.

Enhancing animal welfare practices will be a major goal for the master plan, something Mr Brosnan said will help the efficiency of the yards in the long run. "We have to look at

animal welfare which has to be a top priority in the master plan including efficiencies throughout the yard, flows of cattle and making sure the process through the yard is in a more timely manner.

"It's also important that we get up to minumum industry standards and ideally for the Warwick and Southern Downs to be a leader of the minimum standard and that we meet the best industry practice," Mr Brosnan said.



lan "Kookie" Tickle is a "local" by that definition, but also by the age-old definition that you are a "local" if your grandparents are buried in the local cemetery. All four of Kookie's grandparents. Mark & Daisy Tickle and John & Mary Gwynne (nee Shooter) are either buried in the Allora cemetery or have a memorial there. Four of his great grandparents, George & Caroline Tickle (nee Clapham) and Charles & Leila Shooter are buried there. Six of his great-great grandparents, James & Agness Gwynne, James and Agnes Wilson and John & Caroline Clapham are buried there.

Ian Charles (Kookie) Tickle was born on the 2nd October 1941, the eldest of three sons of Mark George Charles (Charlie) Tickle and Dulcie Mary Tickle (nee Gwynne). The first four years of lan's life were on a farm known as 'Banks' or 'Griffiths' at Forest Plains. where Don Wright and family live today.

On 26th January 1946, Charlie and Dulcie purchased a dairy farm at Victoria Hill, Ian attended the Talgai West primary school where he was given the nick name of "Kookie". His secondary education was at the Gatton Agricultural College. Kookie was always keen to return to the farm. It was then that the adjoining property was purchased by Charlie and Dulcie from Maurice Donovan. Kookie worked with his parents in the dairy and breeding pigs, and at times working at other dairies while the owners took time off.

The decision was made by Kookie that more money could be made with beef cattle and less work, so dairying was gradually reduced by the purchase of a Hereford bull. In time he purchased a seed grader and moved from farm to farm enjoying the work and the company of other farmers, as well as keeping

Smith, G. J. Kirkland, T. K. Shooter, P. E. Bergemann, N. G. Black, B. H. Burge and Mr. G. A. Kennett (C.E.O.)

The Mayor welcomed each member and said that it was a most momentous yet sad occasion, as it marked the end of 125 years of Local Government in the Allora area. He said that the situation was one of a decision being imposed by the Government where the democratic will of the people had not only been ignored but treated with disdain. He stated that this was a classic example of Government by decree rather than Government by consensus.






