


Allora's 150th celebration issue impresses judge

It's Just a Nice Story...

Timely action by the Southern Downs Regional Council has made a causeway on the Goomburra Road much safer for residents of the area, as well as the wave of new tourists that are choosing camping trips over overseas get-a-ways.

Wednesday, 11th November 2020

The relaxation of borders and the COVID19 restrictions on international travel have brought an unprecedented wave of tourists seeking the serenity of the many newly developed camp grounds at the end of the Goomburra-Inverramsay Road. The arrivals are heralded with the appearance of convoys of cars with caravans or trailers and other recreational vehicles.

Of course, this influx of visitors, while very welcome in terms of our local economy, puts a lot of pressure on our roads, many designed only for local traffic.

The upgrading of Inverramsay Road was most welcome and has reduced the frequency of having to get off the road to pass an on-coming vehicle. The

plans to extend this further will greatly enhance the travelling experience for our visitors. However, one of the most infamous sections of the road - namely, the approaches to

approaches to the causeway (both east and west) about 17kms from the Goomburra Hall has presented new safety concerns with the increase in traffic, especially the articulated car-caravan/trailer combinations, often well loaded and not particularly agile.

A service request by an Inverramsay resident to the SDRC initiated a process whereby the Council planned for a team to clear vegetation obscuring the view from both directions. The prompt action from the Council now makes the approach to the singlelane bridge much safer and will reduce the frequency of emergency braking and near misses. Locals have expressed their admiration at the timely response and

the "neat job" (quote, source not named) that makes the area more attractive as a whole. Additionally, the removal of the vegetation may well reduce the amount of debris that travels, during flooding, to the next causeway.

Southern Downs Regional Council at Allora to discuss local issues

There's going to be some decision-making to do for Southern Downs Regional Council and residents of Allora after a council meeting was held in the town last Wednesday to discuss a number of important issues.

About 40 Allora locals were at the meeting, headed by Southern Downs Mayor Vic Pennisi and attended by eight Southern Downs councillors.

Though a variety of issues were discussed, water, sewerage and the re-location of the Allora library were at the top of the

CAN THE LIBRARY MOVE?

It was clear that most in attendance were in favour of the location change of the Allora library to the now vacant Senior Citizens Hall.

This will provide a flat surface with no steps, a massive advantage for seniors, particularly considering adult books are located on the second level of the current library setup.

Unfortunately, Mayor Pennisi said the Senior Citizens building is zoned differently to the library and a straight swap can't be made.

"The tenure of the land is a tenure that relates to seniors so you can't just put a library in here because the law says you're not allowed to put a library here." he said.

It's now a waiting game to see if the Queensland Government will accept a change to the legislation.





Southern Downs Regional Council has approached the State Government but believes the response may be delayed due to the recent election.

The potential move has been made possible by the exit of the Allora Senior Citizens Group which has been struggling for members for quite some time and is on the verge of collapse if more members don't join soon.

President Helen Caird cited low membership numbers and lack of maintenance of the building for the move.

She said the building was built in 1978 and nothing has been done to it since then.

Perry Cronin later said a lot of the maintenance issues would be an easy fix.

Mr Cronin also said he would be open to having a visitor information centre in the former library space, if it were to be moved and if residents volunteered to keep it running.

He would also be looking to extend the Allora Sports Museum into the empty space.

SEWERAGE FOR ALLORA WOULD **COST RESIDENTS MORE**

Southern Downs councillors agreed that if Allora residents wanted sewerage it was their call.

A show of hands proved most in the room were in favour.

Councillor Jo McNally said council had sewerage upgrades in its budget several years ago which would have cost an initial \$15 million to implement plus ongoing charges to residents who use it.

This number would only be higher now.

Mayor Pennisi said once the decision is made it would take at least another three to four years to implement.

"We don't know what innovation has taken place and we

in a community," he said.

"So one of the first things we would do is flesh out some options.'

Mayor Pennisi said members of the community need to make their voices heard if they want sewerage implemented.

"It's got to be a community decision. It is inevitable that we will have to consider sewerage for Allora but I don't want to be the one that says we made the decision, like it or love it," he said.

"This is about walking with you guys and not walking without you."

Owner of the Blue Cow Hotel Denise Dalgliesh also made mention of the extra costs that would be associated for business owners.

She said the hotel would be charged for each 'pedestal' used, increasing the sewerage costs for businesses with more than one toilet.

"A lot of people just say 'yes we have to have it,' but everyone has to be aware that's it's probably user pays and it's probably going to be very expensive."

Mayor Pennisi confirmed multiple charges for businesses, but said households would only be charged one fee for their sewerage use no matter how many toilets are operating.

THE FUTURE FOR ALLORA'S **WATER SUPPLY**

That's another "wait and see" matter.

Council is still in conversation with the Queensland Government over the Southern Trunk Pipeline that is being proposed to run from Toowoomba to Warwick.

The goal of this is to avoid trucking water to Warwick if the town ever runs out.

With 40 truck loads of water still being carted to Stanthorpe every day, Warwick's total would only be bigger.

Mayor Pennisi says council will not make a definitive answer on whether it wants to be involved in the project until it knows how much it will cost rate payers.

"From a council point of view, we can't afford communities to run out of water," he said.

"The Queensland Government has offered this, we will not make a decision on this until we know what it's going to cost and we don't know vet what it's going to cost you.

"The last thing we want to do is impose a 10% rate rise or a 5% rate rise, whatever the case may be, to provide this water to communities.

"We have made our position very very clear that we can't afford this water at any cost."

Mayor Pennisi said council had around 28 bores in the Southern Downs region that could be called upon if needed, including the Allora bore containing 350 megalitres.

"We are exploring, it's not just the Allora bore," he said.

"Some of them haven't been used for some time and some would need to be treated to bring the water quality up to Australian drinking standards.

"All of that is in the mix and council will have to make a decision at some stage," Mayor Pennisi said.





New State Govt Has 4 Years To Prove Commitment To Agriculture

incoming Palaszczuk Government been has challenged to demonstrate their

promised commitment to the State's \$18 billion agriculture industry as it prepares to lead Queensland for a historic four-year term.

AgForce Cane President Ricky Mio said the incoming Government must engage fully and genuinely with regional Queensland if it wanted to navigate the unprecedented challenge of the COVID-induced economic, jobs and debt crisis

"It's clear that Queensland's recovery will continue to be led by the regions and the industries like agriculture, resources, and tourism that underpin them," Mr Mio said.

"First and foremost, the Premier needs to listen to us - for the past two terms we have been shunned and shafted, farmers have been

talked to, communication with the Government has been one way.

"They need to genuinely work with primary producers to find solutions to the State's significant economic, employment, and environmental challenges, not just tell us what to do."

Mr Mio said Government's responsibility was to work with the State's farmers to rebuild mutual trust, respect. and co-operation when for so long they have been treated like the enemy.

"Our industries face many challenges in these areas, but what we produce is vital to the Australian community - we need to work together to ensure we can continue to provide that.

"And this is where the Government must take a lead role, rather than pandering to minority interests that don't reflect the average Australian's views or priorities in terms of work, life, and nature." Mr Mio said.





Horse Accident

A serious accident befell a schoolboy named Richard Alexander (Jack) Gwynne at the Allora State School. It appears that he was riding a school mate's horse around the horse paddock when he was unseated, and caught in the stirrup.

Before the horse could be stopped the unfortunate lad was dragged for a considerable distance on the ground. Dr. Sapsford was sent for and was quickly on the spot. He ordered the injured boy into hospital. On examination it was found that the lad's back was badly bruised and lacerated, though no bones were broken.

(Jack Gwynne (8) passed away 18 months later from his injuries)

Wheat Harvest

In 1870 wheat growing was just beginning to take off on the southern Downs. In the Allora district James and Alexander Shannon, James and Andrew Dougall, Ewen McMcMillan, Robert Cooke, Robert Bradfield, Michael Erhart and several other old timers had their little fields of wheat, for the reaping of which they paid 10/- to 15/- per acre, all done with the reaping hook or sickle and thrashed with the flail.

At Spring Creek, a new agricultural settlement was becoming the premier wheat producing centre on the Downs. There, Messrs Dalton, Wilson, Enright, Brown, Saal, O'Dea, Grimes, Gillam, McPhie, Hegarty, Herron, Dwyer, Fiechtner, Kuhn, Ernst and others sowed. reaped and thrashed their little plots of from 10 to 20 acres.






