Allora Could Play a Part in Water Security For Region

Water security remains a top priority for the Southern Downs Regional Council as it continues to explore all avenues to secure the supply of drinking water to its residents and businesses. The Southern Downs Water Contingency Plan contains short, medium and long term actions Council is taking to ensure water security for the region. Actions that have been undertaken include hydraulic modelling to prepare water network models for Warwick, Stanthorpe and other supply schemes; **the design of a treatment plant at Allora and pipeline reversal to supply water from Allora to Warwick, which has been completed and is shovel ready for future use**; and the provision of clear water saving actions for residents and businesses across the region. Improving the quality and increasing the production of recycled water to expand the distribution network for industrial and farming purposes remains a long term goal, as does investigating the option and cost to source a connection into the South East Queensland Grid. Dam levels remain a concern with the current volume in Storm King Dam at 21.8%, Leslie Dam at 11.4% and Connolly Dam at 76.1%. Allora, Yangan and Warwick's water supply is sourced from Leslie Dam and can be supplemented by Connolly Dam (2157 ML) when necessary. Council has an allocation of water from Leslie Dam (operated by Sun Water) of 2707 ML per year.

Warwick back road to get busier

With work underway on the multi-million dollar upgrade to the Eight Mile intersection between Allora and Warwick, it is anticipated that there will be a heavier traffic flow on what is locally known as the Warwick back road - officially the Warwick Allora Road. Transport and Main Roads Queensland (TMR) has indicated that there will be speed restrictions through the Eight Mile intersection worksite and that delays will be experienced. While both aspects are understandable given the size of the project, local motorists and travellers in the know are sure to opt for the back road option. Undoubtedly the increase in use will mean police will be maintaining a closer watch on the route. Work on the Eight Mile intersection is scheduled for completion in February 2022, weather and construction conditions permitting. The project is being jointly funded with the Australian Government contributing \$20 million and Queensland Government contributing \$5 million.

we could not have done it without you." said the captain of Allora Station, Ross Williams.



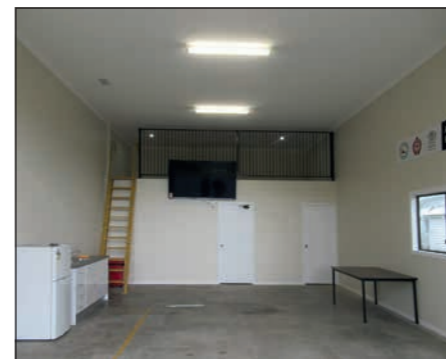

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Existing Warwick Saleyards to be redeveloped



The Southern Downs Regional Council has voted to regenerate the existing site with substantial upgrades to address sustainability and viability issues identified in the Master Plan and Business Case.

Council considered whether necessary improvements to progress the facility to meet industry standards and maintain a competitive market position would involve a brownfield or greenfield development.

The vote at the meeting favoured the existing 27-acre site given its existing connections to amenities, future rail access and costing concerns.

"The livestock industry has changed and evolved since the saleyards started operating more than 55 years ago and there is no question that a development of sorts is needed to ensure

the region has quality facilities which meet current animal welfare, best practice standards and industry trends," Southern Downs Mayor Pennisi said.

"The future of the saleyards has been a significant and strategic decision and Council deliberated very seriously over the long term financial implication of committing to a spend it could not afford and ultimately opted to live within its means."

Estimated figures from the Business Case costed a new development on the current brownfield site at nearly \$14m and the greenfield option at \$15m, whereas it is anticipated that a redevelopment may cost close to half.

"The decision has been too long in the making and now that we have settled on a decision, we can commission a detailed business plan on the redevelopment and enhancement of the existing facility and focus on securing future funding to support the project," Mayor Pennisi said.

CEO Dave Burges also added: "This is an ideal project to submit to the Australian Government's 'Building Better Regions Fund' program and we can now focus on preparing the best application we can for a future round of the program."

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What's happening in your backyard?

With the worldwide downturn in travel keeping us close to home in 2020, there was no better place to be than your own backyard during the annual Aussie

Backyard Bird Count and Southern Downs residents were lucky enough to have a diverse and colourful range of native birds to report on.

BirdLife Australia has been hard at work compiling the results from the count conducted between 19 – 25 October 2020, which are now in.

The first ever Aussie Backyard Bird Count was conducted in 2014 as part of BirdLife Australia's National Bird Week celebrations and has grown to one of the largest citizen science projects in Australia. The data collected plays a vital role in providing important information to conservationists about threatened bird species, highlights the cultural and ecological importance of birds and promotes our national passion for our native species.

Over 195 citizen scient-

ists from the Southern Downs participated in the 2020 count which saw the Little Corella crow victory as the most sighted bird across the region. A total of **397** checklists were submitted and observers recorded a total of **12,567** individual birds from **179** bird species.

SDRC Manager Environmental and Regulatory Services, Craig Magnussen said: "The Southern Downs region is an extraordinary birdwatching destination and programs like Birds in Backyards encourages residents to learn about the region's native species from their own back yard."

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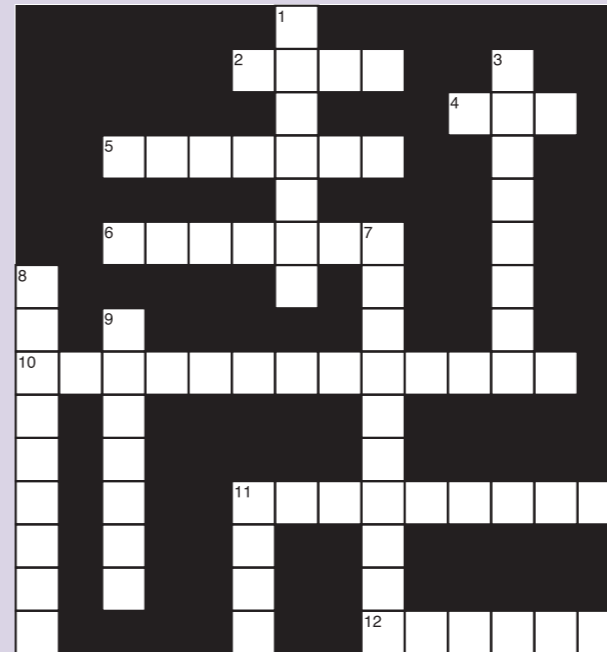

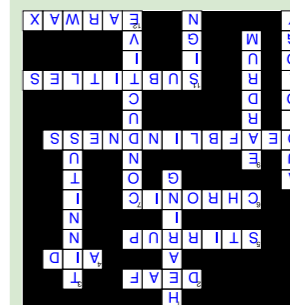

Sherlock Holmes Fan's Funeral

A horse-drawn hearse straight out of the last century conveyed the body of Allora doctor Michael Farrell from St. James Anglican Church in Toowoomba to the Drayton and Toowoomba Cemetery. Dr Farrell, 51, had been in charge of the medical clinic in Allora for the past 10 months and had previously practiced medicine in England, America, Tasmania and other parts of outback and rural Queensland. He was the president of The Resident Patients, a Toowoomba based Sherlock Holmes fan club, and his prized deerstalker cap, pipe and cane sat on the top of his coffin during the funeral service.

Dingos Dispatched

While riding to town yesterday Mr Jack Hall of Upper Forest Springs sighted a large dingo and gave chase on horseback. The only weapon that he had was a large stick and when he overtook the dog he killed it with this stick. Shortly afterwards he sighted another large dingo and this was dispatched in the same manner. Farmers consider that this is a remarkable feat for a man of 70 years of age.

Wheat Storage

The large grain shed at the Allora railway station has

been filled with wheat, and a "dump" was started on Wednesday last. It is already assuming large dimensions. Considerable adverse comment and complaint is being made on the decision of the Wheat Board not to allow any advance on wheat stored in the shed, although a considerable quantity has been stored since December and January last. Many farmers are financially embarrassed as a result. In addition to the expenditure of harvesting and the cost of bags, there is every possibility of the stored grain being discounted in value as a result of the mice plague which is already causing damage.
