

Street named in Hendon

A previously unnamed street in Hendon is set to be called 'Anne Duggan Road' after a local pioneer.

The name was approved Southern Downs bv Regional Council (SDRC) at the Ordinary Council Meeting on 29 October.

A report to the meeting stated the name was chosen as "Anne Duggan purchased her first piece of land at Hendon 100 years ago next year, and the family still owns a parcel of land at the end of this gravel road.

"Anne lived until she was 104 years old and died in the Allora hospital," the report said.

In the meeting, Cr Stephen Tancred said he would prefer to see the road named "Anne Duggan Road" rather than simply "Duggan Road."

"I think we might lose a bit over time. There could be other Duggans in Warwick and Southern Downs," Cr Tancred said.

"This is specifically about Anne Duggan who is a pioneer.

"We did get some correspondence from the Queensland Government which said we should recognise outstanding local and state ladies."

Cr Sheryl Windle agreed, saying Anne Duggan is "an icon and an identity."

The road is located off the northern side of Maryvale Street in Hendon to the immediate west of the rail line

The cost to erect street signage is estimated to be \$400.

The motion passed unanimously.

Breeding Kennel Approved at Deuchar

Southern Downs Region Councillors have voted to approve a breeding kennel applied for by Amy L. Robinson for a Hendon - Deuchar Road, Hendon property.

The applicant sought approval for up to 27 dogs which includes the breeding of bull terriers and breeding and working of kelpies.

A report to the 29 October Southern Downs Regional Council (SDRC) Orinary Council Meeting stated on 25 May 2021, a Local Law's Officer issued a compliance notice for having more dogs than the Local Law prescribes.

"The compliance notice outlines that there were 18 dogs on the property; ten (10) kelpies and eight (8) bull terriers," the report said. "A complaint was re-

ceived due to the animal noise nuisance caused by the barking of dogs."

"Following the receipt of the notice, the landholders contacted the Planning Department to prepare planning application а

as breeding kennels are assessable development under the Southern Downs Planning Scheme.

During the public nophase of the tification development application, six submissions were received.

Those who had submissions raised concerns about noise nuisance (especially during the night), animals being uncontained, impact on local wildlife and vegetation and the wellbeing

of the dogs themselves. In response to these concerns. SDRC stated the dogs will be in kennel buildings made from sound absorbent material from 6pm to 7am and will be wholly contained within fence areas.

In the meeting. C Andrew Gale said it is good to see someone still producing working dogs. "There's a big demand

for them." he said The application was

approved subject to 38 conditions. The motion passed

unanimously.

AgForce fights back against fake meat labelling

AgForce CEO Michael Guerin said it was up to makers of nonmeat products to come up with their own distinct terms instead of trading off long-established names of animal proteins.

"Put simply, we are about truth in labelling - period," he said. "It is a national disgrace that highly processed plant-based

protein made from imported ingredients is allowed to be

labelled as Australian meat.

"There is no such thing as a beefless patty or sausage, they are soy patties and soy sausages and should be labelled as such.

"If you can't sell wheat as barley, you shouldn't be allowed to sell soy as beef, or 'beefless'.

"By all means eat food produced in a lab instead of grown in the paddock if you want to, because you feel quilty, because






