Reagan, now a student at Downlands College, spoke of her ambition in the sport and it was very clear that the season ending injury is only a minor setback to a very promising sporting career.

While only 17 Reagan has been playing as a second row forward with the Clydesdale's Under 19 year old team such is her talent and dedication to succeed.

Reagan's interest in playing Rugby League came about from her father who was also a talented footballer.

At first she played League Tag with the Wattles Club but soon changed to Rugby Sevens at Downlands where one of her most satisfying sporting moments took place when Downlands beat Glennie in a match watched by 6000 spectators.

Reagan's talent in the sport was obvious as she was named Player of the Year.

Football is not the only sport Reagan has excelled at as she represented the region in the hammer throw at the State Athletic Championships coming 5th in her age group with a throw that was better than the winner of the Open Division.

When asked whether she had her eye on the 2032 Olympics when she will be 27 years old and selection in the Rugby Sevens competition she was quick to reply that she would rather represent Queensland in the Womens State of Origin.

Reagan is a true Queensland. A keen Broncos supporter Reagan said her favourite player is Reece Walsh and an obvious ambition is to play for the Broncos in the NRL.

Away from the sporting field Reagan loves animals and has a pet pig called Archie and enjoys working on the family farm at Allora.

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**Successful Burn On Allora Mountain**



Allora Landcare Group is delighted to report the successful 'cool' burn of 2 - 3 acres of weedy land adjacent to the reservoir on Allora Mountain last Wednesday afternoon. The wind was from the north so smoke was kept way from town. Members from Condamine Headwaters, Millmerran and Clifton Landcare groups were also in attendance and the burn was overseen by the local Rural Fire Service. We thank Fire Wardens Fred McCann and Don Burge for their assistance.

Over fifty people, many from Warwick and the Stanthorpe district arrived at 1pm to hear about fire management from indigenous fire practitioner Robbie Williams from Fire Lore. He

gave generously of his time and knowledge beforehand at a Q&A and later took the opportunity to climb to the upper Mountain level to inspect the flora.

At 3.30pm, he commenced burning in a controlled way, utilising the wind direction and strength, and the contour of the land. The burn was conducted with the assistance of his family members. We are grateful for their expertise and thank them all.

We hope to repeat the exercise sometime within the next two weeks on a patch of ground adjacent to the new -burnt area.

## AgForce Calls For Stronger Rural Representation In Drought Declaration Process



AgForce is urging the State Government to strengthen Drought Committees (LDCs) – keeping those most affected at the heart of decisions.

The call comes as Minister for Rural Communities Mark Furner announces a review of the state's drought declaration process, which includes looking into the continuation and current structure of LDCs.

AgForce CEO Michael Guerin said while the organisation supported the review, it was imperative that LDCs could continue to inform on the ground recommendations on which areas should be drought declared.

"The use of LDCs provides locally relevant expertise and support for government decision making, and this makes perfect sense to us," he said.

"The LDC representatives are geographically based in the regional councils and shires, aligned to council areas – the

same areas used for drought declarations.

"The knowledge producers provide on their local environment is extremely valuable, as is involving local organisations, councils, and on the ground intelligence, in supporting fair and equitable decisions for all parties regarding drought declarations and revocations.

"It is incredibly presumptuous for people to assume that someone working out of a city office can make drought declarations based solely on satellite imagery or a CSIRO forecasting.

"Objective scientific data like satellite imagery and forecasts is important, but it simply must be underpinned by local understanding of current and expected agricultural conditions. If not, we risk having decisions made that grossly miscalculate the situations and needs of our farming communities."

The review, pledged as part of the Queensland Government's drought reforms, will be conducted by former AgForce CEO Charles Burke, with recommendations to be made to Minister Furner later this year.

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# Wattles Edged Out of President's Cup

It was a case third time unlucky for the Tony Morris Tiling Wattles Warriors reserve grade team at Clive Berghofer Stadium on Saturday evening when they were edged out of the 2023 Toowoomba Rugby League President's Cup mid-season final by the Dalby Diehards on the wrong end of a 16 - 12 final score.

The Wattles reserve grade side have appeared in the 2019, 2022 and now 2023 President's Cup finals without success.

The Tony Morris coached Wattles outfit went into the final as Clive Berghofer Land Sales reserve grade premiership leaders boasting a single loss from their eleven matches played by the half way mark of this season.

Dalby went in to the final just a point behind Wattles on the premiership ladder, but emerged winners, not only accepting the prized silverware but also levelling the ledger after their Round 1 loss to Wattles back in April.

Saturday's match could be considered one that got away from the Warriors, but with the lead seeing-sawing throughout the seventy minutes of play Dalby finished the stronger in the later stages.

Wattles defence was superb as always, but while they had the player talent on hand, they failed to build pressure in attack.

While the Warriors were more than capable of achieving victory, indeed the top performing reserve grade team in the competition, they ran on in the final without star players in the vastly experienced Tim Hentschel, Aaron Scheid and Dale McAntee along with bookend impact player Harry Shooter due to injury, illness or unavailability.

Both sides wrestled out the opening half hour of play before Dalby centre Brian-Adam Babbington touched down minutes before the half time siren.

Wattles winger Warren Draper scored under the uprights on half time after gathering a Josh Henry kick to allow his team a 6 - 4 advantage as both teams headed to the dressing sheds.

Centre Clayton McGee touched down under the posts early in the second stanza to have his side ahead 10 - 6 with 25 minutes remaining.

Warrior's skipper and back-rower Jordan Henry barged over to touch down and swing the lead back to those in green and gold with 18 minutes on the match

clock, the premiership leaders snatching a 12 - 10 lead after a successful Joe Willett conversion.

While still nine minutes to go, Bailey Rathmell, fresh from Dalby's Under 19 Presidents Cup appearance, crossed near the posts to give the Diehards a 16 - 12 lead which they defended until full time.

Wattles front-rower Eli Adamson played his best game of the season, while fellow forwards Jordan Henry and Dan Rub along with Jack, Tom and Tim Duggan all led from the front line of the engine room.

Wattles and Dalby clash again this Saturday in A, Reserve & Under 19 grades at Platz Oval in TRL Round 12 fixtures which signal the commencement of the race in to the 2023 finals series.

## Looking Back...

100 years ago, "Allora Guardian" July 1898

**Snowfall on the Downs** - Saturday last (23rd July) was without doubt the champion cold day during the present winter and it is not surprising to learn that there was a fall of snow on some more elevated districts. So far as this district is concerned, we understand that there was a light fall of snow at Tabletop and Spring Creek, but in Toowoomba there was quite a heavy fall. After discussion during which the scheme was hopefully received, several sites for the proposed green were considered and it was eventually decided that those present inspect the Memorial Park with a view to ascertaining if there was a suitable area on the ground.
