Vale Jackie Gallagher

Jacqueline Mary Gallagher (nee Ryan) was born in Aramac in 1925. She always saw herself as a child of the western plains and starry skies. At four years of age she saw the Morning Star 'so bright against the Milky Way in that blue-black night sky. Later, she herself, was to shine in her professional field.

Jackie spent most of the last 37 years in Allora, a village she already knew. She visited here several times as a young bride. Her husband Reg, a stock and station agent brought her to meet good friends, the Donovans.

In Allora, Jackie made many friends through the various clubs and organisations to which she belonged. The Dante Book Club was the highlight of her social life in later years providing wonderful friendship and the joy of literary discussion. Jackie had a strong association with The Catholic Church. Her knowledge of liturgy,theology and church history was formidable. She was a superb seamstress making sets of beautiful vestments in parishes where she lived.

The Southern Downs and its chilly weather was first experienced by Jackie as a very young teacher at Bapaume in a one-teacher school. She had great affection for the people she knew

and the children she taught but cold defeated her and she took a position as The Assistant Shire Clerk for the Banana Shire Council based in Biloela near her family.

In 1953, a widowed Jackie moved to Brisbane with her young family having lost her beloved Reg after only three and a half years of marriage. Initially, she worked at Cloudland Ballroom, Bowen Hills as secretary to the owner, a Biloela friend. She travelled on the train each day with a woman and her intellectually handicapped daughter who went to a special school in Bowen Hills. Jackie was impressed by the education this child was receiving and decided to upgrade her teaching qualifications and to work in special education. This field became her vocation and directed her life until retirement.

Jackie graduated from the University of Qld with qualifications pertaining to practical work in institutions, and the psychology and education of intellectually handicapped children. Fred (later Sir Fred) and Dr Eleanor Schonell were her mentors and became firm friends. Jackie, with Fred and Eleanor Schonell and the people the latter trained, were leaders in a movement to offer new horizons for these children. Jackie advised authorities and became the principal of an innovative school

tor children housed in the wards at Wolston Park, then at Sandy Galop,lpswich as well as at Southport. She also worked as a teacher at The Children's Hospital, Brisbane and W. R. Black Home at Chelmer. Advocacy for the mentally ill was another focus in her life.

In 1967 Jackie was awarded a Churchill Fellowship which allowed her to travel to many countries and exchange skills with her peers.

Jackie Gallagher's legacy stands as a beacon of education and compassion. Her life's trajectory, from gazing at stars to guiding young minds, resonates as a testament to her unwavering

Vietnam Veterans Day 2023

On Friday, in my capacity as Shadow Assistant Minister for Veterans. I attended the Brisbane Vietnam Veterans Day service in ANZAC Square and laid a wreath in honour of the fallen. Vietnam Veterans Dav is a unique post on our calendar of military remembrances. There are services - big and small - throughout the year for the Victory in Europe, the Victory in the Pacific, the Armistace in 1918, our brave and unsung merchant mariners, our indigenous servicemen and women, the Korean War and the Malayan Emergency, among others.

But Vietnam Veterans Day marks an opportunity for us to remember, not just the sacrifices and horrors of war, but also how servicemen and women returning from that conflict were confronted by indifference and even hostility by our nation. Let that be realised.

We commemorate the 18th of August every year, for it is the day that the men of Delta Company, 6RAR fought in the battle of Long Tan in 1966. On that day, 108 Australian soldiers, supported by New Zealand artillery and Royal Australian Air Force helicopters, fought a ferocious battle against over 2,000 enemy troops in a rubber plantation not far from the village of Long Tan.

It is a fitting date for us to remember and pay thanks to all

Vietnam veterans. We recognise all who served in the Vietnam War, but particularly the 521 men who paid the supreme sacrifice on active duty during Australia's engagement in Vietnam.

Wednesday, 23rd August 2023

Our serviceman were first sent to Vietnam in 1962, beginning with a contingent of 30 military advisers, and leading to a peak deployment of more than 7.000 servicemen and women by the mid sixties. Overall, a total of more than 58,000 Australians had served in the conflict by the official end of our involvement in January

As a nation, we must never forget the service and sacrifice of our Vietnam vets. And we must never forget the past mistakes of our nation in failing to properly respect and look after them. As a military veteran myself. I feel that I have been well looked after, but I am conscious that in less enlightened times, our Vietnam veterans have - many of them been left behind, suffered, and suffer still.

We owe it to them to reflect with sorrow and regret on that blindness. and to recommit ourselves to paying in full the debt we owe our veterans, in thanks for their sacrifices and service. The number of living Vietnam veterans continues its decline, and those people whose service and sacrifice we honour each Vietnam Veterans Day, deserve to be counted alongside all those whose selfless courage in war has contributed to our national security, and to the shaping of our national character.

On behalf of the people of Southern Downs, I thank all who served in Vietnam and their families, and I pray for those who have been scared, and those who never returned.

Farmers rally against renewables in Brisbane

On Tuesday Farmers rallied against reckless renewables outside Queensland Parliament House, urging Labor to rethink its plans to destroy prime agricultural land and pristine rainforest and animal habitat throughout Queensland.

The farmers, from all different parts of the state, are warning Labor's commitment of \$200 million for wind farm projects in central Queensland, along with plans for a \$14.2 billion Borumba Pumped Hydro project in Wide Bay and a \$12 billion five-gigawatt Pioneer-Burdekin Pumped Hydro Scheme in the Eungella and Pioneer Valley region will have devastating consequences.

Federal Leader of The Nationals David Littleproud said Labor's reckless race to achieve 82 per cent renewables by 2030 needed a Senate Inquiry.

"The Nationals have been attempting to get a Senate Inquiry into renewables

because irreversible damage to Queensland's rainforest and wildlife is at risk," Mr Littleproud





National Record For Allora's Matthew Denny

Australia's premier discus thrower Matthew Denny has etched his name into the history books, breaking a decade-long national record before settling for an agonising fourth place at the 2023 World Athletics Championships.

The groundbreaking feat unfolded on the world stage in Budapest as Matthew unleashed the gargantuan throw of 68.24m on his fourth-round attempt, propelling himself into medal contention and surpassing Benn Harradine's record by four centimetres.

Producing a throw that would have earned him a medal at every other World Athletics Championships in history, Denny's hunt for an elusive maiden global medal caused both heartbreak and elation for the 27-year-old, but it has fueled his determination to launch larger at the Paris 2024 Olympic Games next year.

"To throw 68.24m and miss out on a medal is insane. It is one of the biggest non-medalling throws ever and shows the depth of men's discus at the moment," Matthew said.

"I want to be super happy but I am not going to BS people thinking I am happy with fourth. I'm not. I'm here to win majors and make history.

"People can call me hard on myself but that is the game we are in. We want to win. That was the goal, that was the aim. I am super proud to get that Australian record. I have been

searching for it for a long time, but in the same breath we still have more to do. We still have more to find to achieve the things we want to achieve."

Matthew was defeated by the physical and metaphorical giants of the sport in reigning Olympic champion Daniel Stahl (SWE, 71.46m Championship Record), 2022 world champion Kristian Ceh (SLO, 70.02m) and world number three Mykolas Alenka (LTU, 68.85).
