Goomburra Fires



As at Tuesday 31 October the Goomburra Fires are under control after many days of fire fighting and back burning.

Each day about half a dozen units are attending the fires which are still burning in the hills.

The main problem at this time are the huge logs that can continue burning for weeks.

However the Deputy Fire Warden Don Burge says the aim is to keep it boxed in and keep it in the hills.

A rough estimate of the area burnt was 4 to 5 kilometres by a couple of kilometres wide.

No structures have been lost and Gordon Country has not been

Design 2 reflects many of the ideas discussed in the community consultation sessions conducted in town. The vibrancy and sense of hope evoked from sunflower fields and sunset creating the backdrop for the work. The unique store fronts and gabled roofing of the main street as well as the Mary Poppins house are referenced on the left with a spectacular astral photograph from the region overlayed on the corrugated iron roof. The weatherboards morph into the landscape with the head of the Redwing Parrot on the handle of the resting umbrella. The historic Holmes and Co. building is overlayed onto the first flying flag paying homage to the history of the town. A rose robin overlayed onto a flying kite references the cherished bird life found in and around town. Some cheeky cattle from local photographer Chris Munro peer out of the long grass flanked by a large sunflower in the foreground.

skills by providing opportunities to investigate solutions for real-world challenges. ATSIAP aims to raise students' expectations of themselves as learners and enhance post-school aspirations to include tertiary pathways.

This year, Will Ballangarry, Rhyanna Benstead, Rikaya Kelk and Fletcher Griffin formed the "Gnarralah Warrior" team and completed 3 challenges in the Regional Junior challenge. The challenge included a long-term problem-solving task, a persuasive speech and a poetry task. Students were required to work as a team on their challenge tasks while at school.

The Gnarralah Warriors won the Poetry Challenge, the Long Term Problem Solving Challenge, came second in the Persuasive Speech and won the 2023 DDSW Regional Junior ATSIAP Challenge.

The Students will now compete at the State Challenge to be held in Brisbane on 21-23 November.

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The Back

Demand for hay takes off as drought and bushfire conditions bite

Australian farmers are requesting donated hay at a phenomenal rate.

Wednesday, 1st November 2023

In the last month farmers have contacted Rural Aid requesting more than \$1 million of hay.

Rural Aid was bracing for another wave of requests as devastating bushfires continue to burn across more than 100 locations in Queensland and NSW.

Based on Rural Aid's experience of the previous drought and the Black Summer bushfires of 2019, demand for hay will accelerate rapidly as conditions deteriorate.

"Rural Aid delivered \$56 million of hay and other services over a two-vear period between 2018-19 when drought and bushfire were ravaging the country," chief

executive officer John Warlters

"The drought has already arrived for thousands of farming families. Lower than average rainfall and higher than average temperatures and have plunged families back into financial and emotional turmoil.

"We are seeing that every day through the huge demand for our services and that's ahead of the hot and dry summer forecast by the bureau.

Mr Warlters said Rural Aid will need another huge and generous outpouring of support from the Australian community and business sector to meet the rapidly escalating demand for its services.

Mr Warlters said Rural Aid was hoping for the best but preparing

for the worst.

"If the current dry is just the beginning - and that is what the experts are suggesting, then it is going to be an extraordinarily difficult time for our farmers."

"Aside from the physical hardships of running a

farm through drought and bushfire, we know the toll on mental health can be even greater. Recent studies have shown the average suicide rate in Australian farmers to be almost 59 percent higher than the general population - the equivalent of one farmer taking


