Kevin Hickling from Hendon is happy to tell his story to make other people aware of what can happen if you don't listen to your body.

We'll start at the end and work backwards. This is what

happened to Kevin: During a visit to St. Vincent's Hospital to check out wounds that Kevin had received after a fall, the specialist discovered a problem with his heart. After tests were conducted specialists fitted Kevin with a pacemaker to regulate

his heart beat. His heart rate had crashed from 60-70 beats a minute to 25. In the previous four years Kevin had a number of turns including:

- bending over and feeling like he was going to hit the ground - walking down stairs and literally flying through the air

- after blowing his giddy nose, feeling with a need to balance himself against a wall - while out walking collapsed on the ground, causing himself injuries.

Kevin should have visited a doctor after the first episode, as it was a wakeup call.

That is his advice to others.



Gourd Almighty! Pumpkin prodigies pummel Ekka record with giant win

In a battle of supersized proportions, Toowoomba's Downlands College smashed the longstanding Ekka record by over 100 kilograms to take out top honours at the Roval Queensland Show's iconic Giant Pumpkin Competition at the Brisbane Showgrounds on Saturday.

The secondary school students also set a Queensland record with its ginormous 368.5-kilogram entry which beat the Ekka record for heaviest pumpkin of 261.5kg set back in 2015.

More than 10 mega pumpkins were placed on super-sized scales with Downlands College blitzing the competition by 109.5



kilograms.

The College's other entry was also enormous, weighing in at 337.5 kilograms - the second heaviest in the competition's history.

Downlands College takes home \$2,850 in prize money which includes this year's new bonus prize of \$1,000 for the heaviest pumpkin over 350kg.

It's the second time in the competition's history that a school has managed to edge out veteran growers in the Open Class category, after Downlands College won the title of Champion Heaviest Pumpkin of Show last year for the first-time.

Downlands

Agricultural Science teacher Jeff Buchanan said he felt their competition entry this year was the best they have ever produced.

"There is so much excitement among the students, as well as a real sense of achievement when they see what they have produced stacking up against other growers and school entries," Dr Buchanan said.

"The students are excited they have done better than before and they have been putting in the work with 30 barrel-loads of compost and a fertigation program for the pumpkins.

"This comes as part of the process to get the kids interested in plant science."

Ekka's most famous giant pumpkin growing family, the Frohloff's from Minden took out top honours in the open class.

Geoff's Frohloff's 259kg entry won first place, while his son Tony took out third place with a 155kg entry, while Jim Baxter's 164.5kg entry came second in the open category.

Judging was held outside

of Ekka dates in August again this year to take advantage of the premium pumpkin growing season. School students joined

`the veteran growers, with the competition curriculumaligned for Foundation to Grade 8, planting the seed of knowledge about the importance of agriculture.

Those who want to enter the competition next year, can sign up for their free Atlantic Giant pumpkin seeds at the Show or visit www.ekka.com.au to secure their seeds.

The crowning of the Ekka's first Grand Champion for 2024 signals the official countdown to Queensland's largest and most loved annual event. which is now just 154 davs away. Heaviest Pumpkin -




Coach Christensen. Wattles senior club A Grade star three quarter is in his initial year as a iunior club start and he and his charges are away to an impressive start.






