Southern Regional Councillors are attending a Special Meeting todav Wednesdav 12 June to consider the 2024/25 Draft Budget prior to inviting public consultation from tomorrow Thursday 13 June.

Ahead of the meeting, Mayor Melissa Hamilton emphasised the significance of community involvement in the budgeting process, saying that the 2024/25 Draft Budget reflects Council's commitment to building vibrant, liveable communities in the Southern Downs whilst remaining realistic about the cost of living pressures.

"It is proposed that there will be no increase to the residential General Minimum Rate, as we try to re-balance our rating system to ensure a fairer and more equitable system for our residential ratepayers," Mayor Hamilton said.

"In the longer term, a downward pressure on rates can only be achieved through encouraging sustainable growth and attracting new business and development in the region, and that is something that will be a key focus for the new Council.

"I encourage residents to review the 2024/25 Draft Budget documents and participate in the process. as community input helps Council prioritise and allocate resources effectively.

"By working together, Southern Downs."

The 2024/25 Draft Budget is available online for review at www.sdrc. gld.gov.au/living-here/ have-your-say from today Wednesday 12 June. Hard copies will also be available at Council's Administration Buildings and Libraries. Feedback can be emailed to mail@sdrc.gld.gov.au or submitted at Council's Administration Building in Warwick.

Community Consultation opens 8am tomorrow 13 June and closes 5pm Friday 28 June. Following public consultation, the final draft budget will be presented to Councillors for adoption at a meeting on Wednesday 24 July 2024.

Regional Uni Study Hub To Be Operational Next Year



Site for Uni Study Hub in Warwick

Building modifications and fit-out work will commence shortly on the Southern Downs regional university study hub, located at 163 Palmerin Street, Warwick.

Wednesday, 12th June 2024

When completed, the centre will include quality learning spaces, meeting rooms, technology and pastoral care to provide local students with greater access to tertiary studies and improved academic opportunities while continuing to live and study locally.

Southern Downs Mayor Melissa Hamilton said Council had worked closely with leading educational and community organisations on the funding submission to the Australian Government's Department of Education for a centre that was suitably

equipped to keep students local. "We need more key

workers in areas including health, education and engineering. Often the cost in moving away from home is not affordable for everyone, and this initiative will give so many more people an accessible pathway to higher education," Mayor Hamilton said.

The success of the Southern Downs submission was announced in late March. With the completion of a range of grant agreements, actual funding is now available for use.

The regional university study hub is expected to be fully operational for the start of the 2025 academic year and the recruitment process for a Centre Manager is currently underway.



How to identify fire ants

Fire ants are copper brown with a darker abdomen and measure 2-6 mm in size.

Thev:

- are aggressive in nature
- swarm when disturbed
- appear in a range of sizes within one nest.

Whilst sometimes mistaken for native ants, their tendency to swarm when threatened makes fire ants easier to distinguish from other species.

Fire ant nests have no obvious entry or exit holes and they can appear as:

- mounds
- flat patches of soil.

The shape and size of a nest will depend on the soil type and size of the fire ant colony.

Nests are usually found in warm, open areas such as:

- lawns, pastures and garden beds
- near water sources
- on roadsides
- in newly developed areas

• next to or under obiects

on the ground timber, logs, rocks, pavers and bricks

• near utility pits, water and gas meters.

On rural properties, the most common sightings are near dams, along irrigation and fence lines, edges of cultivated land, in cropland and in piles of organic matter.

It is everyone's responsibility to look for and report fire ants within 24 hours of sighting them, and we need you to be our eyes on the ground.

Check your yard, work site, local sporting grounds, parks, playgrounds, or anywhere fire ants may hide, and report suspect ants or nests by visiting fireants.org.au or calling 13 25 23.

All reports are important, even if you're not 100% sure you've found fire ants.

Reports of fire ants beyond the eradication treatment area receive priority. We also prioritise detections that pose a risk to public safety - schools, childcare centres, parks and sporting fields, and those with the greatest chance for future spread.

By investing in fire ant eradication now, we can avoid astronomical costs in the future and protect our Australian way of life for the next generation.






