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

# In Loving Memory of Christina (Chrissy) Huhta (10/9/1936)

aged 88 years who passed away peacefully on 25th December 2024, following a decline in her health over the prior 18 month period.

Christina's beloved husband Peter passed away on 13th July 2014, he was aged 87 years at the time of his death. Chrissy and Peter chose Allora as their home in the early 80's living in the district from 1981 to 1990. They bought a 280 acre block of land off Victoria Hill Road and named this property 'Lintula' and there they built their beautiful home from scratch. Living in a caravan for over a year with a generator for power and definitely limited luxuries, they toiled hard to create their piece of paradise and loved their life in this quiet neck of the



Chrissy was born in Holland, 3 years before World War II began. Life was very tough in this part of the world, which was hugely impacted by the war and as the Netherlands was in famine, Chrissy and her brother and sister were billeted to a family in Switzerland in 1945 for a 9 month period.

In 1951 the family moved to Australia, when Chrissy was 15 years of age. They lived in a migrant camp in Bathurst, and that is where Chrissy learnt English by reading comics. The family later moved to Brisbane where her dad had gained secure employment and the family finally settled. Chrissy was employed as a seamstress in a Brisbane business before marrying Peter Huhta in 1956.

This resilience that Chrissy had built during her young life made her the strong character she proved to be throughout her life. With this positive demeanour, a bright smile and a cheery disposition Chrissy was readily accepted into the Allora community, forging firm friendships.

She was an active member in the Allora Scope and Tennis Club and helped with Meals on Wheels. She loved a chat and a cuppa and always had interesting stories to tell. She was a frequent visitor to Fairfield, Ellinthorp where she chose the Nolan family to be part of her own extended family.

After leaving Allora, Chrissy and Peter moved to the Sunshine Coast where they enjoyed retirement and led an active life. She was a lover of swimming and travel and created beautiful gardens wherever she lived and her needlework and her intricate cross stitch adorn many walls in the homes of her extended family. Chrissy moved to the Scarborough area in late 2014 to be closer to her family and grandchildren. In any conversation with Chrissy over the past 30 years, she considered her time of living in the Allora district as a very special and treasured part of her life and would readily jump at any chance to travel back to Allora with family when the opportunity arose.

Christina was much loved by her family and is survived by her three children - Marianna Nolan, Belinda Huhta, Peter Huhta and their partners.

She was a loving Oma to her 9 grandchildren and Oma Chrissy to her 15 great grandchildren.

# Dave Burns Remembered as a Staunch Community Member

Both Allora and Clifton are better communities because of people like Dave Burns who sadly passed away on Monday 30th December 2024.

The Allora & District Historical Society was grateful for the services offered by the hangman/ handyman Dave Burns.

"Dave's legacy at the museum will be the many family portraits that he has hung on the walls, each row laser levelled and each individual portrait hung on two screws so they stay straight.

Whenever there was a difficult job to do Dave had the answer. He will be sadly missed" said Colin Newport.

In early 2024 Dave joined the Allora Men's Shed where he enjoyed helping with carpentry projects.

In Clifton Dave Burns was a staunch supporter of various local community organisations and was wellknown and highly regarded, in particular for his roles with Clifton & District Historical Society, initially as an active volunteer; then assisting with computerising Secretarial duties: acting as President during the final years when the Clifton Museum was in limbo after the Old Butter Factory was deemed unsafe and was closed. Dave's other roles included Treasurer and master organiser of the new Clifton Museum build. He was the 'glue' which held everything together.

Dave was a gifted coordinator, excelled in problem solving, had an amazing memory and asked for little recognition of his many achievements. He was awarded a well deserved Clifton & District Historical Society Life Membership in 2022.

Dave also gave his time whole-heartedly to his roles

for Clifton District Meals on Wheels from 2014 - late 2022. Clifton M.O.W. won the Australia Day Community Group award in 2022. Dave spent many hours organising and co-ordinating rosters for volunteers and delivery of meals around the district, with the particularly onerous task of dealing added paperwork during those difficult Covid years. He continued to personally deliver meals after he'd resigned from the main roles, right up to 20th December 2024.

Dave was a very complex and humble human being. He was also a caring person with a bright enquiring mind and helped many with his

# **Repairs To Council Flood Damaged Roads**



#### Southern Downs

External funding approvals continue to be finalised for flood recovery road repairs to restore the region's road network following extensive damage caused by the January 2024 weather event.

Council crews have begun rolling out critical infrastructure works across the region and works will continue into the new year to repair flood-affected roads.

Jointly funded through the Australian and Queensland governments' Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements (DRFA) and supported by Council, the comprehensive \$10+ million program will address damage to approximately 260 roads.

One road in our region where work will be carried out is the Inverramsay Road at Goomburra. Work to widen the road is scheduled to commence in February 2025 with anticipated completion May 2025.

Southern Downs Mayor Melissa Hamilton said the repair program would be balanced with long-term infrastructure planning to keep the region's roads maintained and safe for road users.

"We understand how vital our road network is to the daily lives of residents, businesses and visitors, and we are working hard to restore and maintain accessibility," Mayor Hamilton said.

"While current funding allows us to address a significant portion of the damage, we must prioritise works due to resource and time constraints.

"In addition to flood repairs, Council is allocating extra resources to address defects in the sealed road network, with crews expected to remain active throughout the region now and following Christmas over the coming months."

Any unfunded repairs will be added to Council's prioritised list and addressed as future funding and resources become available. Residents are encouraged to report any defects or hazards to assist Council in identifying these priority areas.

"We thank the community for their continued patience and cooperation as our crews work to complete the extensive flood recovery and maintenance program," Mayor Hamilton added.





# **New Resources For Ewe Pregnancy Scanning**

(MLA) Australia Australian Wool Innovation (AWI) have released a range of new resources to help producers scan and manage pregnant ewes.

The new resources are the result of a multi-year co-investment hetween MLA and AWI aimed to improve lamb survival and reproductive rates in the Australian sheep flock through better adoption of pregnancy scanning. The background research was completed by The University of Adelaide and included many industry consultants in the project team.

In 2018, an MLA-funded survey of Australian sheep producers determined that 69% of respondents did not pregnancy scan their ewe flocks for litter size.

According to Project Manager for Sheep and Goat Productivity at MLA, Dr Daniel Forwood, this limits a producer's capacity to maximise lamb and ewe survival

"Pregnancy scanning is a vital tool for improving sheep reproductive performance. It enables identification of litter size early in pregnancy. so that multiple-bearing



ewes can be differentially managed to recommended condition score targets and increase survival," Dr Forwood said.

"Research pregnancy scanning in sheep provides an average increase in profit of \$5.55/ ewe scanned.

"By customising ewe nutrition during pregnancy and lactation according to whether ewes are carrying singles or multiples, producers can help to reduce lamb and ewe mortality."

Important to increasing producer adoption is having a detailed business case for pregnancy scanning which is applicable to different production environments enterprise types. producer needs resource availability.

The resources include -

- management checklist · Pregnancy scanning: an
- ultrasound investment · Resource guide for sheep reproduction
- The value of pregnancy scanning: a benefit-cost analysis

This project is an initiative under the Sheep

Reproduction Strategic Partnership (SRSP). The SRSP is a sheep industry initiative managed by MLA that seeks to profitably and sustainably increase lamb production by increasing weaning rates decreasing mortality.

#### **Watch out for kids or pets** locked in cars this summer

In the past 12 months RACQ patrols rescued 799 children and 776 animals locked in vehicles - that is two kids and two animals locked in a vehicle every day in Queensland.

Manager General Assistance and Automotive Mark Boswell of RACQ said motorists must be aware of the danger with above temperatures predicted

"Our patrols can successfully unlock most cars within minutes using vehicle-specific methods.

"We provide this service to Queenslanders, regardless of whether vou're a member.

"If you're concerned about the health of a child, call emergency services immediately.

In just over 12 months to October this year RACQ has responded to 88 emergency lockins throughout the Darling Downs/ South West region.




"I was only 16 when they formed Warwick & District and I've been part of it ever since. I've had three goes at being chairman," he said.
