Paul Parker won the Poker Run's \$200 poker hand cash prize, and donated \$100 of his winnings to the RSL.



Allora Cricket Club Enter New Era

The Allora Cricket Club Inc. enter a new era as of this week after being granted a lease over the Allora Cricket Oval reserve.

Cricket Club President Glyn Rees couldn't be happier with the finalization of the lease agreement. While the Cricket Club's application was approved by the Southern Downs Regional Council late last year, it wasn't until this week that documentation was forthcoming from the Department of Environment & Resource Management advising that the lease had taken effect as of the 1st of January, 2011. The Allora Cricket Club was formed in 2006 after a meeting at the Commercial Hotel where Glyn Rees was elected President, Neil Masters & Cameron Masters were elected Vice-Presidents, Nick Johnson was appointed to the Secretary role and the late Terry Doyle the foundation Treasurer. Cricket as a sport had been dormant in Allora over a few years.

The Allora Club was soon after sponsored by Debbie Smith of the Allora Foodworks Supermarket, with the 2006/07 season being there initial in the Warwick Cricket Association competition. Allora's first fixture was a loss against Wheatvale at the Allora Cricket Oval on Sunday 1st October, 2006, hitting a total of 63 runs before being dismissed in thirteen overs. Stephen Hughes top scored with the bat with 23 runs, a total that included five boundaries. Allora's total, brought comments and recollections from spectators the late Geoff Slatter and Keith Masters of a match when Allora managed only ten runs.

The team that played in that game against Wheatvale that signaled the rebirth of cricket in Allora was: Luke Murdoch, Ross Hentschel, Andrew Petersen, Cameron Masters, Stephen Hughes, Adam May, Jared Petersen, Brady Glass, Nick Johnson, Steven Bolzan and Bradley Fiechtner.

Allora have one premiership success to their credit, a Reserve Grade title in 2007/08.

Significant repairs were carried out to the club building at the Allora Cricket Oval in 2006 due to extensive vandalism. In recent years a new synthetic wicket cover has been laid on the concrete pitch at a cost in excess of \$2500.

The Club committee is now looking to upgrade facilities at the Cricket Oval facility, with club building upgrades and extensions and practice nets among suggestions. Facility maintenance equipment is also essential for facility upkeep.

Warwick Cricket Association President Michael Bourke congratulated the Allora C.C. committee on their progress, and the benefits that will be brought both to the Allora Cricket Club and cricket within the district by securing the lease.

New group assists review of SDRC rating system

Eight local residents appointed to the newly formed Southern Downs Regional Council Rating Consultation Group met again last Thursday to provide input into a review of the current rating system.

Cr Ron Bellingham welcomed the Group members including Kelvin Hutchinson (Allora), Doug Smith (Stanthorpe), Rebekah Hill (Stanthorpe), Rod Petersen (Killarney), Brian Reid (Warwick), David Littleproud (Warwick Chamber of Commerce), Norman Crisp (Stanthorpe Chamber of Commerce), and Sean Hegarty (Warwick).

"I'm very pleased with the calibre of people on this group and thank them for putting up their hand and giving up their time for this important task," Cr Bellingham said.

"We now have a group of experienced and professional individuals to advise our ratings review," he said.

"They have a wide range of financial and business experience and represent different areas of the community."

The Ratings Consultation Group is designed to assist with evolving a fair rating system and provide a conduit between the public and Council.

The Mayor acknowledged that introducing a region-wide system had been challenging for both Council and residents and that the system would continue to evolve.


"We promised last year that we would review our initial decisions on the first post-amalgamation unified ratings system and that's a promise we intend to follow through on.

"In particular Council said it would unify the ratings categories for commercial and industrial businesses across the region, as the second part of a two stage phase-in process."

The Mayor said Council would do everything in its power to make the system as fair as possible but warned that changes could mean increases for some and decreases for others.

"We will be looking at the region as a whole, and it will be a tough process where not everyone will be happy," Cr Bellingham

The Group, chaired by Cr Mally McMurtrie and also including Crs Ross Bartley and Jo McNally as well as the community members will meet regularly during the rating review process. The new rates are expected to be decided by July.

Proposed equestrian sculpture open for public comment

Southern Downs Regional Council is seeking your feedback on the location of, and Council funding for maintenance of, a proposed 15 metre high equestrian sculpture in Warwick.

The sculpture, brainchild of local artist John Simpson, is designed to pay homage to Warwick's equestrian community past and present.

The project received in principal but not financial support from Southern Downs Regional councillors at the General Meeting on 22 June 2010.

However at the December 2010 General Meeting, Council agreed to seek public feedback on a request by Mr Simpson that Council fund lighting, signage and ongoing maintenance for the sculpture, if the sculpture construction costs of \$115,000 plus were funded elsewhere

Maintenance costs over 25 years have been conservatively estimated by the artist at \$10,000. A costing for maintenance has not been completed by independent consultants or Council officers.

Director of Community Services Tony Minuti told Council that the requested directional signage and spotlighting was unlikely to require "any major expense". Council is also seeking public feedback on the proposed location for the sculpture.

Originally proposed for a spot on the Cunningham Highway at Gladfield, now two new locations have been proposed.

The first is in the corner of Queen's Park on Alice Street opposite the Rodeo Hall of Fame building; the second is at the entranceway to Morgan Park.

Alternatively, pick up a printed copy of the survey at Warwick Library, Council's Warwick customer service desk or at a stall in Rose City Shopping Centre this Thursday 7 April between 10am and 2pm. The survey closes on Wednesday 27th April. 

In June 1978 the Allora Co-op produce business had been sold to J. & M. Green and T. & P. Ryan and traded under the name of Allora Produce. The Greens sold their interest in business to Tim and Pam Ryan in November of the same year. In August 1980 the business moved into a new shed built at No. 7 Forde Street, on land formerly owned by the Allora Co-op. Accident




