We were also very appreciative of the wonderful support given by the Suncorp staff.


The entertainment was very professional and it was a pleasure to see how many people entered into the spirit of the day, with the Ballina girls providing a chorus line for Deeny.





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Cunningham's Gap - Cunningham Highway

Major works are progressing at Cunningham's Gap to repair damage from road pavement subsidence and landslips caused by extreme wet weather over the 2010/2011 holiday period. Emergency works are now complete at two of 11 damaged sites. The completed sites are located west of the truck stop bay and west of the stockpile site (east of the helipad).

Extensive works are required at eight remaining sites to stabilise the road. One additional site is showing early signs of damage and is being monitored. In addition, work to stabilise the rock face above the highway is continuing.


These works are essential to the safety of Cunningham Highway road users.

The Cunningham Highway remains under stop/go traffic conditions from the top of the Gap to Fig Tree Gully. Motorists can expect delays when travelling through the Gap.

Restrictions are in place on vehicles over 3.5 m wide between the helipad and the Gap. These vehicles are encouraged to take alternate routes while the restoration works are carried out. Please call 13 19 40 for updates about what restrictions are in place.

The major restoration program will take many months to complete. The department is committed to maintaining safe access and finding permanent solutions that should see a stable road surface at the Gap for many years to come.

Captain Grant Prendergast commemorates **Anzac Day with** Warwick community

Captain Grant Prendergast will perform the duties of Reviewing Officer at Day Warwick Anzac services on April 25.

Southern Downs Mayor Ron Bellingham said Captain Prendergast will join officials outside the Town Hall at 10.55am to take the salute from

servicemen and women, before proceeding to the Cenotaph where he will be quest speaker at the 11am service.

Captain Prendergast was educated and raised on a large sheep and cattle station in Northern New South Wales. Upon finishing school he enlisted in the Australian Army and was allocated to the Royal Australian Armoured Corps.

He started his career as a Trooper in an Armoured Fighting Vehicle Regiment and guickly rose through the ranks to Corporal and Armoured Fighting Vehicle Commander.

Whilst in the Army, Captain Prendergast attended the University of New England where he studied a Bachelor of Asian Cultures and Linguistics. In early 2000, Captain Prendergast deployed with the United Nations Peace Keeping Force to East Timor as Armoured Fighting Vehicle Commander. Upon his return to Australia he was posted to several locations around Australia. One of the highlights of his military career was being posted as Company Sergeant Major to an Infantry Regiment, where he trained Infantry soldiers. A further career highlight was being in command of an armoured reconnaissance and surveillance

In early 2007 he was commissioned as an Armoured Officer.



Allora's Past 100 years ago April 1911 Railway Guarantee Expires

The Allora branch railway was opened for traffic on April 21st, 1897, so that the 14 years which limited the liability of the guarantors has expired, and the line will in future, be worked as a purely Government concern. With the exception of one or two bad years, the branch has been a consistent profit earner, and the Town Council expect that their halfshare of the profits, after all losses have been paid, will amount to a considerable sum.

(After years of agitation, the contract for the construction of the 3 ½ mile railway line from Hendon to Allora was signed in September 1896. Under the Railway Guarantee Act, the Allora Municipal Council agreed to pay ½ the cost of construction plus interest and the cost of maintenance of the line for a period of 14 years. A special rate was struck to cover repayment costs. The line was officially opened by the Hon. T. McGahan, the local M. L. A. for Cunningham, on the 21st April, 1897.

In July 1911, the Allora Municipal Council received a windfall payment of £1,229/9/2, being its share of the profits of the line at the time of the expiry of the guarantee on the 21st April)

Obituary

Mr. Edward Sparksman, an old identity of the district, died on Wednesday morning last and his demise marks the passing of yet another of the old hands. The late Mr. Sparksman was in his 76th year. He was born in Devonshire, England, and arrived in Queensland at the age of 14. He worked around Brisbane for some time, tried his hand at Gympie in the early days of the gold field, and later engaged in the carrying trade over the range from Ipswich to Warwick. Later on he took up a piece of land at Allora where he resided for 37 years until his death. He leaves a widow, six living children, and 34 grandchildren to mourn their loss.

Sam Bailey is one of those. A farmer, pilot, husband and now best selling author, he has achieved all of those from a wheelchair... and has an incredible ability to take an audience on the journey of his life.

It's a rollercoaster ride that promises to make people laugh, cry, appreciate what they've got and realise that nothing is impossible.

Sam tells his story in his own down-to-earth laconic style that captures the great Australian spirit of 'having a go' and he's changing the lives of people of all ages, from all walks of life... from adults to children as young as primary school age.

One of Australia's leading speakers and MCs, Robyn Moore said, "Standing ovations don't happen often in Australia, however Sam Bailey's story is so powerful it lifts people to their feet."

Sam's talk chronicles his life, from a childhood growing up wanting to be a farmer just like his dad, through to the day his life changed forever at the fork in a road in the Northern Territory and its aftermath.

The road accident turned the schoolboy sporting hero and outback jackaroo into a quadriplegic.

He learnt to drive a car again, travelled overseas and even tried snow skiing.

As if he hadn't already achieved enough – he "climbed" his very own "Mount Kosciusko" when he learnt to fly an ultralight aircraft.

But Sam's story is much more than that.

It's also a story of love and romance that will send your spirits soaring.

Sam found his soul mate in former Tamworth-based ABC radio Rural Reporter, Jenny Black – who he proposed to "live" on regional radio. The real-life proposal jammed the phone lines and the fax ran out of paper.



The process of passing through to the other side of life is explained

in a booklet written by Steven. He hopes this

book will bring peace of mind to those people that need it the most. "Why now, after all this time?" he was asked, "Because it feels that the timing is right. In the early days I was concerned that I would be branded a weirdo for talking about my experiences, but now I am at an age when such things no longer worry me. The process of dying is very simple if we do certain things, it really is a piece of cake if we know the steps to take. Not understanding the process may cause some people to get stuck between dimensions, and that can be unpleasant. For most people though the process is smooth and uncomplicated. 

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VMS gives drivers a heads up

Transport and Main Roads is installing an electronic message board (Variable Message Sign) on the Cunningham Highway approach to the Eight Mile intersection when travelling from Warwick to let motorists know about road conditions in the

Transport and Main Roads Regional Director Tony Platz said the sign would inform motorists of potential hazards, incidents and delays on the road ahead.

"This will be a valuable tool in providing motorists with advanced warning about congestion, crashes, wet road conditions and other potential hazards and I encourage motorists to use this information to make informed driving choices." Mr Platz said.

"The Eight Mile is an important intersection for people travelling to south east Queensland, especially from the west or from New South Wales.

"This technology will give people the option to take an alternative route if there are problems on the road.

"For example, if there are delays to Brisbane via Cunningham's Gap. motorists will have the opportunity to take the Toowoomba exit as an alternative route to Brisbane.

"We'll be installing this sign in the next week or so and look forward to it being operational soon after this."

People can expect changed traffic conditions such as possible lane reductions or traffic controllers to help keep vehicles flowing during the work in next few weeks.

There may also be some minor delays during the actual installation of the sign.

Motorists are advised to obey all signage and traffic control during this time for their own safety and the safety of workers and other road users.

This is part of programmed works for the federal highway and has been funded by the Australian government.

notes.

Unquestionably, the biggest attraction of the day is the horses, particularly when they are 10- abreast. A joke about the horses being in training for the big day yields a jovial response.

"There's still five up the bloody mountain block and I can't get time to get them out," Mick laughs.

His social and work calendar is looking a little cramped in the lead-up to the event. He's had the Toowoomba Show recently, a daughter's 40th in Mackay, and he's headed to Highfields Historical Village for a look at Easter.

"There's not much time to round them up and get them behaving nicely." he said.

When quizzed if they always behave "nicely", the stories flow. "I've had the joining strap of the front two pair break, so I had no control over them. As they just come around they had nothing holding them together and the 'toey' horse was on one

side.

I was very lucky that things didn't go badly with that one," he guips.

"One time I broke me ankle and was on crutches for a couple of weeks. The culprit horse's grandmother was an ex-trotter and it was four years before he saw a yard. Something stirred him!"

Mick's affinity for heavy horses started at age six, when he began driving Clydesdales on his parent's farm. His afterschool chores of feeding cattle and pigs could be managed just as easily on a single horse or with a team and weekend sport gave way to ploughing the garden behind a team. In the 1850s his great-grandfather, a carrier in the Ipswich district, used bullock teams to haul freight.

The Heavy Horse Day also showcases other farming activities from the 1800's and 1900's. Visitors will see examples of farming equipment from the Sunshine Harvesters Works,
