
Letter to the Editor...



SPIRIT OF ENTHUSIASM LIVES ON IN ALLORA - 100 YEARS LATER -

It was January, 1911. The church had already been built. The congregation was anxious to have a parish priest. One Sunday after Mass, they gathered together and unanimously adopted a resolution to yet again request the Archbishop to grant them a parish priest. Feelings were running high; it was obvious that the congregation would not rest until their district was declared a parish. By the end of 1911 Archbishop Dunne granted their wishes. The new parish of St. Patrick's, Allora was formed embracing Deuchar, Goomburra Valley, Talgai West and Glengallan with Father Phillip Corrigan as the first parish priest. Allora's Past 25 years ago August 1986 Obituary

The death occurred at Willowvale on the 18th August 1986 of Mr. Henry Alfred Smith, well known on the Downs for his interests in farming, horses and sport. Mr. Smith was born at Sladevale in 1905,



the Head Teacher, Mr. R. L. Jackson.

the son of Henry and Lucy Smith. The family moved to Mt. Marshall in the following year. Henry was educated at the Glengallan State School and Ipswich Grammar before returning to the family farm on the death of his father in 1915.

He took a keen interest in rugby league, playing for Allora and Warwick teams for several years. He was also an enthusiastic cricket and tennis player. From 1944 until his retirement in 1983 he held a bookmaker's licence

and fielded on Downs and provincial meetings.

Henry married Florence Crothers in 1928 and moved to Willowvale where he built up his land holdings over the following years. Henry and Florence reared a family of five sons and one daughter. Mr. Smith was survived by sons, Jim,

Roy and Trevor; daughter, Meryl (Kelly); 25 grand-children and sisters, Elizabeth (Shooter) and Doris (Byrne). He was predeceased by his wife Florence, and sons Henry and Noel.



PLANS HATCHED FOR ECONOMY BOOST

One of Australia's leading poultry meat producers, Darwalla Milling Company is set to make a \$12.5M injection into the Darling Downs region with a new chick hatchery planned for the township of Allora.

Darwalla Development Manager, David Bray, said the hatchery would create 32 jobs per week including 15 full time positions with roles ranging from maintenance to cleaningcrews, drivers, general hands and operational managers.

Other opportunities would be delivered including the generation of construction jobs as part of the building program and consultancy roles related to the progress of the current and future development of the business in the region.

According to Mr Bray, Darwalla has already entrenched itself as a major employer with more than 100 employees and a successful business in the wider Darling Downs economy with the company currently running six operations in the region incorporating more than 2900 acres of land.

"We've already invested \$12M into the region with two breeding farms in Allora and two in Clifton where our fertile eggs are produced, and we have two additional farms in Killarney and Laidley where chickens are raised to point of lay," Mr Bray said.

"We also currently have an application on the go at Sandy Creek for another rearing farm where chickens will be raised to the point of lay.

"We are certainly expanding and looking to be a key business delivering positive outcomes for local people throughout the Darling Downs because we believe this region is ideal for the kind of operation we have." he said.

Mr Bray said that, as a fully integrated chicken meat producer, Darwalla was a major shareholder in broiler growing facilities, feed mill production, live bird supply and chicken meat production with more than 900 people employed throughout its wider operation.

But there were also several positive flow-on economic effects from its activities with the company strongly committed to supporting local economies and working co-operatively with communities.

"For example, we purchase grain from the local area which is used to produce feed for our breeders at the Clifton Feed Mill and we actively maintain a policy of using local contractors – at the end of the day, we are a farming company and we seek to preserve and protect the values of farming communities," Mr Bray said.

"I think that's why, while our farms are located within 1-2 kilometres of residential areas, they're warmly accepted by local communities like Killarney where we've been operating for five years and we have a great relationship with the township," he said.

The Darwalla Milling Company was established in 1933, in Redlands, near Brisbane, by Dolphie Benfer, with its main interest in table egg production.

Diversification in the 1960s saw the Company move into chicken meat production.

The company sold its egg production assets in 2003 and today, focuses on chicken meat with its own fertile egg farms, hatcheries and chicken meat growing facilities.

The group produces 100,000 tonnes of feed, 22,500,000 day old chickens and 51,525,000 kilos of chicken meat every year. Chickens are processed by Golden Cockerel, which is 50% owned by Darwalla, with end markets primarily throughout Queensland and New South Wales.

Australia-wide, the \$2 Billion chicken meat industry employs some 50,000 people.

Australians consume on average around 36 kilograms of chicken meat per capita, compared to 12.3 kg of lamb and mutton and 24.7 kg of pig meat.

With only 3% of chicken meat exported, the industry is uniquely positioned as a largely domestic market, run by Australians for Australians.

Darwalla injects a total of \$20 Million every year into the community through wages and salaries alone.

New Southern Downs group turns up heat on wild dogs

Southern Downs Regional Council has delivered on its third promise to landholders to assist with controlling wild dogs and has formed the new Southern Downs Wild Dog Management Advisory Group with community members.

It is the first such group in the South-East corner and is made up of local primary producers, as well as representatives from Queensland Parks and Wildlife, Biosecurity Queensland and Council.

Councillor Cameron Gow said it's excellent to see Council, State Government agencies and the community working together.

"This is another step in our response to calls from primary producers to ramp up the campaign against wild dogs in the region," Cr Gow said.

"Last year, Council met with the Mountain Maid Wild Dog Group about the worsening problem of wild dogs," he explained. "Council later made three promises – to increase the wild dog bounty, to stock and provide 1080 poison at Council and to

form a community based advisory committee to the Council Pest Management Group."

Council acted quickly to increase the wild dog bounty from \$50 to \$100 and also began stocking 1080 poison locally last year. A meeting on the new Advisory Group was held at Warwick Town Hall in late July 2011 to decide who would represent various areas in the Southern Downs, and their AGM was held at Dalveen last Friday. Sheep and cattle producer Ben Cory was elected Chair of the new Southern Downs Wild Dog Management Advisory Group with Peter Cleary as Vice Chair and Ross McCorquodale elected Secretary.

Mr Cory said that as well as advising Council on wild dog management strategy, the Group would be pushing to get "neighbours talking to neighbours" so many more would get involved in co-ordinated baiting and trapping programs.

"The wild dogs are still out there, that's for sure," said Mr Cory, who estimates he's lost 200 sheep to wild dogs in the last five years

"I trapped a dog near Killarney two weeks ago and know of another caught at Mt Colliery and one out at Karara," he said. "So we'll be pushing for more landholders to come on board because the best way to jump on top of the wild dog problem is to get as many landholders involved in baiting and trapping at the same time as possible.

"That's been working out West, where sheep are only just now starting to be brought back onto land.

"The difference here is that there are many more landholders on smaller blocks, so it's a challenge, especially when they are not directly impacted by wild dogs.

"But it is the landholders' responsibility to manage pests on their property."

Mr Cory said Council had been "really keen" and proactive in forming the Advisory Group.

"This is the first group of its kind in the South-East corner and we hope to be able to make more headway against wild dogs," Mr Cory said.

Cr Gow, who chairs Council's Pest Management Group, echoed this view: "I very much look forward to working with the new Southern Downs Wild Dog Advisory Group to come up with ways to better coordinate our combined efforts and response to this serious issue in our community."

Next Coordinated wild dog baiting program starts August 31, 2011 - The next co-ordinated baiting program organised by Council starts in Stanthorpe and district on August 31 and Warwick and district from 1-2 September 2011.

Wattles led 22 - 18 by the 58th minute, but two quick tries by 18 year back Lincoln Cutmore virtually sealed the match for the Cowboys, a late penalty goal by their centre Michael O'Keefe putting the result beyond doubt as the clock ticked down.

best player was lock Aaron Scheid with a mighty all round effort. 

Wattles head to Dalby this Sunday to take on the local "Diehards" in all grades in the final round of fixtures in the 2011 Toowoomba Rugby League season.


