The Lions Club has a long association with community carols and as well as cooking up the sausage sizzle, members will also sell drinks and glow sticks.




Aside from churning out mountains of hot chips and fairy floss, members of Warwick's Rotary Club will also turn their attention to the children's Christmas dress up competition.






COMBINED CHURCHES OF ALLORA - (Anglican, Catholic, Presbyterian and Uniting)

Looking Back...

Allora's Past 50 years ago December 1960

THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS of the ALLORA SHIRE COUNCIL CORDIALLY INVITE CITIZENS OF THE SHIRE to be present at the OFFICIAL OPENING of the NEW COUNCIL CHAMBERS BY J. W. GORDON ESQ. FRIDAY 9TH DECEMBER, 1960 at 2 p.m.

and afterwards to Afternoon Tea at the Allora Bowling Club House

Contrary to what was printed in *Clifton Courier* of 17th November 2010 (*Peeps into the Past 50 Years Ago*) John Gordon was not one of Allora's earliest mayors. The last mayor, apart from Jim Deacon, was elected in 1914. John would have been given the honour of opening the new council chambers because the Gordon family was one of the earliest families to settle in the town and had a long association with local government in Allora.

John's great-grandfather Samuel Gordon and family arrived in Queensland from County Armagh in Ireland in 1855. They came to the Allora district in 1858, the year before the town was surveyed, and lived in a shepherd's hut on the side of Allora Mountain. It was here that John's grandfather, Robert Woodhouse Gordon was born in February 1860. This was the

month before the first town allotments were sold. Samuel Gordon purchased an allotment in Raff Street and built a cottage on the site. In 1864 he built the Princess of Wales Hotel and he, and his descendants, were associated with the hotel until it was sold in 1950. R. W. Gordon bought a butcher's shop in 1892 and he, and later his sons, operated butcher's shops in Allora until 1953. John Gordon did his apprenticeship at the Allora Advertiser. He bought the business in 1954 and produced the weekly newspaper until he sold it in 1999. . Samuel Gordon was elected to the first

Allora Municipal Council in 1869 and served as mayor in 1872/73. His eldest

son, Andrew, was Mayor in 1891/92 and again in 1899/1900, as well as serving on the Clifton Divisional Board for many years. Robert Woodhouse Gordon was elected to the Allora Municipal Council in 1907 and served until early 1915, choosing not to contest the new Allora Shire elections in March of that year. Co-incidentally he was on the Municipal Council at the time of the official opening of the new Town Hall on the 8th January 1908. This building was the headquarters of the Municipal and Shire Council until replaced by the building in Herbert Street.

Urgent safety work on Cunningham Highway

Main Roads will start urgent safety works at Cunningham's Gap to remove two huge boulders at the top of the Gap, Main Roads Minister Craig Wallace said recently.

Minister Wallace said the Cunningham Highway would be closed at the top of the Gap from 6am to 6pm from Monday, 13 December until Monday, 20 December to ensure the safety of motorists.

Traffic will be diverted at key points and motorists will detour along other roads such as the New England and Warrego Highways.

"It's an inconvenience for people who use the Cunningham Highway, but safety simply must come first," Mr Wallace said. "Transport and Main Roads have engaged specialist contractors



to remove the two boulders above the highway near Gap Creek Road. With heavy rain predicted, they've got to get on with the job straight away," he said.

Mr Wallace said the work zone will be protected by ballast-filled shipping containers.

"Geotechnical experts will work alongside rock climbers with specialist drilling equipment to shatter the boulders," he said.

"I've been assured by my Department that all going well with the weather, the highway will re-open over the Christmas New Year period.

"We will do our utmost to ensure the community and stakeholders are kept fully informed," he said.

"I thank motorists in advance for their patience and understanding while these works are being carried out. The bottom line is that these boulders have to go," he said.

UPDATE: Currently, Cunningham's Gap remains closed due to safety concerns regarding water over the road, slips and deterioration of pavement. The Gap had received 48mm of rainfall in an hour on and the movement sensor alarm on the slope was triggered. The persistent rain means that it is too dangerous for our geotechnical experts to assess the rock face. Motorists are encouraged to seek alternate routes. It is important to note that this closure is unrelated to the planned closure scheduled for 13 - 20 December 2010.

Cat and dog rego by Friday

There are an awful lot of kitties out there who have not signed up for Council's temporary reprieve on registration.

As of late last week, only 225 cats had been registered across the region and just 40 dogs from the rural areas of the former Warwick area.

Council's Director Planning & Environment, Ken Harris was surprised by the low registration level.

"With Council offering a fee-free registration period to cat owners to help them comply with the new laws, I thought there would be a greater uptake of the offer," Mr Harris said.

New state imposed compulsory animal registration laws come into force on the Southern Downs from December 13. Under state legislation all cat and dog owners, with the exception of genuine working dogs, are now required to register their animals with Council. Council's current fee-free registration period also applies to dogs from outside the settled area of the former Warwick Shire.

Mr Harris said that Council approved free registration for a period of almost two months to help pet owners comply with the new laws.

"From December 10 until June 30 2011, only de-sexed cats, as well as de-sexed dogs kept outside the settled areas of the former Warwick Shire, will receive free registration." he said.

Mr Harris highlighted that it is the responsibility of cat and dog owners to register their pet with council to ensure the safety of their pet and the community. He noted that registration compliance is regularly checked both in public areas and residential areas to ensure that pet owners are taking their responsibility seriously.

"Residents also need to be aware that it is only possible to register cats and dogs where the number of animals to be kept complies with the relevant provisions of the planning scheme," he said.

Most recent statistics showed 3475 dogs were registered in the Southern Downs. Across the region during the month of October, 35 dogs were impounded, 20 released, 15 destroyed, 2 sold and 6 remained in the pound at the end of the month. To register cats or dogs, residents should visit the nearest

council office or phone the Customer Service Team on 4661 0300 (Warwick) or 4681 5500 (Stanthorpe). Enquiries on new cat/dog registration obligations should be directed to Council's Environmental Services Section.

I don't believe that our population is in decline, all we have to do is look around. If it is in such a decline, then maybe it is because, a lot more pressure has been placed on women. We



Switch on to safety before switching on vour Christmas lights

EnergyAustralia is reminding homeowners to think twice when decorating this Christmas, as research shows three-in-four people surveyed don't take proper safety precautions when installing Christmas lights.

An EnergyAustralia study of more than 1,300 people across Sydney, the Central Coast and the Hunter, showed that almost half of the household's surveyed decorates with lights at Christmas time.

While festive cheer is important this time of year, EnergyAustralia's General Manager Engineering, Trevor Armstrong, said using the wrong lights or putting them up incorrectly, is putting your safety at risk.

"The most common mistakes people make are putting the lights up last, when they should go up before all other decorations, not checking for frayed cords and using indoor lights outside," Mr Armstrong said.

The survey showed the most common safety mistakes were:

- · 42% of people put other decorations up before installing their lights
- · 20% of people don't check their lights for frayed electrical cords

- including the service wire to your house
- 15% used power boards outside, which exposes them to the elements and
- · 11% used indoor lights outside.

"Accidents and electric shocks can be easily avoided by taking simple steps when decorating your home or Christmas tree. "Lights add that special festive touch, so don't be scared to decorate, just be aware of your safety.

"Make sure you follow everyday safety advice. Fully unwind extension cords to avoid overheating and don't overload power points."

Safety tips for Christmas lights

- 1. Fully unwind extension cords to avoid overheating
- 2. Check Christmas lights and replace any fraved cords. damaged plugs or missing bulbs
- 3. Don't overload power points or piggyback power adaptors
- 4. Install a safety switch or buy a power board with one built in
- 5. Keep tinsel away from lights and power sockets
- 6. Joins in extension cords should not be exposed to the weather, neither should lights designed for indoor use
- 7. Beware of powerlines when working outdoors and on your roof
- 8. Turn Christmas lights off before going out or going to bed

Allora Primed For Home Turf Win


The Allora Cricket side's hopes of posting a win on their journey to Inglewood last Saturday were dashed yet again courtesy of the current lush wet. The match was called


Allora State School primary student and Gold Medal Discus thrower Jack Bannister.
