



Looking Back...

Sport in Allora

The Allora Rugby Union Football Club was formed at a public meeting called by Joe Nemeth in Kelly's Royal Hotel on the 27th May 1891. In its first match Allora defeated Greenmount 12 to nil at the Allora school reserve. Allora winger Robert Harrison broke his leg in the match and over £5 was subscribed for him on the grounds. In 1903 Talgai West and Goomburra fielded teams and by 1905 Allora had joined the Southern Downs Union with fixture matches between four Warwick teams, Allora, and Killarney.

The Allora Rangers Football Club was formed in 1907 and wore the familiar green and gold colours worn by later Allora football sides. Rangers won the 1907 premiership in a competition featuring sides from Clifton, Allora, Nobby and Greenmount. They defeated Nobby 25 points to nil in the final and would not have been short of a place to go for refreshments after the game. The team was captained by W. Clarke whose mother was licensee of the Princess of Wales Hotel, and included J. and T. Collins whose father owned the Club Hotel and J. and T. Flynn whose mother owned the Royal Hotel.

The C. E. M. S. (Church of England Men's Society) "All Blues" Football Club was formed in 1909. Not to be outdone the C. Y. M. S. (Catholic Young Men's Society) Football Club was formed soon after. 1911 saw their combining with the re-formation of the Rangers Football Club.

Rugby League made its first appearance in Allora in April 1917 with a match between Allora Town, captained by George Fisk, and Allora Country, captained by Gordon McMillan. After this match the Allora Boomerangs Football Club was formed. In

Mr Scott said he would also take a moment on Christmas Dav to remember the Australia Defence Personnel who are serving in various overseas countries and would be apart from their families for the festive season.

1919 the Spring Creek "All Blacks" and C. Y. M. S. fielded teams and the Goomburra "Warriors" Football Club issued a public challenge to the Allora "Boomers". The Allora "Diggers" formed a team in 1920.

A meeting to form a combined side was called in 1922 resulting in the formation of the Allora Rangers Rugby League Club. They joined the South East Downs competition which included sides from Allora, Clifton, Greenmount, Nobby, and Back Plains. Allora were 1922 premiers and also defeated the Warwick premiers 40 to nil in an ambulance benefit match. Because of their superiority they were refused entry into the 1923 competition and had to split into two teams, Rangers and All Blues, plaving for the "Ambulance Shield". The Allora and District League was formed in 1924 with teams from Allora. Table Top and Goomburra.

The Allora Rangers Club was re-formed in 1925 and played in the Warwick competition.

The 1926 season saw the emergence of Fred Laws, possibly the best footballer produced in Allora, when he first played in the Toowoomba representative side against Brisbane. He played for Queensland in 1927, Australia in 1928, and was picked for Kangaroo tours to England in 1929 and 1933. His brother Colin, played for Queensland from 1928 to 1932 and in 1931 was considered such a valuable member of the Toowoomba Bulimba Cup side that an aeroplane was sent to pick him up at the Allora racecourse for a match in Brisbane. Allora has produced many excellent Rugby League players and teams over the years and we await with interest Tom McVeigh and John Croke's book on the history of Rugby League in Allora







Council seeks members of rating consultation group

The Southern Downs Regional Council is seeking expressions of interest from residents keen to assist in a review of the SDRC rating system.

After the controversial introduction of differential rating across the Southern Downs, Mayor Ron Bellingham is urging those with an interest to have a say in revision of the current model.

"We are looking for people with passion for the community, business or government experience, and if anyone out there has knowledge of rating system methodologies, then we want them too," Cr Bellingham said.

"This rating consultation group is a chance to advise Council on what enhancements may be needed with the current model."

Members of the group will be selected from the community via an Expression of Interest process. Cr Bellingham said that Council was particularly looking for community champions to be part of this group.

"From the voices in this group, Council certainly hopes to gain a clearer understanding of anomalies in the current system and possible ways to overcome these, but I expect there will also be an educative component with members of our consultation group also coming to terms with the intricacies of developing a fair and equitable rating system across the whole region.

"Once this process is started, the role of members will be to go back out to the community on Council's behalf and share their findings and future strategies."

Cr Bellingham said that it was desirable for group members to be available for meetings during working hours as well as after hours, with participation on the group being entirely voluntary. 



Deadly asbestos warning for home renovators

Over 1 million homes around Australia are estimated to contain asbestos. The renovation and demolition of these properties will ensure a growing number of people come into contact with asbestos, so Council is reminding home renovators about the risks of working with asbestos and exposing themselves to deadly dust or fibres.

Director Planning and Environment, Ken Harris said it was best for anyone who suspected a material of containing asbestos to leave it alone and seek expert advice, particularly as some asbestos material is difficult to identify.

"By removing, cutting, drilling or sanding asbestos materials, you risk inhaling potentially deadly dust and fibres," he said "People need to realise that ordinary dust masks are not effective and that they need either a specific respirator for working with asbestos (class P1 or P2 disposable respirator) or a half-face filter respirator fitted with a class P1 or P2 filter cartridge."

Mr Harris said that Council needs renovators and younger people working in the building and trade industries to be vigilant in order to prevent a future generation of asbestos related disease.

"We need to educate our young people, because if we don't get this right, then they will become the next wave of disease sufferers."

Australia has the highest per capita rate of mesothelioma, a fatal disease for which the only known cause is inhalation of asbestos fibres. Frighteningly, mesothelioma has a latency period up to 30 years or more and can cause death within months of diagnosis.

As part of recent Asbestos Awareness Week campaigns, Council officers participated in an asbestos awareness session

with officers from Workplace Health & Safety and the Department of Environment & Resource Management. Mr Harris said that about 50 people attended the session including council employees, tradesman from around the region, waste facility operators and QBuild staff.

"It was a very beneficial session with discussions relating to safe practices and methods of removing asbestos, identification of asbestos, along with transport and disposal requirements," Mr Harris said.

Council is alarmed at the increased level of disposal of asbestos and is warning homeowner's and tradesmen to ensure they comply with the requirements of asbestos disposal. Mr Harris warned that any asbestos needs to be properly wrapped in two layers of 0.2mm thick plastic in accordance with State Government standards before it will be accepted by Council at both landfills.

"Council will be taking an extremely hard line on this issue," he said.

"We want all individuals and companies to be aware of the requirements at the Warwick and Stanthorpe Waste Facilities and we've got security cameras around both facilities to ensure individuals are 'doing the right thing'.

"Council will also be taking action in relation to illegal dumping of asbestos, where maximum penalties can be up to \$16,500," Mr Harris said.

"Council's goal is to work with individuals and companies in relation to asbestos disposal, to ensure that the health and safety of all individuals is protected."

Workplace Health & Safety have available a booklet titled 'Asbestos - A home renovator's and tradesperson's guide for minor work in domestic buildings', which is available on their website at www.deir.qld.gov.au/workplace/index. Council also has copies of this booklet and strongly recommends that people read this information before undertaking any work.

It would have been hard to imagine a season or two back the likelihood of having four cricket matches washed out in the half season before Christmas, that is the situation

for the Allora "Foodworks" Cricket side as they struggle to secure competition points before turning in to the second round of Warwick Cricket Association fixtures commencing after New Year.


Yet again the Allora eleven where denied an opportunity at the wicket on Saturday after rain falls on Friday evening stretched across Saturday, and with similar conditions existing in Warwick, the WCA had little option but to cancel fixtures, deferring them until later in the season. This Saturday Allora can improve on their current eighth standing on the "Cool Solutions" Warwick Cricket Association premiership ladder with a win over country cousins Killarney at WCA headquarters, Slade Park.

The Allora side to play Killarney, the last match of 2010, is a mix of youth and experience. While Allora's player roster is quiet lengthy, some young up and coming players have been rewarded with a run after showing much appreciated club support in recent times, and some good form. The Allora eleven will include the third set of brothers to play in a game together. Young up and comers Alex and Nick Morris will don the Allora colours for the first time together, both better known for their junior rugby league exploits at club and representative levels. The Morris' follow Stuart & Cameron Masters, as well as Petersen brothers Andrew & Jared and more recently Jordon & Josh Henry, as brothers to have taken the field for Allora together. Both have played a game each this season and are
