Proposed Tourism Restructure for the Southern Downs

At its General Meeting held on 22 June 2010, the Council considered a confidential report recommending a proposed tourism structure for the Southern Downs region.

The Council resolved to give in principle support for the proposed structure as a model that will be used to undertake community consultation. As part of the community consultation process, Council is keen to receive feedback from key stakeholders, particularly in relation to the events component of the proposed structure, which still needs to be resolved. The report was delivered to existing recognized tourism bodies on Wednesday afternoon.

Mayor Ron Bellingham said "It is important to note that Council has not formally adopted a structure at this stage. The intention is to give key stakeholders and the community an opportunity to provide input into the final structure. It is intended to undertake workshops and other methods of consultation to ensure stakeholders and community views are considered by Council before a final model is adopted."

Mayor Bellingham indicated that the report focuses on the strategic structural challenges facing tourism and tourism bodies and the way Council supports them.

Over the next few weeks a number of consultations will be held across the region to discuss the proposal and address concerns with the aim of finding a workable solution. Existing tourism bodies will form a large part of this consultation, as well as public meetings for the community at large. Dates, times and locations will be released shortly.


Speed Zone Changes on Warwick-Allora Road

The Department of Transport and Main Roads will be changing and extending the locations of the speed signs on the Warwick - Allora Road this week.

The new zone will commence from the Warwick John Dee Bacon Factory, heading north through the rail underpass and bridge for approx another 500m.


To allow the smooth transition for motorists to travel through at the advised speeds, the current signs will reduce from 100km to 80km then reduce again to 60km prior to the curves, railway underpass, single lane bridge and further curves.

The Department is currently investigating ways to improve this location and through this process we have recognised that the current speed limit does not meet the Department's standards due to sight distance, visibility issues and the single lane stretch.





Obituary: Brian Smith

Born - Allora, 28th October 1930, Died - Allora, 2nd June 2010

Farmer; Rugby League Player and Official; Trucking Operator; Real Estate Agent; Business Man; Shire Councillor; Harness Horse Racing Owner.




If George Essex Evans noted Queensland Poet wrote in the same vein in a companion poem to his well known poem "Women of the West" entitled "Men of the West" he would have written a prototype of the life and all of Brian Smith. Evans resided in his early days in this country on a farm close to the Smith farm in the Goomburra Valley, Allora on the Darling Downs. In any such writing he would have exemplified the citizenship and leadership of Brian Smith based on nobleness of life, determination to succeed, respect for nature and humans, commitment to citizenship and assistance to the less fortunate members of society, a philosophy of getting on with life no matter what the obstacle and barrier and a strategy in setting in concrete today plans for the future and not swaying in the prevailing breeze of current popular opinion, realizing this may change on a daily basis. Such a person was Brian Smith. He inherited all these characteristics from his parents ,Brose and Girlie, whose respective families were pioneer settlers when Goomburra Station was made available for closer settlement in the late 1890's. Brose was not only a farmer but a contractor who owned grain threshing machinery and well boring equipment. He was renowned for his generosity in helping fellow farmers and new settlers in that he surpassed the well known Singer Sewing Machine terms of "Threepence down and threepence a week" and only requested payment, often many years late, when the person could afford to pay and contrary to modern practice he never charged interest. On several occasions he was known to refuse payment. Brian was "a chip" off his father's block and many would say he was a "big chip"-and it was not on account of his size- he was the genuine article.

With his sisters Lola, Marie, Judy and Barbara he attended the nearby Berat State School. He left school when he was 13 to assist on the family farm and learn about grain growing,

dairying, animal husbandry, and mechanics. He was an adept pupil on the farm as distinct from the school. For the latter he showed little fondness and much preferred getting up to mischief. On one occasion when an American Bomber made a forced landing on a field close to the school Brian encouraged others, including the writer to accompany him back to the school and raid the childrens lunches in the back room of the school away from the scrutiny of the teacher, The Berat ladies were renowned for their culinary skills. We sampled many lunches until the noise attracted the teacher's attention and were disciplined with "the cuts" and had to attend school there for the rest of the day. Brian was the only one of the troupe who thought that it was funny- and he got the "cuts" too.

Rugby League was his passion. He played for the Allora Rugby League Club from1946 to 1962 and was a selector, life member, delegate, and President and became foundation President in 1966 when Allora united with Clifton to form "Wattles".

He was selected as a member of The Allora Team of the Century and when the award was presented to him he was told by his mates that the only reason he played for so many years was that it was not uncommon for him to be on unfriendly terms with the referee and he would be advised his presence was no longer required on the field. At the presentation Brian declared that it was his duty to protect the "flashy backs" by administering discipline and medicine to the opposition. He was an expert in that activity.

After his wedding to Joyce Sheperd in 1949-his wife for 61 years- he gained further farming experience in Taroom and Theodore Districts and at the latter he regularly sparred with Australian Olympic Boxer Adrian Holmes. On his return to Allora he expanded the family farm and supplanted farm income in establishing a local and interstate transport business, The family consisted of Stephen, Greg, Chas, Nick, Norma, and Kellie and they absorbed the valuable lesson of the value and dignity of hard work from their parents.

As the years passed Brian became heavily involved with grain growing groups with a particular interest in soil conservation and a director of the local farmer's cooperative and served several terms as an elected Shire Councillor, where he bought not only experience but common sense and an uncanny ability to think ahead. Due to his intimate knowledge of the local farming and business areas his services were used in a Real Estate business where his emphasis was more on giving

Somewhere along the way he realized it was time to repay his enormous debt to his wife for her unremitting help to him and to be of some assistance to her in her love of Harness Horse racing, a sport in which she excelled and was the "Boss", She was good at the sport. Amongst the horses they raced was "Bistro Lady" which won over 50 races including the Townsville Cup and was judged Female of the year at Albion Park in 1998. All their horses were trained and driven by the Weideman sisters Julie and Lola based on mutual respect and trust. It was a mutually beneficial partnership.

For the last two and a half years he lived at Almerah Nursing Home at Allora. He accepted with dignity and tranquility his affliction and he was helped in these difficult times by the devotion and love of his wife who visited him each day and with her gentleness and compassion combined with her understanding allowed him to have the peace he so richly deserved.

As a mark of respect for him over 40 members and officials of "His Cllub", The Allora Football Club formed a "A Guard Of Honour" at the conclusion of the service at the Anglican Church Allora on Tuesday 8th June.

Allora's Past 100 years ago July 1910 Obituarv

Mrs. Rooney, a resident of Hendon, and relict of the late William John Rooney, died early yesterday morning. Her death marks the passing of yet another of our old inhabitants, as she and her late husband had resided in the district from the early days of its development up to the present day, the time of their arrival in Moreton Bay dating back to

the year 1864. The voyage was accomplished on the good ship Vernon and lasted no less than eight months. The Downs was made their first objective and remained their home to the end. The deceased reached the ripe old age of 77 years and leaves six sons, three daughters, 45 grandchildren and 17 great grandchildren.

Mysterious Fire

What can only be described as a clear and premeditated case of arson was committed sometime on Tuesday night by some person or persons unknown, the source of the outrage being Mrs. Williams' stationery and fancy goods shop which forms part of the complex called Holmes' Buildings on the Herbert and

> Drayton Street's corner. No less than three separate and distinct fires were lighted in the building which was only saved by the most strenuous exertions, and as a result of the promptitude of another of the tenants of Messrs. Holmes. One of the fires was kindled near the northern wall of Mrs. Williams' shop and burned through the dividing wall of Mr. Criticos' restaurant. Mr. Criticos worked like a Trojan to keep the fire in check while his assistant summonsed help. His efforts undoubtedly saved the block from utter destruction and saved a repetition of the disaster of February 1909.

> The whole affair at present is clouded in mystery and the likelihood at arriving at a solution to the mystery seems remote. An enquiry will be held in due course.





"Wattles Go Down to "Danes""


The Wattles "Toowoomba Farmer's Warehouse" "A" Grade side's season continued spiraling downwards on Sunday as they were defeated by a determined Pittsworth "Danes" outfit 42 - 12 at Pittsworth. The loss has seen Wattles tumble on to the bottom rung of the premiership ladder, a position held by the "Danes' themselves prior to Sunday's Toowoomba Rugby League Round 11 fixtures.

The injury racked "Warriors" now have a fortnight to rest players and allow some recovery of players with a weekend free of commitments coming up. This Sunday will see the T.R.L. mid-season Championships at Clive Berghofer Stadium. the highlight being the clash between competition joint leaders Dalby and Valleys with the prize the prestigious Madsen Rasmussen Trophy. Dalby & Valleys have shared the top rung of the ladder for virtually all of the first eleven weeks of the T.R.L. Premiership. Dalby recently suffered their sole defeat at the hands of Valleys, while the "Roosters" only loss came last weekend when they were surprisingly overcome by the Southern Suburbs "Tigers" 28 - 24, albeit with Valleys more notable stars absent. The 2010 President Cup finals will be fought out by Valleys and Newtown in both Reserve Grade and Under 18. As we turn into the second half of the T.R.L. season, Wattles "Railway Hotel, Allora" Reserve Grade side in tenth place on the premiership ladder and the "Allora Foodworks" Under 18 side are ninth place.

Wattles ran on to Pittsworth's home turf on Sunday with the notion in mind that a win over the lowly "Danes" could be a turning point in the season. Pittsworth served notice they were no pushovers scoring through hooker Travis Short after only six minutes, before tallying up twenty two points from four tries to lead 22 - 0 at half time. Wattles halfback Scott Murdoch scored in the first minute off the second half capitalizing on a Pittsworth handling error to have his side trailing 6 - 22. The "Danes" hit back with two touch downs to stretch their lead to 34 - 6, before Wattles back-rower Luke Baker scored after taking the ball on the blind side ten metres out and showing plenty of strength to bustle his way over the try line to have Wattles trailing 12 - 34. While Scott Murdoch collected his second Wattles "Player's Player" award for the season, Nick Colthup also shone for the "Warriors", as did big hard running threequarter Matt McCarthy, despite being dispatched to the sin bin in the 37th minute. McCarthy has consistently been one of Wattles leading lights in what is a very frustrating period for Wattles, the big centre commanding respect from all opponents. Winger Jake Smith, hooker Josh Johnstone and fullback Xavier Manley stood out with their efforts in a game where most of Wattles players were doubly up after having played Reserve Grad.

Pittsworth 42 (Tim Phipps 2, James Ellison 2, Travis Short 2, Matthew Reynolds, Mitchell Thompson tries; Brendan Smith 5 goals) defeated Wattles 12 (Scott Murdoch, Luke Baker tries; Brady Glass 2 goals).

In the Reserve Grade contest the "Railway Hotel, Allora" Wattles side were defeated 38 - 28, after trailing 16 - 22 at halftime. Pittsworth were first on the scoreboard after three minutes of play to lead 4 - 0. However Wattles responded through winger Kyle Hetherington to draw level. The "Warriors" snatched the lead with a brilliant try by Justin Van Der Poel that saw him gallop over 70 metres from a scrum win, Wattles then leading 10 – 4. Pittsworth retaliated to level the score again, and while fullback Jake Smith also touched down for Wattles, it was the "Danes" that went to the break leading 22 - 16. The "Danes" stretched their lead to 26 - 16 before Wattles front rower John Blaine scored a try to keep Wattles in touch with their opponents. With seven minutes remaining on the clock, Pittsworth were in a commanding position leading 38 - 22 before Justin Van Der Poel scored his second try of the game. Van Der Poel was in fine form for the "Warriors", underlining his ability as a player despite missing much of the early part of the season, while Luke Miller and Travis Williams were also among the "Warriors" best.
