Major milestone for Cunningham's Gap reconstruction

Hundreds of 10 metre soil nails have been driven beneath the road near the top of Cunningham's Gap as part of the \$40 million reconstruction program under Operation Queenslander. 450 soil nails out of a total of 700 have been used to stabilise a 100 metre long section of the east-bound lane up to six metres deep under the road, at a site 15 metres from the top of the Gap, to provide a solid and safe road base.

Main Roads Minister Craig Wallace said a chunk of the range had been excavated to give the crews installing the nails access under the road.

"This continues to be mammoth task but it's all about using these huge soil nails to reinforce the road foundation, creating a permanent and stable road for the many motorists who rely on this vital link each day," Mr Wallace said.


"Once the remaining 250 soil nails have been driven even deeper into the rock face beneath this section, we can rebuild the excavated site with rock fill and then rebuild the road."

Mr Wallace said the work at Cunningham's Gap was being delivered under the Natural Disaster Relief and Recovery Arrangements (NDRRA), a joint federal and state initiative.

"Under NDRRA, the Gillard Government provides 75 per cent of the funding, with 25 per cent from the Bligh Government," he said.

Mr Wallace said the work crew had completed this stage of works in record time, while causing as little disruption to road users as possible.

"When we're finished here, the road will be safer than it's ever





been before," he said.

"With 80 workers on site at the Gap, our contractor is committed to supporting local businesses – from the motels where workers are staying, to nearby service stations, trade suppliers and even the local pie shop," he said.

"Seven local jobs have been made available through the project, with further opportunities expected in the future."

There are 11 locations along a seven-kilometre-stretch of the highway requiring extensive work to repair damage from landslips and road subsidence from heavy rain. Four are underway, two are complete and two are set to start shortly. The remaining three sites are in detailed design and set to start within the next few months.

"Crews are working around the clock to deliver these essential works as quickly as possible, however safety is the department's number one priority," Mr Wallace said.

Restrictions are in place between the helipad and the top of the Gap on vehicles over 3.5 metres wide and/or over 26 metres long (excluding B-doubles) to allow the reconstruction work along the route to be carried out. Oversize vehicles are encouraged to take alternate routes.

Dear Editor.

The lives of 23 people are currently in limbo as Labor refuses to do anything to stop the spread of the potentially fatal Hendra

Labor is once again neglecting regional and rural Australia. Although the virus was first discovered in the Brisbane CBD, Hendra Virus has now spread to southern Queensland and northern New South Wales. The virus has killed four of the seven humans who have contracted it, half of whom were veterinarians.

Despite these deadly statistics, Labor has failed to meet the commitments outlined by the Coalition at the last election to protect our veterinarians and their staff who are at risk of being infected by the disease.

The Coalition committed to funding personal protection equipment for vets and their assistants which would have cost around \$100 each. This equipment would be particularly important for our private vets who work in the exclusion zones. The Coalition also committed to fast-tracking the Hendra Virus vaccine for horses, and cutting the red tape to ensure it is available in the field sooner rather than later. When the vaccine is available, we also need to make sure that horses attending events such as polocrosse, campdrafts or going to stud are vaccinated and that they have proof of their vaccination in the form of a microchip or similar technology. Finally, the monoclonal antibodies used to fight this disease must be made more freely available to the people who have been exposed to Hendra Virus. Currently, it is Queensland Health who decides which people receive the antibodies. We need to make sure those who have been in contact with the disease are involved in the decision-making process.

Labor must put human lives before bats and flying foxes. There are now 23 people waiting anxiously to find out if they have contracted the disease. What else has to happen before Labor will sit up and take notice?

Apply for Pensioner Rebate Subsidy Scheme by 15 July

Southern Downs Regional Council is reminding eligible pensioners that they must apply by 15 July 2011 to get the Pensioner Rebate Subsidy Scheme.

The Queensland Government's Pensioner Rate Subsidy Scheme provides a subsidy of 20 per cent (up to a maximum amount of \$200 each year) of the gross rates and charges levied by Council.

"If you already receive the rebate, but have moved since your last rate notice, you will need to re-apply," said CEO Rod

Otherwise pensioners who currently receive the rebate do not need to reapply.

Council administers the scheme and the Department of Communities reimburses the Council.

The recipient MUST hold a current State Government Pension Concession Card issued by Centrelink or a Repatriation Health Card for All Concessions (Gold Card) issued by Department of Veteran Affairs.

Change to commercial and industrial waste services

Businesses in the Southern Downs will no longer have their commercial and industrial waste service billed through Council after a decision by Southern Downs Regional councillors at June's General Meeting.

Mayor Ron Bellingham promised there will be no interruption to the service which is currently carried out by Council's waste contractors JJ Richards and Sons Pty Ltd.

"It will simply be that those businesses currently being billed through Council as of 1 July 2011 will become JJ Richards' customers," Cr Bellingham said.

"Or the business can choose to shop around and retain a different approved private waste collection provider either now or anytime in the future.

"They are under no obligation to stay with JJ Richards but all businesses in the defined waste collection area must have some type of approved waste collection service."

There are now several approved private contractors in the Southern Downs and many businesses have already taken the step to private contracting off their own bat, the Mayor added. He said it made sense for Council to step out of commercial and industrial waste collection now that there is market competition. Council understands that many people have found cost savings by going privately and this was obviously a factor in Council deciding to end its current service.

"Council originally provided this service to ensure local businesses had a commercial and industrial waste collection service," Cr Bellingham said.

"However in the last 12 months additional contractors have appeared in the market and we now feel that businesses will have more benefit dealing privately with contractors."

"Commercial and industrial waste collection is not really a core Council business, and it costs us to administer, so we felt this was the better way to go," he said.

Council will continue to provide Southern Downs residents with domestic waste and recycling services.

Cr Bellingham said it was important to note that from December 1, the State Government will be introducing a waste disposal levy on commercial and industrial waste going to landfill.

Council as the Waste Facility Operator is required to collect the waste disposal levy and pay the State the levy collected.

"We urge all businesses and industry to carefully consider their recycling and reuse of waste to help reduce any additional levies they are paying to the state, and of course, assist the environment," Cr Bellingham said.

Southern Downs RADF Program Secures Funding for 2011/12

Arts Minister Rachel Nolan announced the Southern Downs Regional Council has once again been successful in securing funds to run the Regional Arts Development Fund (RADF).

"This money, combined with Councils contribution helps support the arts and cultural industry within our Region and develops both emerging and professional artists", Cr Mally McMurtrie, Chair of the RADF Committee said.

"Council is very proud to administer the RADF program and we look forward to many new and exciting projects to fund over the coming 12 months".



C&I ratings categories to be unified across region

Southern Downs Regional councillors have agreed in principal to changes to the commercial and industrial (C&I) rating system to bring rates parity in this category across the region. The changes, which will not be confirmed until the 2011/2012 budget is adopted later this month, meaning businesses in Warwick will pay the same rate in the dollar as businesses in

"Council promised last year that we would equalise commercial and industrial rates across the region and we are on track to do that," Mayor Ron Bellingham said.

rates changes should be equal," Cr Bellingham said.

At this stage there is expected to be three Commercial & Industrial categories applying across the region in 2011/12 - a CBD category, a Town category and a Rural category - all of which apply where the dominant current or intended use for the land is for commercial or industrial purposes.

"Because of the huge commercial and industrial rate difference in the previous Stanthorpe and Warwick Shire rating systems, we chose when introducing a region wide differential rating system last year to phase in rates conformity for commercial and industrial categories over two years," Mayor Ron Bellingham

"So last year we introduced a Commercial and Industrial -Warwick category and a Commercial and Industrial – Stanthorpe category which started to bring the two former systems into line," he said.

"This year in line with recommendations from the Ratings Consultation Group we're finalising that transition by removing geographical distinction from the commercial and industrial categories for the 2011/12 budget." he said.

"This has been achieved with input from the business community, and the Rating Consultation Group, of which the presidents of both the Warwick and Stanthorpe Chambers of Commerce are members."

The C&I Rural category remains relatively unchanged.

The final minimum general rate and rate in the dollar for each category has not yet been decided and will be confirmed once the budget is adopted.

Under the proposed new Commercial and Industrial categories, there are 147 properties in the CBD category, 463 properties in the Town category, and 248 businesses in the Rural category across the Southern Downs.

Commercial and Industrial category descriptions:

Commercial and Industrial - CBD rating category - Applies to land currently used or intended to be predominantly used for commercial or industrial purposes. Includes properties located as follows:

- · In Warwick properties facing Palmerin Street that are located between Victoria and Percy Streets
- · In Stanthorpe properties facing High Street and Maryland Street, located between Davadi and Corundum Streets and the northern end of Carnarvon Bridge:

Commercial and Industrial - Town rating category - Applies on land located within the boundaries of Warwick, Morgan Park, Rosenthal Heights and Stanthorpe that is not rated under the CBD category:

Commercial and Industrial - Rural rating category - Applies to land used or intended to be used predominantly for commercial and industrial purposes that is not rated in the other two C&I categories.

Clarity brought to residential rating categories

Residential rating category definitions are expected to change when the 2011/12 Southern Downs Regional Council budget is

Previously, there were two residential categories - urban residential and rural residential.

"After introduction of the region wide differential rating system last financial year, Council found that there was a lack of clear definition between urban residential and rural residential blocks," CEO Rod Ferguson said. "So this year we've attempted to finetune residential categories to better define what is an urban property and what is not an urban property," Mr Ferguson explained.

"With advice from the Ratings Consultation Group, under the proposed new definitions there will simply be four residential categories defined by water service connections and land size

"It's based on the premise that an urban block consumes more services than a rural block." Where the dominant land usage is residential, properties will be rated in the following four categories:

Residential 1 - properties that are required to pay water access charges and are less than or equal to 4.047m2 in size:

Residential 2 - properties that are required to pay water access charges and are greater than 4,047m2 in size;

Residential 3 - properties that are not required to pay water access charges and are less than or equal to 4.4Ha in size;

Residential 4 - properties that are not required to pay water access charges and are greater than 4.4Ha in size.

These category changes are proposed to be adopted region wide, but will not be confirmed until the budget is adopted by Council later this month. Minimum general rates and the rate in the dollar for each category have not yet been decided.

AAA welcomes announcement that petrol will be exempt from Carbon Tax

The Australian Automobile Association (AAA), representing eight constituent clubs with a combined total of almost seven million members, welcomed the Prime Minister's announcement that a carbon tax will not be applied to petrol. AAA have

advocated with comprehensive policies for a number of years that motorists should not be worse off under a carbon tax or emissions trading scheme, and hails this announcement as a major win for motorists.

Greg Goodman, AAA's Acting Executive Director, stated, "We are very glad that the Government has listened and that our efforts have borne fruit. This is a wonderful result for our clubs' members and the motoring

AAA is also pleased that the policy is permanent, and will still apply when the transition to an emissions trading scheme occurs. As only eight per cent of Australia's greenhouse gas emissions come from passenger vehicles, and many people have no public transport options to travel to work, do their shopping or drop their children off at school, a carbon tax on petrol would have been an unfair impost on struggling families. Mr Goodman added, "There are better ways of reducing carbon emissions from passenger vehicles than imposing a new tax on motorists, who already pay more than their fair share of taxes




Chart: Definition of proposed Southern Downs Residential Rating Categories

in fuel excise. Before the last election the Government announced ambitious carbon emission standards for vehicles manufactured in Australia, and there are other means to reduce carbon emissions from driving such as promoting efficient driving techniques, and adoption of alternative fuels and vehicles."

While AAA welcomes this announcement, clarity is sought on whether other motoring fuels such as diesel, LPG and ethanol will also be exempt from the carbon tax.
