

Almost 3,000 citizens want chaplaincy program to continue

Almost 3000 people have sent a message to the Rudd Government: Commit to keeping the National School Chaplaincy Program going.

Last week in Parliament, Federal LNP Member for Maranoa Bruce Scott presented a petition with 2,964 signatures that called for the Federal Labor Government to continue funding the National School Chaplaincy Program beyond 2011, and at its current level of \$165 million over three years.


When speaking in Parliament, Mr Scott said the program had been very popular in Maranoa, and the petition had received a positive response.

"The National School Chaplaincy Program has been an enormously popular program across the nation and it has certainly been embraced in my electorate of Maranoa. In fact, we had an overwhelming response to this petition with some 2,964 signatures. This is the second highest number of signatures received on a petition that I have presented on behalf of my constituents in Maranoa," Mr Scott told the Parliament.

"I would like to take this opportunity to thank the many church leaders and groups in my electorate - schools, individuals and families - who signed this petition and passed it around their communities.

"I call on this Labor Government to take notice of this petition and I hope that they will heed the message from these almost 3,000 people and continue funding this very important and essential program in its current form," he said.

Mr Scott also said that the Coalition has already promised that, should it be elected, it would continue funding the program beyond 2011 in its current form.

Dave's Delectable Dish...

Lamb Chops with Feta, Tomato and Asparagus

8 -12 lamb chops or cutlets

2 bunch asparagus, trimmed

2 tbsp olive oil

2 tbsp lemon juice

12 cherry tomatoes, quartered

¹/₃ cup of crumbled feta cheese

wedges of lemon, new potatoes and green salad to serve

Place the lamb chops and asparagus in 2 separate dishes; pour the combined olive oil and lemon juice over both. Season with salt and pepper.

Preheat the barbecue flat-plate or char-grill plate to hot before adding the lamb.

Cook on one side until the first sign of moisture appears. Cook lamb chops for 3-4 minutes on each side for medium or until done to your liking. Turn lamb once only. Test the lamb for degree of doneness with tongs. Rare is soft, medium feels springy and well done is very firm.

Remove lamb from heat, loosely cover with foil and rest lamb for 2 minutes before serving. While the lamb is cooking, add the asparagus to the barbecue and cook for 4-5 minutes until golden and tender. To serve place the lamb and asparagus on plates, scatter the cherry tomatoes and feta over the top.

- When you barbecue don't turn the meat too often, the rule is - turn meat once only. Use tongs never a barbecue fork to turn the meat, piercing the meat with the fork will drain the juices from the meat onto the grill or barbecue plate.
- Best lamb cuts for barbecuing: lamb eye of loin/backstrap, tenderloin/fillet, loin chops, chump chops, cutlets, lamb steaks (round or topside).

Allora's Past 100 years ago June 1910 Allora State School Removal to be Accomplished

The following letter addressed to Mr. Francis Grayson M. L. A., and which has been handed to us for publication by that gentleman, cannot fail to be of interest:

With reference to previous correspondence on the subject, I have the honour to inform you that the Minister's approval of the erection of new State school buildings in Allora on the new site of 5 acres 6 perches, and that the Works Department has been requested to take the necessary action in the matter.

The estimated cost is as follows, new school building £1,020; asphalting £95; new residence £488; fencing £360; total £1,963. The erection of the new buildings will depend on the expenditure being approved by Executive Council. The present site will be surrendered to the Crown for sale by public auction when it is no longer needed for school purposes and the present school buildings will be sold. I have the honour to be, Sir,

New State School

Pursuant to the letter recently received from the Education Department by Mr. Francis Grayson M. L. A., and published in the Guardian, tenders are invited by the Works Department for the erection of a new State school building in Allora, on the site adjoining the Recreation Reserve.

Peculiar Accident

An unusual happening took place on Monday last. An employee of Mr. W. Clarke was driving three horses in a cart and was engaged in collecting the cream from the Forest Plain district for conveyal to the Allora butter factory. On the road near Abernethy's a stoppage was made for the purpose of picking up a cream can. One horse commenced to kick, another joined in, and finally the whole team bolted. After knocking down several posts in the fence alongside the road in its wild progress, the cart capsized and two of the horses freed themselves. The animal which had remained attached to the cart dropped dead and a second horse died a few hours later. An examination by a veterinary surgeon revealed the fact that the first horse had died from a rupture of the heart, and it is believed that exhaustion was supposed for the death of the second. It was rather a sensational happening and one attended with considerable monetary loss to Mr. Clarke.

Australians avoid flu shot over fears it will make them sick

Nearly one in five Australians will not get the flu shot this year, because they incorrectly believe it will give them the flu according to the GlaxoSmithKline (GSK) Health Index released this week.

The latest GSK Health Index surveyed 1006 Australians investigating their attitudes and behaviours regarding flu and found Australians are not only skipping the shot because they incorrectly think they can get the flu from it, but 40% don't see it as a priority, and 38% don't believe in the flu shot.

"This is one of the most common myths associated with the flu shot," said Dr Camilla Chong, Medical Director at GSK. "The fact is you cannot get influenza from the flu shot because the virus contained in it cannot cause infection."

"The mild flu-like symptoms people experience after a flu shot (such as some soreness and redness at the site and mild fever or aches) are, in fact, the signs that your body is hard at work mounting a response to protect you against the influenza virus." she said.

The survey also found men could be left out in the cold this winter with one in five women admitting they are prepared to kick their partner out of bed if they have the flu. 73% of Australian women are likely to avoid kissing if they have the flu and 61% avoid intimacy. Men reported avoidance rates of 63% for kissing and 47% for intimacy.

These results suggest women may be more pro-active in taking steps to reduce the likelihood of spreading the flu virus. This is particularly important in the first two to three days after flu symptoms first appear because this when the virus is most contagious.

Survey finds Darling Downs continue to amass high-energy appliances

Queenslanders are making inroads into cutting their energy use, but according to a major new survey, comfort and lifestyle factors are still winning out in the battle to save electricity.

New research shows 20 percent of regional Queensland residential customers say they have tried to reduce their household energy use after receiving bill comparison information with their electricity bill.

However the state-wide Household Energy Survey conducted by research firm Colmar Brunton for energy companies Ergon Energy, Powerlink Queensland and Energex shows Queenslanders face a major challenge if electricity use is going to be reduced significantly.

The Household Energy Survey found Darling Downs householders are among the most likely in the State to ensure they have the best tariff option, take shorter showers, switch to energy efficient light bulbs, hang the washing on the line and pay more for energy efficient appliances to cut electricity costs and consumption.

The Ergon Energy survey found 62 percent of Darling Downs households have air conditioning (compared to 74 percent of homes across the state), with 1.6 split systems per house. A further 25 percent plan to buy an air conditioner within the next five years. It found 41 percent of air conditioned Darling Downs homes have an air conditioning unit in the master bedroom and 45 percent run it overnight. The survey also found:

- 34 percent of Darling Downs householders set their air conditioners to the most efficient temperature all or most of the time.
- 20 percent of Darling Downs homes have no insulation and 8 percent of householders don't know if their home has insulation or not.
- · 32 percent of Darling Downs households have energy-saving

bulbs in all lights and 38 percent plan to get CFL bulbs in all lights.

- One in five Darling Downs householders believe they already use electricity as efficiently as possible.
- One in five Queenslanders want more information to understand what peak demand and electricity tariffs are and how to manage use and save money.

Ergon Energy Manager Regional Services Dave Heberlein said: "Queenslanders are taking up energy-consuming appliances at a faster rate than taking up energy-saving appliances. They are using them in peak times more than half of the time and have a low willingness to change their behaviour.

"This means the peak demand use could worsen quite significantly unless major change occurs amongst Queensland households."

Save money while staying warm this winter

With plummeting temperatures heralding winter's arrival in South West Queensland, Ergon Energy is urging its customers to think smart to keep warm and save money.

• Use your common sense. If an offer, scheme or sale seems too good to be true then it probably is.

energy and for fire safety:

- using an old-fashioned door runner to reduce draughts and keep the heat in;
- lowering heater settings. For every degree in the 15 to 21 degree range that you lower the setting on your heater, you save about five per cent on heating costs.

Mr Heberlein said when it came to buying heaters, it was important to consider options before making a quick decision. "Bar radiators are great for instant heat directed at concentrated areas, but may not be suited to heating entire rooms," he said. "Heaters with thermostats need to match to the size of the area to be heated. If they are too small for the room, they will run constantly and cost you money.



- Be wary of emails, phone calls or SMS messages from unknown sources asking you to update, validate or confirm your account details, password or personal information.
- Be careful about what information you disclose about yourself and others online.
- Make sure you have a back-up plan. It is a wise idea to keep a backup copy of all you important online information in case anything goes wrong.
- Change passwords at least twice a year. Passwords should be completely random and unique, but still memorable. Try using numbers and letters.
- Be careful about talking to people you meet online. Not everyone is who they say they are.
- Ward off viruses. Install an antivirus program on your computer and keep it up to date.
- Think before you click on links or attachments from unknown sources.

Remember your pets as the big chill hits

- · Make sure your pet has somewhere warm to sleep, free of drafts and protected from the elements.
- It is best not to leave your pet outside when the temperature drops, especially dogs with short-hair, older dogs and puppies. If possible try to find them somewhere cosy to sleep indoors for the winter months.
- · Just like humans, pets with arthritis can find their condition playing up at this time of year. If your pet seems to be having trouble climbing stairs, standing or sitting, it might be worth visiting the vet as they can advise you about treatments available.
- · During the colder months some pets are likely to need more food as they burn more energy to stay warm, particularly dogs with short coats.
- · If your dog is in a kennel outside make sure it has plenty of bedding and that the entrance to the kennel faces away from
- · If it gets really cold it's important to remember to ensure that pets have clean unfrozen water available at times.
- · Bad weather and shorter days can make regularly exercising your dog more difficult but it's important keep this up throughout the winter months.
