Stay safe around electricity this

winter

With autumn gone and winter under way, Ergon Energy is urging customers to stay safe during the cooler months. General Manager Service Delivery Southern Paul Jordon said

that as temperatures began to fall, the use of heaters and electric blankets began to rise.

"Electric blankets spend much of their lives in storage and can be easily damaged," Mr Jordon said.

"Always store them flat and check carefully before use. If there are signs of misuse or damage, have it checked by a licensed electrical contractor.

"When the temperature drops, it's tempting to sit too close to the electric heater or to place it in the bathroom on cold morninas.

"But both practices can be risky particularly if the electric heater is placed near a bath or on a wet floor. Water conducts electricity and the two can be lethal when combined."

Mr Jordon said inappropriately using electric heaters to dry damp clothes was also risky.

"Clothes, especially synthetic materials, can catch fire if placed too close to electric heaters. You need to also be careful in placing bar heaters on or near combustible materials such as drapes and carpets.

Mr Jordon said avoiding tragedy was a simple matter of following basic safety procedures such as:

· Don't touch anything electrical with wet hands.

· Don't use electrical appliances such as hair dryers around wet

places like baths or basins containing water.

- · Use only bathroom heaters specially designed for bathroom use
- · Checking all appliances which have not been used for some time, particularly electric blankets. Exposed elements, perished, stiff or damaged connections on the flexible cord or plug top and any other visual defects should be inspected by licensed electricians before use.
- · Don't overload circuits with too many heating appliances. This can cause damage to wiring, plugs and electrical circuitry.
- · Don't pile items such as suitcases or piles of clothes on beds with electric blankets switched on. Trapped heat in such circumstances can cause fires.

Mr Jordon also urged householders to consider installing safety switches to further protect against fatal accidents.

"Safety switches can save lives by cutting off power instantaneously in the event of an electrical fault with an appliance or power tool, amateur electrical work, or a curious child." he said.



Allora's Past 75 years ago June 1936

Allora Estate Finalized

Probate has been granted in the will of the late Mrs. Sarah Eleanor Clarke of Allora, licensed victualler, who died at Allora on July 2nd 1935. The gross value of the estate was sworn at £3,029 realty and £758 personalty.

The late Mrs. Clarke was, at the time of her death, the proprietor of the Princess of Wales Hotel in Raff Street, Allora. Except for an eighteen month period 1885/86, the hotel has been in the hands of the one family since 1864. The original hotel was built by the late Mr. Samuel Gordon, an early pioneer of Allora, and the present building was erected in 1915 on the site of the original structure by the late Mrs. Clarke whose father was the original licensee. Miss Minnie G. Clarke, a daughter of the late Mrs. S. E. Clarke, is the current holder of the license, making in all, three generations in the hotel.

The study focuses on the risk of flooding in the towns of Allora, Warwick, Killarney, Yangan, Emu Vale, Tannymorel and Pratten, as well as rural areas along the floodplain.

"Our goal is to develop computer flood models of the Condamine River flood plain and quantify and map flood risks in study area," said Adam Colrain, Southern Downs Regional Council's manager design and assets.

"This should help to reduce community vulnerability to flooding and raise awareness of flooding risks," Mr Colrain added.

The study team is seeking to liaise with the community throughout the study to ensure the most accurate and relevant information is obtained and used.

The study was commissioned in August 2010, with contractors Sinclair Knight Merz (SKM) but was delayed by the December 2010 and January 2011 flood events and a delay in aerial surveying.

Mr. E. M. Lilley K. C.

News was received by Mr. W. J. Lilley, solicitor, of Allora, on Thursday morning of the death of his brother Mr. E. M. Lilley K. C., the said event taking place on the night before. The cause of death was heart failure. The late Mr. Lilley was a brilliant and hard working barrister, and estimable citizen, and a gentleman who in every way lent additional lustre to a name already famous in at annals of Queensland. The deceased was born in 1859 and was the eldest son of the late Sir Charles Lilley, former Premier of Queensland and Chief Justice of the Supreme Court.

Mr. Henry Black

One of our oldest and most esteemed residents passed away on Thursday night at Goomburra. We refer to Mr. Henry Black who had reached the ripe old age of 81 years, and could claim over 58 years in Queensland, most of which was spent in this district. He has thus been associated with this State from the old pioneering days, at which time he played a doughty part amidst the trials and privations inseparable from the life of a pioneer. He arrived here about 1852, a year after his marriage, and his first child, the late Mrs. J. Dougall, was born on board the ship by which he travelled from the old country. He was of remarkably good constitution and bore the burden of increasing years splendidly till of late, when he failed steadily. He leaves a large family of children, grandchildren and great grandchildren to mourn his passing, numbering amongst them many of our most estimable and respected residents. The funeral will leave his old home at 10 a.m. this morning for the Allora cemetery.



Warriors Smell a Win Against Lions

After their mighty 32 - 16 victory over neighbouring Downs country club the Pittsworth "Danes" at Platz Oval almost two weeks back. Wattles are stepping high as they roll in to this weekend when they take on the Newtown "Lions" at Newtown's Hursley Road ground. The Pittsworth conquest was particularly noteworthy, given the "Danes" were camped in fourth place on the Toowoomba Rugby League premiership ladder.

Wattles McMillan trust of mentors Glen & Russell McMillan have no doubt that their "National Farmer's Warehouse" Wattles side, that showed a dramatic form reversal in their last outing after Pittsworth's first round 44 - 4 annihilation of the Warriors, can deal out a similar punishment to the "Lions".

Rugged back rower Matt McCarthy returns to Wattles pack after missing the Pittsworth match with injury, his contribution vital as he sets the example for his fellow forwards and ignites some Newtown tempers. The 183 cm, 100 kg McCarthy was in sensational form until a head clash saw him forced to leave the field against Dalby two starts back, Coach McMillan confident his fiery second-rower will be a crucial factor against the "Lions".

Wattles "Railway Hotel, Allora" reserve graders can continue there charge for a top five slot given they are sitting middle of the ladder and the "Lions" are struggling in last place. Hooker Josh McIntosh has been in outstanding form of late and will again prove a key factor in what should be a Wattles success. Coach Wally McIntosh will be looking to his big forwards Lee Lousick and Carl Gale to gouge a path through the Newtown defence in Sunday's Under 18 match. The big men, both of whom have played first grade this year, are to be respected in any company. Anthony McIntosh will no doubt improve on his season points total of 168 points with his explosive speed resulting any many points for the "Warriors" this season. Halfback Michael Duggan was in superb touch last week, and aside from winning his side's man of the match honours, the little man with the big heart and ability to match earned a run in
