

Les Bland Football Pioneer

The Warwick & District Football Association celebrated a significant milestone in their 25th anniversary on June 11th with a reunion dinner and weekend of commemorative activities. However, many may not have been aware that 86 year old Homestead Aged Person's Hostel resident in Allora, Les Bland had more than a passing involvement with football in this area. Recently a contingent of Allora based Warwick players donned the club colours to spend time with Les and get a feel for what it was like in the World game's formative years around Warwick. Mr. Bland certainly got a thrill to meet Dominic Benz, Cameron Davey and Sam Benz resplendent in their Warwick Wolves playing gear. He was presented with a club cap, and is a happy man he still has some touch with the wonderful organisation that is Warwick Football. He relived some of his moments and recollections about those early days when football battled for recognition in a town heavily focused on rugby league.

But to borrow a phrase, "if you built it they will come", and come they did. Players of all ages keen to be involved in the newly formed football club, or soccer as it was more commonly known.

The former World War II RAAF serviceman relocated from Sydney to Warwick with his wife and family, working at the Horse & Jockey Hotel until retirement. Les was a well known name in the history of Warwick football. After formerly coaching the Caringbah "Rangers" in Sydney, he became heavily involved locally in the sport. He initially coached in Warwick in 1970, with many young players benefiting from his experience,



and helping the Warwick club make the initial steps into competition soccer. He and his Sydney teams were fortunate enough to have access to the influence of former Polish

International and Sydney based Development Official, Leo Baumgartner. Baumgartner first came to Australia with FK Austria from Vienna in 1957. A year later he was back in Sydney having agreed to join the Prague club. He represented the new generation of highly skilled continental European migrants who were to dominate the game in the next twenty years. He played his first representative game for the Australian national team in 1964 against Everton. Australian football legend Johnny Warren said of Baumgartner that the game he brought to Australia was the modern passing game with the ball kept on the deck as much as possible. He always adhered to that philosophy, and he has been a key figure in the transformation of the code in this country.

Such was the calibre of coaching experience in the circles that Les Bland moved in his days coaching in NSW, knowledge and experience he brought to Warwick. Sydney boasted over 40,000 junior

players, with Les' area, the Sutherland Shire having over 4000 players, more than all other football codes combined at the

Les is very proud of the advancement of football locally, the development of a junior body overflowing with young players to take the game ahead. But he is also particularly proud of the contribution Allora has made to local football, and the fact for Allora based and raised players in Robbie and Cameron

Queensland Health is warning people to be aware of potential hoax callers requesting donations claiming to be from BreastScreen Australia.

Chief Health Officer Dr Jeannette Young said Queensland Health had received reports of a hoax caller asking for donations to raise money for women who needed accommodation while having treatment for breast cancer.

"The callers are making false claims they are ringing on behalf of BreastScreen Australia," Dr Young said.

"Neither BreastScreen Australia or BreastScreen Queensland depend on donations from the public for any services they provide, nor as government agencies are they involved in charitable organisations seeking donations.

"I urge people not to donate money or give out their bank details to people requesting donations by phone or letter.

"People should always be wary of anyone ringing and asking for bank details for any type of healthcare or charity."

Queensland Health's BreastScreen Queensland Program is part of the BreastScreen Australia Program and provides women over 50 with free, high-quality, evidence-based breast cancer screening. Women in their 40s and over 70 are also eligible to attend.

Women can ring 13 20 50 to make a booking for a Breastscreen.



The Allora Showground's can boast the doyen of Queensland Sheepdog talent over this weekend, with dogs of kelpie & border collie extraction in numbers along with over fifty handlers/trainers battling it out in the 2011 Queensland Sheepdog Championships. The handlers and dogs attending are among the most talented in Australia. showing their wares in 300 runs across the three days of the Championships commencing at 7.00 am tomorrow.

Considered Australia's best currently, handler Greg Prince from Dubbo will be in centre ring over the three days of the Championships, defending the State title he won last year in Charleville.

Yangan handler Geoff Gibson will have his dog, "Charlie's Dusty" in Allora, the exceptional performer that is "Dog of the Year" in Queensland in 2011.

Judges for the blue ribbon event are Gary Barker of Glen Innes, Oakey's Roy Potticary and Gary Milgate of Yangan. Judging the Novice section of the Championships, Mr. Milgate has officiated previously at State level, and has competed and won at State Championship level. Since becoming involved in training sheepdogs in 1982, Mr. Milgate has gone on to win two Queensland titles in 2007 & 2008. In addition to these honours, he is the only Queensland resident to have won consecutive titles, and the first in forty years to win with his favoured breed, the kelpie.

He will travel to New Zealand this year as Judge/Manager of the Australian side for the annual series against the "Kiwis" at Auckland. The long standing respected judge also officiated in an Australia/New Zealand televised challenge back in 1990.

New Zealand will return to Australia next year for the annual Trans Tasman series for the Wayleggo Cup. The Wayleggo Cup was first presented by the New Zealand Sheep Dog Trial Association in 1994 for the Trans Tasman competition. The New Zealanders currently hold the bragging rights after defeating the Aussies last year at Port Fairy in Victoria, after being defeated themselves on home soil at Taupo in 2009. The Aussies have won the prestigious award on eleven occasions to the Kiwis total of fourteen titles.

Financing the tours is a significant impost on the Australian Sheepdog Worker's Association, "we are a not for profit organisation, and costs are high to arrange and transport sheep to events, so we could use some sponsorship opportunities" commented Mr. Milgate. Allora's State level event this weekend will require almost 500 local sheep.



Memories of Old Talgai

Dick Mills records his memories of Old Talgai from 1920 when he arrived there with his parents and sister.

"My father E. N. Mills was sent to manage Old Talgai for the owners Messrs. M. F. and R. C. Ramsay who were by that time resident in England. The property at that time consisted of approximately 3,500 acres which stretched for about five miles on the west bank of the Condamine River.

The old homestead was a large L shaped structure having about 6 fairly large rooms and was located about 1/4 mile from the river on the eastern slopes of a steep gravel ridge. There was a wide open verandah all round with the exception of the western side which was

partially closed in. The verandah was 10 to 12 feet above the ground on the bottom side but the low part was at ground level and presented an easy target for white ants which contributed to the final demolition of the old house.

A large detached building housed a very large kitchen with perhaps the largest cooking range that I can remember seeing in a private house, a large pantry and gauzed-in meat and milk rooms. This building also contained three rooms to house female staff.

The out buildings were numerous and substantial. Away to the front of the house were a large havshed and a complex of buildings, comprising barn, buggy and cart sheds, milking shed, horse stables and feed rooms, harness rooms and associated yards, carpenter's shop and close by, a worker's cottage. Quite close to the western side of the homestead was a large shed believed to have been the station store, and a little further to the rear was a building built of slabs which housed the office. accommodation room and a large laundry.

Further away from the house were worker's cottages, well built butcher's shop, a comprehensive set of cattle yards with a well designed slaughter house and ancillary buildings. Close by was a large shearing shed, perhaps about 16 stands or so if it had been run to full capacity. The most shearers that I can remember was perhaps about four, with all shearing done by blade shears. In the shed was a huge, and I would say cumbersome, wool press operated by a lever mechanism. There was also an elaborate wool loading ramp for loading the

bales of wool on wagons for transport to rail.

Furtherest from the homestead were two large buildings known as the shearer's guarters, designed to accommodate a considerable team of shearers and shed hands. One was primarily for cooking and dining, the other for sleeping accommodation.

There had been a considerable garden and orchard; trees of note were a holly and a walnut. There were many others, probably some exotic types if I had known what they were. My first impression of the garden was that it was inhabited with kangaroo rats, goannas, wasps and snakes. We apparently caught the last fleeting glances of kangaroo rats because cannot remember them after out initial settling in.

When we first went to Old Talgai there were no motor vehicles associated with the property. All carting was done by horse with spring cart or dray. All agricultural work was by horse pulled implements. Soon motor cars were to appear and some of the workers procured motorbikes.

In 1922 the homestead portion of the property comprising of about 900 acres was bought by Mr. Malcolm Livingstone. My father moved to manage the share dairy farm portion of the property. We lived in the renovated dairy farm house, and in 1928 my father bought the property and named it "Eagle's Nest". I lived and worked on "Eagle's Nest" until 1972 when it was sold to Mr. Tom Duggan, a well known Downs identity. Old Talgai homestead was finally demolished in 1952".

Rabbit Issue Heating Up

The Darling Downs - Moreton Rabbit Board (DDMRB) was established in 1964 through the amalgamation of two remaining district rabbit boards. The DDMRB is the only pest operational board under the Land Protection (Pest & Stock Route Management) Regulation 2003 and has two key functions. The board is responsible for maintaining the 555 km rabbit fence, which runs from Mt Gipps in the Lamington National Park to Goombi, West of Chinchilla where it joins the Wild Dog Barrier Fence, as well as assisting landowners within a 28,000 km2 area (7 million acres) of South East Queensland to keep their land free of rabbit infestations. The Board has been replacing up to eighteen kilometres of fence per year over the last few years, at a cost of approximately \$20,000 per kilometre.

With reported sightings of rabbits by residents and landholders within the Southern Downs Regional Council area on the increase, it is timely to commence a new program to assist landowners to destroy rabbit harbour and to reduce fire hazards. The DDMRB has recently appointed Paul Morrish as the Liaison Officer to identify and co-ordinate the reduction of ground harbour where rabbits are known to be living.

It is apparent that this program can benefit the DDMRB, landholders and the Rural Fire Brigades via the reduction of fire hazards and rabbit harbour. This opportunity for fire teams to participate in field training while assisting landholders to eliminate fire hazards and pest animal harbour would also be invaluable to all parties.

One of the many goals for this program is to reduce the fuel load of ground timber and log piles, with assistance from your local Fire Warden and the Rural Fire Brigades. The current

weather conditions are offering a stable environment in which to extend this program into Allora, Dalveen, Pratten, Killarney and Wildash or where rabbits are known to exist. Burns have already been undertaken in the Bony Mountain district with the involvement from the Bony Mountain - Pratten Rural Fire Brigade volunteers. These joint exercises will also assist the DDMRB to re-assess the full extent of the spread of rabbits, as a class 2 declared pest throughout the regional area. A key element for the success of the program is to identify and report rabbit sightings, therefore achieving an effective eradication

program. Any isolated areas of high rabbit populations that may exist will be targeted as a first and high priority for maintaining

This program is being offered over a four month window to fit in with the safest burning period, within the Southern Downs Regional Council area. If the program is deemed successful by the Board, it may be extended to other local authority districts within the board's operational area.

Discussions have taken place with Qld Rail and Main Roads over the last few weeks, with co-operation being shown from both parties to commence reduction of rabbit harbours within their jurisdictions. Roadside harbours will also be targeted with the assistance of the Southern Downs Regional Council, who will provide water trucks and graders where required to assist with controlled burns.

The burning of rabbit harbour in the Massie, Wildash, Killarney, Warwick, Dalveen and Thane area is scheduled to take place over the next few weeks. It is imperative that all landholders and residents be involved with the program over the next few

Southern Downs Regional Council is urging land owners to get

their copy of the third edition of 'Weeds of Southern Queensland'.

The long-awaited update published by the Weed Society of Queensland and sponsored by Regional Councils of Southern Queensland is now available after being officially launched by the Honourable Mike Horan earlier this month.

It is now available for free from Council offices.

Ken Harris, Council's Director of Planning & Environment, said Council fully supports the publication and distribution of this booklet.

"It's an invaluable tool to help people identify problem declared plants," Mr Harris said.

Weed Society President Rachel McFadyen said the publication had pictures and identifying information for 132 common weeds of southern Queensland, with information on their management including the herbicides registered for use.

"This update contains information on more weeds, and caters for a wider audience including farmers, contractors, service providers and peri-urban dwellers," Dr McFadyen said.

"Previous editions of this book were so popular that they sold out long ago, and more than 90% of the 60,000 copies of this current edition were sold prior to printing."

Dr McFadyen said the *Weeds of Southern Queensland* publication had been the first port-of-call for basic and practical weed identification and management information for land managers from all backgrounds since 1996.

"This new edition will be invaluable to everyone working to manage weeds."

The book has been developed by a working group of Weed Society of Queensland members with a great depth of weed management experience across Southern Queensland. They represent local government, state government agencies, research and development companies and regional natural resource management bodies.

Weeds of all types are covered including woody weeds, cacti and succulents, vines, groundcover and herbs, grasses, and aquatics. There is an extensive section on weed management techniques and weed hygiene. Declared weeds are listed, together with a page on landholder obligations for control of these Class 1. Class 2 or Class 3 weeds.



- 2. The chief executive has decided the announced entitlement for water licences taking subartesian water in the area for the water year 1 July 2011 to 30 June 2012 (the "water year") in accordance with the water sharing rules for the area mentioned in schedule 10 of the Regulation
- 3. The **announced entitlement** for each part of the area for the water year is as follows:
- a. Sub-area 1 100% of the nominal entitlement on each water licence
- h. Sub-area 2 100% of the nominal entitlement on each water licence
- c. Sub-area 3 80% of the nominal entitlement on each water licence. d. Sub-area Urban - 100% of the nominal entitlement on each water licence
- 4. The annual entitlement that may be taken for the water year under a water licence in the area is the nominal entitlement for the water licence multiplied by the announced entitlement mentioned in clause 3 and adjusted for any carry over that
- 5. The taking of water under a water licence in excess of the annual entitlement mentioned in clause 4 is an offence under section 808(1) of the Water Act 2000 and renders a person liable for a maximum penalty of 1665 penalty units (\$166,500).

Wattles Roll On Winning in Scheid's

Sunday's Wattles verses Gatton first grade Toowoomba Rugby League fixture was billed as a "clash of the titans", and it measured up in every way, Platz Oval supporters thrilled with the "National Farmer's Warehouse" Warriors finishing ahead at

The match, another in a steady line of conquests as Wattles keep marching on, Sunday's win their fifth from their last six outings, all occurring since the McMillan brothers Glen and Russell took over the coaching helm back in early May.

The gutsy win was an ideal result for stalwart workaholic lock forward Aaron Scheid to celebrate his 75th first grade match for Wattles.

Glen McMillan sang the praises for his side loud and long at the post match presentations, and while all in his 17 man line up deserve a bucket of that praise, the efforts of Matt McCarthy

were sensational. The star studded Gatton side boasting players with NRL and State League experience had their hands full throughout as McCarthy regularly launched himself into the "Hawks" defensive line. His ability to hit the line and roll in tackles, along with his strength to be able to stand and offload has him marked as one of the Toowoomba competitions leading forwards. Wattles pack did all that was asked of them, the engine room troop of Scheid. Glen McMillan, Luke Baker, Matt McCarthy and the front row of Ashley Evans, Jason Nightingale, Brady Glass and Liam Ross paved the way for the "Green & Golds" outstanding halves of Rob Woodbridge and Jeff Nielsen to create the point scoring opportunities.

The "Hawks" got there ginger up to be the first to score through their former Wynnum-Manly five-eighth Denny Lambert in the 18th minute after both sides tested themselves with some grandstand shaking defence in the opening stages. The Justin Van Der Poel tackle on opposite flanker Jason Bilich will go down as one of the great tackles executed on the turf of Platz

Lambert, 2004 QRL Queensland Cup "Player of the Year", was a constant danger for Wattles, his playmaking and organisational ability will above average. He had his side appearing on the verge of another try in the north east corner of Platz Oval seven minutes later, when the tide suddenly turned for Wattles, their

winger Van Der Poel intercepting and racing 80 metres to score. The try sparked the Warriors into action, five eighth Jeff Nielsen holding up a pass before stepping right fifteen metres out and feeding back-rower Luke Baker who scored. Nielsen also touched down six minutes later after bursting through from the scrum base for Wattles, and along with front-rower Brady Glass' three goals from three attempts in the first half, had the home side leading 18-6 at the break.

Gatton found another gear after half time, and a try by former Ipswich Queensland Cup fullback Aaron Werth in the 55th minute could well have been a turning point in the game, after a twenty metre charge to Wattles quarter line by big front-rower Lachlan Hauser. Hauser lost the ball after being felled in a tackle, but when Werth scooped up the loose pill Referee Peter Towser ruled play on resulting in a vital "Hawks" try. Not to be outdone, the magic of "Warriors" gifted number six Nielsen emerged five minutes later for all to see, throwing an amazing pass over his shoulder as he ran into the north east corner well taken by winger Michael McCarthy who cantored around toward the goal posts to score. Wattles had a handy 22 - 12 lead, but the "Hawks" were far from done, former North Queensland "Cowboys" and Parramatta "Eels" back-rower Chris Muckert bursting over for a four-pointer. With ten minutes remaining the "Hawks" lifted, camped in Wattles territory and pummelling their line. Wattles defence was lock tight though, until Luke Baker got possession & carved a gap through the mid field before off loading to Jeff Nielsen & sending him on his way in a 50 metre gallop to the line and hopefully another try. It wasn't to be though, Gatton's classy fullback Werth scuttling Nielsen inches from the try line in the north west corner. Giant centre Muckert burst out of the line to take an intercept but incurred a penalty eight metres from the "Hawks" tryline. Gatton were spread wide to defend off their line, but when Matt McCarthy took the ball from hooker Liam Ross and charged over, along with his show of brute strength he seemed to catch some defenders napping as he powered in to score to seal the

Aside from Player of the Match honours, Matt McCarthy was named Player's Player, hooker Liam Ross also among Wattles best playing like a man twice his size. Ross' defensive technique and timing must rate him as one of the most effective tacklers in the competition. Jeff Nielsen continues his run of silky form, his play making brilliance and combination with clever halfback Woodbridge at the forefront of Wattles attacking firepower.

The win for Wattles has them in ninth place on the Toowoomba Rugby League ladder with twelve competition points. They are level with Pittsworth, Southern Suburbs & Newtown, all on twelve points, and all only one point outside the top five. A win over Southern Suburbs this Sunday in Toowoomba could see Wattles fall into the final five in what has been an amazing resurgence since mid May.

Wattles 26 (Michael McCarthy, Justin Van Der Poel, Jeffrey Nielsen, Luke Baker, Matt McCarthy tries; Brady Glass 3 goals) defeated Gatton 18.

In lower grades the Warriors brought home the bacon in both matches.

Lock forward Lauchlan Hoey had a mighty all round match for the Wattles "Railway Hotel, Allora" reserve grade side in their 56-36 win over Gatton. Hoey had sterling support from centre Coedie Tandy, who has returned to Wattles after a few seasons' absence, and reliable hooker Josh McIntosh. Captain Coach Robbie McIntosh opened the scoring with an early try, followed by Coedie Tandy after a great Josh McIntosh run. Tandy also figured in an Anthony McIntosh try to see Wattles ahead 16-0 after twenty minutes. Anthony McIntosh and fullback Brandon Cubby kept the scoreboard ticking over for Wattles, the home side ahead 26-6 after 26 minutes. The Cubby try appeared to be a signal the Warriors were in need of a spell, Gatton charging back to score eighteen unanswered points before
