

"It's a Long Way from Tatamagouche to Allora"

Singer Lucky Starr would have thanked his "lucky stars" that when Geoff Mack penned his 1961 hit and iconic Australian song "I've Been Everywhere", that our Aussie founding forefathers never came up with names for our towns like "Tatamagouche", that may have found their way into his hit song's lyrics.

However, the historical town of Tatamagouche has done Allora a big favour of late. The many who have frequented the Allora Medical Centre over the past four weeks will have met student Doctor Kiva Belts, who is doing a six week stint here in Allora with our two resident Doctors, Kay Ellis and Leith Geisel. Canadian born Kiva has been in Australia since January 2009, originally from the town of Tatamagouche in Nova Scotia, the most easterly province in Canada. The village of around 700 people is located along the south side of Tatamagouche Bay at the mouths of the French and Waugh Rivers. The name Tatamagouche, roughly translated means 'meeting of the waters' from the local native dialect. Kiva, with her bright smile and bubbly personality, has made a new "home" with Peter & Kaye Fiechtner while in Allora, and while boarding is a new experience for her, she is enjoying her stay immensely with her new Australian "family".

Kiva, who already holds a Bachelor of Science degree, is currently in her third year studying medicine at the Royal Brisbane Clinical School, based at the Royal Brisbane and Women's Hospital (RBWH), Queensland's oldest hospital. RBWH is a large tertiary centre for much of Queensland and covers virtually all major specialties in medicine, surgery, mental health, obstetrics and gynecology and paediatrics. It also has one of the largest and most organised Departments of Internal Medicine in Australia. After completing studies this year at Royal Brisbane Clinical School, Kiva has just one more year before graduating with a Bachelor of Medicine & Surgery (MBBS). Her Grandfather a Civil Engineer and Grandmother an English teacher. Kiva is the first of her learned family to study medicine.

Our new student Doctor admits to being a very independent person, who left home as soon as her schooling was completed. She considers Australia has so many similarities with her home country, she has always wanted to live "Down Under", significant advantages in obtaining a medical degree here among her reasons. After graduating, Kiva is looking to continue on in Australia, along with her partner. Caboolture local Lawrence Stevenson.

Kiva is quick to note that since arriving in Allora on January 30th she has been taken by the friendliness of the people, their hospitality and the magnificent surrounding countryside.

She has also been pleasantly surprised by just how busy Allora's medical practice can be. She can compare with her home town of Tatamagouche which has a similar population to Allora. She has also drawn similarities given her medical experience In Brisbane, with all Nova Scotia hospitals public, and medical standards very similar. Kiva has noticed that "the Allora practice appears to be catering mainly for the young and also elderly patients currently. Many of those in other age groups seem to be away due to work requirements, and so it makes for a busy practice here in Allora".


While she is the first student Doctor to work at the Allora Medical Centre, she can appreciate the need for a bigger more accommodating facility. With two Doctors, ongoing visits by student Doctors, allied health professionals and administrative staff, the current building is bulging a little.

After completing her degree, Kiva is thinking she would like to gain experience as rural General Practitioner, and in particular is keen to return to Allora after her current her six week stay. A particular advantage to working in Allora has been the opportunity to "get to know" patients. Rural based Doctors become involved in the local community, get to know the people throughout the community, and it is unavoidable not to get to know patients & in some cases form friendships. "Doctor's get to know their patients in a more laid back, easy going atmosphere, it's more than just a medical relationship in some cases, many patients are good friends". The Doctor patient relationship in Brisbane does not allow for getting to know people, "no chit chat".

Currently, Kiva's role at the Allora Medical Centre has her observing and assisting, helping with procedures and sitting in on consultations. She can see some patients under supervision of a Doctor. She considers cases presented are similar to Brisbane, and at times challenging. However, farm related injuries are something she has not had a lot of contact with prior to

her Allora experience. She has also seen more evidence of skin cancer in the last month than she had encountered. "Doctor's in a rural practice see all cases presenting, where as in Brisbane they have the advantage of many more Doctors sharing patients, and so may not deal with many situations as often as rural counterparts". On the subject of specializing, Allora's first student Doctor suggests "ear, nose & throat & allergies are pet subjects, along with upper respiratory tract infections" inspired by childhood experiences. She admits though she is a way from making any decisions regarding specializing or a career as a General Practitioner.

Since arriving in Allora, Kiva has developed an appreciation for a car. The distances in the country are vast, and she does not have a vehicle. "I am used to a regular bus service in Brisbane to get to work and around the city". While she has been in the area for a month, she has yet to see all that is on

offer in Allora's rural surrounds.

Kiva is yet to adopt the Queenslander sport ethic, and currently fills her spare time with the demands of study. She has also poured many hours into tutoring, and a love of working with teenagers has made it a very pleasant pastime. Kiva tutors first year fellow tertiary students and also school students, and in fact, is keen to teach in some capacity in the future. Aside from tutoring school students in chemistry & biology and secondary school subjects. Kiva also tutors science with other medical students. He tutoring takes up around six hours a week when in Brisbane, her availability spread by word of mouth and through the student society. Her normal work day is 8 to 5, with an additional three hours daily study.

Being around 16,500 kms from home and family can be very trying. Apart from family and friends, Kiva does miss the cultural aspect of home town Tatamagouche. Kiva's family boast Scottish & Irish roots, as does the town and region, "It's not unusual at all to see men wearing kilts in the streets". The 19th century Irish famine and, especially, the Scottish Highland clearances resulted in large influxes of migrants with Celtic cultural roots to Nova Scotia


With Nova Scotia known as one of Canada's three maritime Provinces, fishing is a major industry, in particular crab & salmon, while lobster is a significant industry in itself. It needs little explanation then that Kiva enjoys seafood, and since arriving in Australia has developed a healthy liking for barramundi. She also enjoys "Fish Night" on Friday evenings with her "family", the Fiechtners, when Peter dons "the Chefs cap" and cooks up a feed of prime fresh Aussie fish fillets.

A particular thrill for the young lady from Tatamagouche was attending the recent Allora Show, where the fireworks and Demolition Derby especially caught her eve. Back home in Nova Scotia she would attend a similar community gathering with her family, the Colchester County Fair at nearby Truro, the major shire town in the County, that also includes Tatamagouche. According to Kiva, "the Allora Show & a County Fair are very similar, animals & a myriad of other exhibits, rides & treats; with the event generating great community participation & enjoyment".

Kiva's parents David and Susan Belts, operate a restaurant & gift shop in Tatamagouche, the "Sunrise Mercantile". "You can sit & enjoy light lunches.

Very busy people are Kiva's parents, also operating an organic lavender farm just outside Tatamagouche. Her family is very organically inclined, and so very passionate about the environment

With her current stint in Allora drawing to a close Kiva considers the experience gained in the "Best Little Town on the Downs" invaluable. And also, a vivid taste of a goal she is considering, working in a rural area.

While Allora may not boast the bright lights, noise and attractions of the big cities, it does have its own special appeal to locals and the many that visit. While Kiva has been sightseeing to a degree around the area, she is yet to experience a night out in Herbert Street. Rumour has it she is looking forward to a "break from the books" and enjoying a Friday night with community members & new friends in more social surroundings before bidding Allora farewelluntil next time.


(Dalrymple House, which still stands in Jubb Street, was built, probably in the 1880's, for Thomas Kennedy, partner in the general store and flour milling business of Kennedy Brothers. It was offered for sale at the time of the death of Mrs. Kennedy in 1909. John Moorhead sold the Trade Palace to Holmes & Co. in 1914. Dalrymple House may have been sold at the same time to David Campbell, an employee at the Butter Factory store, because in 1922 Campbell advertised it for sale for £600. Mr. David Dougall, partner with his brother Maurice in the Allora Butchering Company, owned Dalrymple House for many years)

Vince Cantwell proudly recalls his wheat bag sewing skills

SKILLS FROM A BY-GONE ERA

Sewing wheat bags at harvest time was an all important task which facilitated the transportation and storage of the crop in earlier years. According to Australian Bureau of Statistics the practice was adopted up until about the year 1952 when bulk handling principals were implemented.

Vince Cantwell, who was born in Allora and lived and farmed in the district for over eighty years recalls his days of bag sewing. Vince remembers as a teenager how he enjoyed sewing wheat bags and could manage to sew in the vicinity of 150 to 200 a day. A wheat bag weighed approximately 180 lbs. and 12 to 13 bags averaged a ton.

Vince Cantwell is illustrated in the photo having just completed sewing two wheat bags to form part of a display in the back of the 1923 Ford Model T Ute. The vehicle along with a number of other Model T vehicles will participate in the Grand Parade at the Pittsworth Show scheduled for 4th and 5th March.

Our sincere thanks to Vince Cantwell for his advice and assistance in replicating an aspect of our early history.





Dear Editor,

De facto couples in Queensland are celebrating an important anniversary this week, although they might not know it. Tuesday (March 1), marked two years since the Federal Government introduced major changes to the Family Law Act, giving de facto couples in Queensland the same laws that govern married couples, in the event of a break-up.

The changes mean that de facto couples must live together for at least two years to meet the new uniform definition of a "de facto relationship". The two-year period can only be shortened under strict criteria.

Before these changes, there was a fair degree of variation in the laws from State to State and disputes between former de facto couples could have ended up in multiple jurisdictions and courts.

But now, for better or worse, if there is a breakdown in a de facto relationship any unfortunate disputes over property and spousal maintenance can go to court in exactly the same way as a married couple.

Council donates fees for raising

homes on flood prone land

Southern Downs residents will now be able to apply for permission to raise their home on flood prone land and seek a refund of the application fee paid to Council.

Councillors voted unanimously at the General Meeting last week to donate up to \$500 in application fees paid to Council for raising houses in a flood affected area.

Mayor Ron Bellingham said it just made common sense. "We want to encourage flood proofing of homes that currently have a risk of flooding," Cr Bellingham said.

"Council has made this decision to encourage home owners to raise their homes and to reduce some of the hardship resulting from the recent floods.

"This initiative is just one more positive step that Council is introducing to help the community deal with the impacts of the floods", the Mayor said.

The fee will be donated where the proposed raising leads to all habitable rooms as defined under the BCA being 30 centimetres above the one in 100 year flood level as determined by the Director of Engineering Services.

The proposed finished height of the building must not result in the building having an extremely adverse effect on the amenity or likely amenity of the locality.

Applications will still be subject to any current planning legislation.



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


