A big thanks to all who have worked on the course lately, the course is now looking better with the much needed rain.




Another very versatile player, Glass' size, strength and ability will see him at home in the engine room, but he also impressed with some gutsy appearances on the wing last season.

Allora's Past 100 years ago March 1910 Traffic Prosecutions

At the Allora Police Court on Wednesday morning last before Messrs, F. H. Kates and J. Gilmore JJP, the Allora Town Council proceeded against six persons for breach of the traffic by-laws viz. for driving in the streets within the area without lights between sunset and sunrise. Five of the defendants pleaded guilty, fines of 1/- with 3/6 costs of court and 10/6 professional costs being enforced in each case. In the defended case, Joseph Cox, who advanced the novel plea that he was not driving a vehicle, but a horse, a similar fine and costs to those previously imposed was levied.

To the Editor Allora Guardian **Municipal Prosecutions**

Sir, May I suggest to the Municipal Council that they materially assist in their endeavour to enforce the carrying of lights by vehicles at night by removing or breaking up the loose stones lying about in the main streets. On several occasions I have driven in to town at night with my lights burning brightly and with a general air of conscious rectitude (invisible at night I am afraid) and before I got half way down the street my lights have been bumped out (my sulky lights I mean of course) over obstruding boulders. Place chops or cutlets in casserole dish with onions. Mix remaining ingredients and pour over meat. Cook in moderate oven for 2 hours.







Southern Downs signs MOU with Sanmenxia

The Southern Downs Regional Council last week signed a Memorandum of Understanding with Sanmenxia City China, which sets out an interest by both councils to work closely together in the development of mutual trade and investment. At the signing ceremony, which was held at Parliament House in Brisbane, Mayor Ron Bellingham signed the document alongside the Sanmenxia Mayor, Mr Yang Shuping, who was accompanied on his trip to Australia by a trade delegation of 30 Sanmenxia business leaders.

"It's a great compliment to our region that the people of Sanmenxia have chosen the Southern Downs as their key area for agricultural and food processing investment in Australia," Mayor Bellingham said today.

"As we know, China has become one of the economic 'tigers' of the world economy, and it will greatly benefit our local economy if we can partner together in the future."

Council's Economic Development Officer, John Randall said that the MOU signing was part of an overall Trade and Investment Seminar for Sanmenxia in Brisbane, which was co-facilitated by Council's Economic Development Unit.

the Southern Downs is a high priority for our region," Mr Randall said. "Initial discussions with the Sanmenxia delegation have indicated a strong interest in direct investment in purchasing high-yielding managed agricultural properties in our region. "We are already in touch with a number of local companies with expertise in this field and will be providing the necessary introductions. However, it must be remembered that trade and investment with China is a long term process, built on strong business relationships.' Mayor Bellingham high-

lighted many similarities with the Southern Downs in the types of agricultural industries in Sanmenxia, noting natural links between the two economies.

"Sanmenxia is well-known for its agriculture including apples, small crops, processing of

fruit juices, wines and meat processing," Cr Bellingham said. Sanmenxia, which is located in the central west of China, also has a strong mining and manufacturing base. Sanmenxia City has a population of 2.8 million and is situated on the Yellow River, in the middle of Henin Province. The city's economy has a strong focus on minerals processing, especially aluminium. It is also the third largest gold producer in China.

Ilma and Ned Cavanagh Reprinted from The Allora Advertiser, 18th June 2009

The story of Ilma and Ned Cavanagh could be an epic. A tale of a couple who met, married, raised a family and prospered but I suspect it would be more accurate to say the Cavanagh tale is a love story. Not so much by what they say but rather by what they do not.

After 60 years of marriage there is, not surprisingly, an easy familiarity between this couple. But what is surprising is the good natured teasing over how they met, their obvious pride in their 10 children and the simple pleasure they have clearly gained from sharing a life together.

Ilma and Ned are quite different. Ilma studied hard, completed senior and went on to become a teacher, Ned couldn't finish school fast enough. Ned, like his father John before him and his son Peter after him, loved farming. Ilma, even after almost 60 years on their property "Oaklands" never learnt to ride a horse, drive a tractor or milk a cow. Ned's domain was the yards, Ilma's the house. Ned was a homebody, Ilma wanted to travel...and yet it worked.

There is an obvious respect between these two and a modest pride that together they have created a family that to this day enjoys spending time together.

Ned's grandfather came to Australia from Ireland during the Potato famine. An Irish priest enticed him to come to Warwick and it was in Upper Freestone that the Cavanagh family would put down roots. Ned's father John was one of five children who worked on the family's 50 acre farm and while John knew and loved farming there was money to be made as a Teamster. On his horse and wagon John would cart bushels of wheat to the sales. Somewhere during his travels John met Bridget O'Dea from Spring Creek and in his spare time he would make the four hour journey to court the young Bridget.

In the early 1900's Glengallan Station was reputed to be the largest and most prosperous of all properties, employing more than 300 families and it was here that John and Bridget moved after they were married. The Station ran more than 30,000 sheep and as the resident Teamster John was responsible for ensuring the bales of wool made it to Allora to meet the train. Ned was born on Glengallan Station in the May of 1917. He

was the second youngest of 11 Cavanagh children.

While John's wages of 30 bob, all the free mutton his family could eat and a small cottage to live in provided security, he thought he could provide a better future for his family by share farming. So he moved Bridget and the children, first to a small property at Pilton and later to "Oaklands" a 300 acre farm just outside of Goomburra.

Like any working farm each child was allocated a chore. For Ned it was to turn the separator to make the cream and to take the cream by horse and cart to Berat where it was then

All the children were very close to their mother who was widely regarded was a gentle woman. They played well together and

regularly held tennis fixtures at the local tennis courts.

"Our childhood was alright. We didn't have much money but there was always a feed on the table," Ned said. Ilma is quick to pipe up that from what she had heard their household sounded like lots of fun. Perhaps it was fun that Ned and his siblings took for granted.

Fortunately for Ned his brothers and sisters, bar Francy, had little interest in remaining at "Oaklands" and so what began as his childhood home would become his future income. The property would be worked by father and son for some 40 years to come.



While Ned was busy working the land a 24 year old Ilma Rauchle had moved to Forrest Springs to take up a teaching position. She was taken in by the Chard family who as luck would have it were long standing family friends of the Cavanagh's. One night on the way back from a New Years Eve ball in Allora, the Chard's car blew a tyre. Ned happened to be next car on the scene and he takes great pleasure in saying he met his future wife in the dark.

Ned claims Ilma fell for him instantly, Ilma says she must have thought he had money. Regardless of how it happened, the couple after a four year courtship married.

"We were in love," said Ned. After looking at his wife across the table he went on to qualify that, "I was in love but I'm not too sure about her".

With this shared joke it is easy to see how Ilma and Ned celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary on 14 August 2008. Their life together began with specified roles. Ned, together with his father, tended the land and dairy cows. Ilma and her mother-in-law Bridget, worked the house and looked after the ever increasing brood. Seven of Ilma and Ned's ten children were reared on a property with no electricity and therefore an incredible amount of effort was required to wash, cook and clean for the Cavanagh clan.

Yet you will not hear any complaints from Ilma, Ned or their children. A large family takes an enormous amount of effort from all parties to make it work. So work together, and live

together and enjoy each others company they did.

In 1974 John and Bridget retired to Allora and it was a proud day when Ned and Ilma paid out the elder Cavanagh's for their share in the farm. Their eldest son Peter had a particular love of the property and despite many offers of employment elsewhere made it very clear to his parents where his true passion lay.

Ilma laughs about who was the "boss". John was referred to by his children as the boss and according to Ilma it didn't take long for their children to refer to Peter as the "boss".

"Ned may have worked on the farm all his life. He may have made a profit and saved enough to buy out his father. He certainly provided for his family. But I can safely say he was never refereed to as the "boss", she said.

In 2006 the couple moved into Allora leaving the farm to Peter. For the first six months Ned hated it.

"I couldn't stand it. I would wake up in the morning and go out the front door and there were no mountains to look at," he said. Ilma smiles at her husband and says, "I told him to go out the back door instead. There are five mountains for him to look at from there".

That was Ned's initial thoughts. Now they love retirement. Between senior citizen card games, the local liturgy group and their visits from various children, really Ned and Ilma aren't quite sure how they found the time to farm and have children. Lucky for Peter, Maria, Monica, Judith, Patrick, Catherine, Lawrence, Denise, Edward and Helen... they did.
