



Mayor calls for advance on disaster recovery funding

Southern Downs Mayor Ron Bellingham has welcomed assurances from the Federal Government of \$50m in upfront flood payments for local governments in Queensland.

"We've been spending money on flood damaged infrastructure since January, and an advance payment of the NDRRA* monies would be very helpful to this community," Cr Bellingham said.

"We now expect to get a cash advance to assist with payment for works already completed and works still being carried out, iust as other councils have.

"We understand that South Burnett and Lockyer Valley councils already received their advance money."

Director of Engineering Services said that would be a cash advance on the total damage bill, which is currently being determined by contractors and Council staff.

"So far we've examined 57 percent of our infrastructure and picked up 5,000 defects caused by the floods," Mr See said.

"We'll continue that work over the coming month and repairs to each defect will then be costed to get a total damage bill."

Minister Assisting the Attorney-General on Flood recovery, Joe Ludwig, earlier this week promised the \$50 million advance payment.

"The Australian and Queensland Governments have contributed an upfront payment of \$50 million as a first installment to help local governments with the costs of important clean-up and repair work in response to these events," Senator Ludwig said. Cr Bellingham said that Senator Ludwig has left the door open for more funding to be considered if the existing package is unable to be applied in all circumstances.


This funding is part of the \$315 million Queensland Local Council Package to help Queensland's local councils repair utilities and infrastructure damaged by the recent natural disasters.

The funding will be made available through the Queensland Reconstruction Authority, to ensure funds are targeted in a coordinated manner, based on local needs and capacity.

Looking Back...

Early Days at Talgai West

Robert William Frizzell was born in 1886, the eldest child of Robert Frizzell who came to Australia from County Armagh, Ireland, in about 1884, and his wife Ellen.

Robert senior, sold his carrying business in Allora in 1904 and bought a farm at Talgai. R. W. Frizzell records his memories of Talgai West from about that time:-

The Scottish Australian Investment Company purchased the 22,000 acre Talgai West property from Charles Clark in the 1800's. The property was later divided into 15 dairy farms, 14 share farms and the homestead block. The share farms were farmed on a 50/50 basis and the homestead block was worked on a wages system.

The houses on these dairy farms were erected by contract. Each dairy comprised of 120 cows run on an area of 400 to 500 acres. The cows were milked by hand on all farms which contained six cow bails, with the exception of two farms. The milk was carted twice daily to a creamery to be separated. The milk was carried in carts made by Allora blacksmith, Tom Maher. The carts were big enough to hold 22 ten-gallon cans.

The creamery was situated on a farm known as "The Rocks", at present owned by Tom Cowley. In about 1908 a new creamery was built on the hill above the present school. Each farmer took his separated milk home and the cream was taken by covered wagonette to the railway siding to be sent to the Warwick Butter Factory.

Talgai West was managed for the S. A. I. Co. for approximately 40 years by Mr. Aubin Dowling. The station employed between 30 and 40 men permanently as well as the share farmers, having its own butcher's shop, tradesman blacksmith's shop, provision store, carpenter and its own saw bench to mill timber for station purposes. It had large bachelor's quarters with its own cook who baked all the bread, also a library for the employees which was large enough to accommodate 60 people. There were 5 well built cottages on the hill situated on the present property of Harry Sprott which was the homestead block.

Two 5-horse dray teams and one 10-horse wagon worked daily, one dray driven by Jock Rix and the other by the late George Kirby. Six horse teams were used to cultivate several hundred acres to grow green fodder, mainly barley and lucerne. The teamsmen had a moveable camp with their own cook. This enabled them to go to various parts of the station with the least possible upset. The farm manager was the late Mr. Robert Crooks.

The homestead farm was the stud farm, the cattle from this farm being used as the foundation stock for all the share dairy farms. The cattle were stabled and fed. Two grooms attended the cattle, the head groom was the late Jack Cranitch. The stock were bred from the famous Illawarra blood of "Darballara" owned by the S. A. I. Co.

Pigs bred on the home farm were Berkshires in the charge of Jimmy Rix. These pigs were purchased by the share farmers when they were form six to eight weeks old and were priced from 6/- to 8/- each. The piggery covered two acres of land with over 100 sows housed in sties. The pigs on the share farms were fed on boiled cracked barley, pumpkins and separated milk and were trucked from the railway siding when sold, fetching from 35/- to £2/10 per head for pigs of from 180 to 200 lbs in weight.

In 1912 Talgai West Station was cut up and sold to private parties and all the cattle were sold at auction by the late Charles McDougall. With the sale of the property came the change of the name of the railway siding from Talgai to Dalrymple, a name that was confused with the name of a station in North Queensland, and so the name of the siding was changed to Ellinthorp.

Greeting the Pilgrims on arrival at Allora 29th March 2011

"Caed Mile Failtre" - These were the Gaelic words of welcome used by Mr. Jerry Collins when the Sisters of St. Joseph arrived in 1916. They mean "A hundred thousand welcomes" and that welcome was repeated on Tuesday at Allora's Railway Station on Darling Street.

The Sisters of St. Joseph the Daughters of Mother Mary MacKillop who had been removed from Queensland earlier, were welcomed back into the Qld. Archdiocese in October 1915.

In January 1916 a group of Sisters arrived by rail in Allora. The Sisters who arrived were Sister Mary Raphael who become the first community superior, Sister Mary Amata and Sister Joseph Edwards. The Mother-General of the Sisters was also present-Mother Baptista.

Their arrival back then was a little different to the arrival of today's pilgrims via air conditioned coach. They arrived here at Allora Station after a long and uncomfortable journey by steam train. Back then they were wearing the heavy dark serge habits.

They were met by Father Edward Carroll, Parish Priest. As they stepped off the train he greeted them with the Gaelic greeting. A roomy up to date Convent awaited the Sisters. Built at a cost of some eleven hundred pounds plus furnishings, it is still in use to day, having been progressively up-graded over the years.

After shaking hands with most of crowd, they were taken in Ernie Anderson's cab to the Convent for afternoon tea, after which Father Carroll showed them all around and they met most of the parishioners. That evening Benediction was celebrated in thanksgiving for their arrival.

Even if you consider yourself to be devoid of musical talent the Junk Orchestra workshops have something to offer you.

Junk Orchestra workshops coming

Perhaps you think there is not a musical bone in your body? But what if you could play music and no musical talent or experience was required?

The Peace Festival has the answer with their upcoming Junk Orchestra workshops, to be held on April 28 and 29.

Organiser Ruth Power is keen for the community to embrace making their own funky instruments from recycled and found objects and then play them as part of a "Junk Orchestra".

"It's about making music with objects that didn't know they had it in them," Ms Power said.

"Music is lurking in many everyday objects and this discovery can change the way we view the world.

"When we use rhythm as a language to communicate with, in a group, we may well find that we are freed from the restraints, which our spoken language imposes upon us. This can create an atmosphere of harmony, both musically and socially."

Ms Power laughed when adding, "It's hard not to have fun when you're banging out a rhythm on a wheelie bin or discovering funky bass riffs on a thongaphone."

The Junk Orchestra workshops will be facilitated by Rob Davies, who has been developing Junk Orchestra as a medium for group development for the past 14 years.

Rob has coordinated workshops in creative arts at festivals and conferences in Queensland and the UK. He has used junk

attract cat hair in direct proportion to the darkness of the fabric.

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music with a wide range of groups including Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders, people with disabilities, at risk youth, people from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds, refugees, community workers, and school teachers.

In recent years Rob has worked on five major community theatre productions using the medium of "Junk Orchestra" to involve groups of young people in public performance.

In 2006 he took a group of 13 young people to Woodford Folk Festival where their street theatre production "The Dumplings" was a great hit. The "Dumplings" played funky music on improvised instruments constructed from recycled and found objects.

The Peace Festival's Junk Orchestra workshops will be held at the Slade School Art Room in Horsman Road, Warwick at a cost of \$5.00 per session, with all materials provided.
