The "Best Little Town on the Downs" has been recognised by Ergon Energy's Tidy Towns Awards for the way its community worked together during recovery from this year's devastating floods.

Mayor Ron Bellingham, who was at the Tidy Towns Awards ceremony last month, presented the community of Allora with a Tidy Towns Certificate of Recognition last week.

Cr Bellingham said that he was "up and down" all night at the Awards Ceremony, with Allora receiving a special mention in all but one of the Tidy Towns categories.

"This town has really shown heart and the Tidy Town judges certainly recognised that on the night," he said.

Allora Show Society president Shirley Cornhill summed up the Allora community's feelings about the recognition in her typically succinct fashion.


"We're stoked!" Mrs Cornhill said as she accepted the certificate along with Ted Cowley, Wendy Ardrey and Glyn Rees on behalf of the community.

"This is a credit to the whole community and also all those people from outside Allora who came and helped us."

Tales were told of how word spread through facebook on the day of the floods, that people with kids were trapped in town, and locals descended on the community hall with mattresses, blankets, food and other necessities without so much as blinking an eye.

Similar selflessness was shown with people jumping in to repair the damaged Show Society fencing which was repaired within a week.

"People from Allora and also all over came to help," Mrs Cornhill said.


"Our goal with this prospectus is to tell investors that it is easy to do business in the Southern Downs!" he said.





Allora's Past 25 years ago October 1986

Feedlot By-laws Adopted

Following extensive investigations into regulations governing air pollution, distances from population areas and cleanliness requirements, Allora Shire Council adopted its new feedlot by-laws at its monthly meeting. The by-laws prevent the building of a feedlot on properties under 100 hectares in area, a feedlot being defined as any land, building or other structure intended for keeping of more than 20 head of livestock in pens with less than 40 square metres per beast and fed with prepared feed rather than grazing. The maximum feedlot size of 30,000 head must be 14 kilometres from the town boundary, reducing to 2 kilometres for a 200 head operation.

The Shire Chairman, Cr. J. Deacon, said that he had no hesitation in recommending the new by-laws to the meeting. The new laws were put into effect following the application to build a 300 head feedlot at Deuchar. The application was rejected because the property area of 88 hectares was under the 100 hectare requirement.

Allora's Past 75 years ago November 1936

Wheat Harvest

The delivery of this year's wheat crop in the Allora district is nearly completed. The Allora shed has received 30,981 bags and 2,000 to 3,000 more are expected. The quantity will be in excess of last year's total. Berat finished receivals with a total of 9,330 bags. Ellinthorp closed down today, the total being between 11,000 and 12,000 bags. The board's officers are now receiving at Goomburra. Almost all of the crop is milling grade.

That Telephone

As we anticipated would be the case, the trust we reposed in Alderman Muir in nominating him to propose the installation of a telephone in the Town Hall was fully justified. At Monday's meeting of the Council, Alderman Muir duly moved that the necessary steps be taken to have the Allora Town Hall connected to the local telephone exchange. The motion was seconded by Alderman Dean and carried without dissent.

New Goomburra Church

The new church of St. John the Evangelist at Goomburra was formally opened on Thursday afternoon last by the Venerable Archdeacon Rivers, who acted for His Grace the Archbishop. The ceremony commenced at 3 p.m. and notwithstanding the intense heat the church was well filled. Subsequently, afternoon tea was supplied in the hall by the ladies of Goomburra and was greatly appreciated. Archdeacon Rivers congratulated the congregation on the completion of the church.

It may also be mentioned that the altar was made and presented to the church by the contractor, Mr. H. Weber, whose work has been creditably done throughout.

There's Something About Mary

As Mary Poppins comes home in her latest incarnation, the hunt for the real Mary and her maker remains elusive.

The Stars Hang Low Over Allora

The absence of city lights means they unfurl across the sky like carnival lanterns. It's a disarmingly pretty town, untouched, for the most part, by progress - "the best little town on the Downs", the locals call it. If you walk down its charming main street, past the cafe, the chemist, two hairdressers, butcher, real estate agency and its three pubs - the Railway, the Blue Cow, the Commercial - you come to a white picket fence, set out like a row of perfectly straight teeth. Behind it is a blue and white Victorian home, dotted with five chimneys. Although there is no commemorative plaque to mark it, it is easy to find. Because if you want to find 61 Herbert Street, Allora, all you have to do is ask the locals for directions to "the Mary Poppins house".

The people of Maryborough may not like to hear it, because P. L. Travers was born there on August 9, 1899, and the town understandably also lays claim to her. But Valerie Lawson, the author of the definitive Travers biography, *Mary Poppins, She Wrote*, calls P. L. Travers's time in Allora "the most critical of her early life".

Lawson, who lives in Sydney and who researched her book on Travers for five years, tells Qweekend: "Allora had left its mark on her, because it was where she lost her father, and where her imagination really took flight."


Step inside the picture-perfect, pretty blue and white house, and she's everywhere.

"It's true that the doors here open and close by themselves all the time. If it is a ghost, and the locals seem to think it is, I'd say it feels masculine, and I think it is somehow related to the father.



They lie behind the heavy-set, 50mm-thick, commercial front doors of what was once an Australian Joint Stock Bank, its

entry through a vestibule that still fronts Herbert St. Struthers and his wife Loraine have spent the past four years travelling each weekend from their home on Bribie Island to Allora to restore the former bank premises and manager's residence to their Victorian splendour.

"I originally bought the house, which was built in 1881, because it excited me architecturally, not so much because of the P. L. Travers connection," Struthers says. "But it's a funny thing; the longer I'm here, the more responsible I feel to telling the story between these walls and the pages of Poppins."

It's clear the Strutherses have done a remarkable job. As we enter the bank's chamber from the long central hallway of the residence, the door obligingly opens and closes behind us.

The vault remains as it was in 1905, when Travers Goff arrived as manager, its deep, cool interior guarding the good folk of Allora's money and papers, just as Goff is guarding a secret of his own - the merest hint of alcohol on his breath as he bids them good morning.

Here in the residence - with its soaring 4m-high ceilings and fires crackling in the bedrooms, sending ashes dancing up the chimneys - it's easy to imagine a young P. L. Travers. There she is, feet tucked under her, reading her books from the family's library by the fire - Beatrix Potter, the Brothers Grimm, Alice disappearing into Wonderland. You can picture her lying on the cool, green grass in the back yard, hands clasped and stargazing with her father, as he points out Venus, Orion and the seven sisters of Pleiades.

It is harder, however, to imagine how she felt when she woke up one morning to her mother saying, "Daddy has gone to God".

Travers Goff had caught pneumonia while out horseriding in the rain. Three days later he was dead. Allora's unfortunately named Dr Francis Pain announced the official cause of death as "epileptic seizure delirium", but Lawson says Goff's eldest daughter always believed it was alcohol that claimed him.

"Travers had been demoted to Allora because of his drinking," Lawson explains. "It grew worse there, and in late January of 1907 he believed he was about to be demoted again because of it. As an adult, Pamela believed he just couldn't face that,

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and in the end he allowed the pneumonia - and the alcohol - to kill him."

But whatever the cause of his death, its effect was immediate. Travers Goff would be buried the day after his death. The local *Allora Guardian* newspaper would carry an advertisement selling the contents of the family home on the same day it published his funeral notice.

The day after the funeral, a great aunt - Helen Morehead, known as Aunt Ellie - would sweep into Allora to collect the family and take them back to her home in Bowral, NSW. She, too, will prove part of the blueprint for Poppins, a no-nonsense but loving disciplinarian who P. L. Travers once said "stalked with her silent feet" throughout the pages of her books.

Helen Lyndon Goff will grow into a teenager there, eventually heading for Sydney and a career as an actress and writer. She will move to London in 1924, and ten years later publish the first of the six illustrated *Mary Poppins* novels, spanning 54 years. In between, she will embark on a lifelong spiritual journey and see her story of a magical, formidable nanny who arrives by parrot-headed umbrella become a publishing phenomenon, a movie, and the first tentative notes of a blockbuster musical.

She will never return to Australia, and rarely mention her roots there, preferring to tease interviewers trying to find out where she - and Mary - came from. She will spin romantic stories around her father - on her death, London's *Guardian* newspaper will claim her as the grand-daughter of "the Premier of Queensland" in its obituary.

Travers Goff will remain where he is today, under Allora's stars, still, they say, opening and closing the doors of his former home behind him.

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Cunningham's Gap - Cunningham **Highway Reconstruction Progress** Update

The reconstruction at Cunningham's Gap is tracking well, with work expected to finish throughout November and December 2011 at the six sites currently underway. Four of the eleven pavement reconstruction sites are now complete and design is nearly complete for the remaining site at Clayton's Gully where the department is planning to realign the road. At least \$40 million has been committed to reconstructing the Gap.

Slope stabilisation - Work to clean the rock face above the highway has been ongoing since late last year. Work is being carried out on the slopes near the top of the Gap throughout the coming month.

Asphalt resurfacing - In addition to the eleven sites and slope stabilisation work, asphalt resurfacing will start soon and will continue until late 2011, between Six Penny Gully and the top of the Gap.

Traffic conditions

- · Stop/go traffic control is in place at a number of locations at Cunningham's Gap, including 24 hours a day from the top of the Gap to Fig Tree Gully. Traffic control will also be in place for the resurfacing work.
- While all efforts are made to minimise disruptions, motorists may experience delays when travelling through the Gap. The department appreciates your patience while these essential works are carried out.
- · Restrictions are in place on vehicles over 3.5 m wide and/or over 26 m long between the helipad and the Gap. These vehicles are encouraged to take alternate routes. Call 13 19 40 for updates.

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hands up' as pioneers to receive this first specialised general volunteer response training in the region," Cr Bellingham said. "We are also thanking them for considering potential supportive roles with emergency services throughout the Southern Downs Region."

Established through a partnership between Australian Red Cross and Southern Downs Regional Council (SDRC), the Volunteer training gave opportunities for participants to be skilled in Effective Volunteering, Team Work, Emergency Services Overview, and Accidental Counselling.

SDRC Volunteer Coordinator Bette Bonney organised and delivered most of the training, which was funded and supported by the Australian Red Cross.

One training session involved major emergency service providers briefing the volunteers on what they do, and resulted in a potential "web" of volunteers being organised to provide support in important "back-up" roles across the region.

For example, a first "orientation day" with Salvation Army Emergency Services (catering) has already taken place with 10 participants now being available to support the catering team as they serve other emergency services and the community. The group had practice run at the Day for Daniel BBQ outside Warwick Police Station last Friday, and at the Salvation Army BBQ at Warwick's Leslie Park markets on Rodeo weekend. Staff and volunteers at the Warwick Visitor Information Centre are toasting their success in being named a finalist in the Queensland Tourism Awards 'Visitor Information and Services' category on Friday evening at the Brisbane Convention Centre. The award was taken out by the Ipswich Visitor Information Centre.

Warwick Tourism and Events Chief Executive Officer Tracy Vellacott congratulated the staff and volunteers of the Warwick Visitor Information Centre on being recognised as a finalist in the prestigious awards.

"These people are very much our local tourism champions," Mrs Vellacott said. "It has been a challenging year for them but through it all they have continued to deliver excellent visitor services."

"Their level of service and patience was truly tested earlier this year as they dealt with the deluge of visitors who were trapped in the Warwick community because of highway and road closures to the north and south, after extensive flooding of the Condamine River.

They were under duress with hundreds of enquiries in a tight time frame, stranded visitors and no room at the inn. The only option was for travellers to be housed in two emergency evacuation centres situated on either side of the Condamine River."

Mrs Vellacott said that under extreme pressure, the staff and volunteers highlighted their professionalism, along with the true spirit of the bush and extended hospitality and friendship to those in need.

"With understanding and empathy they helped to ease the plight of frustrated and weary travellers with nowhere to go and still came out smelling like one of Warwick's beautiful roses," she said.
