State School will continue to be an outstanding educational facility, extending well into the future from this, "the Year of Reading" for the school. Many students participated in various national tests such as Australian English, Mathematics & Science competitions. ### **There's Something About Mary**

As Mary Poppins comes home in her latest incarnation, the hunt for the real Mary and her maker remains elusive.

### There Are Secrets In This House (cont'd.)

Even though Travers, like her parrot-headed umbrella-wielding creation, did not like to reveal her private life, she left it liberally sprinkled throughout the pages of her books. She was a lifelong and enthusiastic student of mythology and metaphysics, becoming in her twenties a disciple of the Russian guru George Gurdjieff, and later, the Indian mystic Karlfried Graf von Dürckheim. Their principal teachings of worlds beyond our own are a central theme of the Poppins series - from the moment she tumbles in on the wind to take the Banks children on a series of improbable adventures.

With Mary they visit a celestial circus, go Christmas shopping with the youngest sister in the Pleiades constellation, Maia, and paste giant, gold stars on the sky. In Mary's world, animals speak, marble statues come to life, and shadows dance free of their earthly charges.

No wonder Walt Disney came courting. Thomas Schumacher, president of the Disney Theatrical Group, is very theatrically talking to Qweekend on his mobile phone while walking down New York City's 42nd Street, trying to hail a cab as President Obama's cavalcade is sweeping past, flags aflutter.

The producer behind many of Disney's smash hit film and stage productions, including *Beauty and the Beast, The Lion King* and *High School Musical*, Schumacher chuckles down the line as he recounts the colourful relationship between Travers and Walt Disney.

"One of the legends about the two of them that is true is that after all the blood, sweat and tears of getting the *Mary Poppins* movie made, Pamela Travers turned to Walt at the premiere in 1964 and said, 'Now let's get to work.' Walt said, 'Pamela, that ship has sailed'."


"The other legend that is true - oh wait, there's the president... oh my gosh, that's exciting, okay, he's gone now - is that it was Walt's young daughters Sharon and Diane who brought the first book to his attention, and begged him to make a movie of it but he didn't need much convincing.

"You know, I think it just really spoke to him [Walt] on a number of levels - he had his own complicated relationship with his father; it was based on the same dream about this idealised family life he always promoted; and of course, it had all that magic."

But if Disney was keen, Travers was less so, and he joined a long line of suitors - including Sam Goldwyn and Vincente Minnelli - beating a path to her door for the film rights. "I think he first approached her towards the end of the Second World War, then again in the '50s, and she finally agreed to give him the rights in 1959 for \$100,000, 5 per cent of the gross and final script approval." Schumacher chuckles again. "She drove a hard bargain, but Walt, of all people, would have appreciated that."

Travers would later disassociate herself somewhat from the





movie, telling one interviewer she found it "ghastly". She was said to be unhappy with the songs, especially its signature tune, *Supercalifragilisticexpialidocious*, and although she loved Julie Andrews in the lead role, her Mary was far too sweet for Travers's liking. Pamela Travers's Mary had some pepper, some bite, very much like her own formidable Aunt Ellie. This one was as sweet as the spoonful of sugar the Sherman Brothers' musical score was doling out to moviegoers.

But Schumacher says reports of creative differences have been "greatly exaggerated". "I think it's too delicious an idea for people to resist, that she hated the movie, that she and Walt really butted heads. It's true they sparred; you can hear it on the famous audiotapes of their meetings - sometimes eighthour-long meetings. But Pamela was contrary; you can also hear her singing the songs, dancing to them, laughing at the jokes, and what's not too well known is she asked Walt for a bit part in the movie - as well as for one of the carousel horses for her garden in London."

Less known still is that Travers also wrote a sequel for Disney studios. The opening sequence? The Banks children sliding down the banister singing Supercalifragilisticexpialidocious.

"She wrote the screenplay with Brian Sibley, a wonderful Disney writer, and when I first came to the company in the '80s, it was still very much being tossed around," says Schumacher. "There were lots of meetings with Pamela, although it never got off the ground. I never got to meet her. I wish I did. I think she was fascinating, the way she hid herself so artfully in her stories, and the way her words can still make children, even today's somewhat jaded ones, believe in magic."

The boy sitting next to me does. He's about 12, spiky hair, regulation hoodie, and when he first sat down beside me in Sydney's Capitol Theatre, he wore the expression of a boy who had been dragged there by his mother.

But from the moment a dishevelled chimney sweep emerges from a rooftop to sing the faintly sinister opening lyrics - "Winds in the East, there's a mist coming in / like something is brewing, and 'bout to begin" - he inches closer to the edge of his seat, spellbound. This is the latest incarnation of Mary Poppins, a multi-million-dollar, multi-award-winning co-production between Thomas Schumacher's Disney Theatrical Productions (which has the film rights) and Cameron Mackintosh, global überproducer (who owns the stage rights). It is truer to the books than the film, based as it is on all the Poppins stories, not just the first book, reintroducing audiences to characters such as Robertson Ay and Neilius, the marble boy, both missing from the celluloid version.

There is something else at play here too - darkness amid the light, more than a hint of the supernatural, and Mary (played by Verity Hunt-Ballard) has some snap in her spine Travers would

approve of. She also approved of Mackintosh who, like Disney and so many others before him, came knocking on her candypink front door. "I was first exposed to P. L. Travers when I left school just over 40 years ago," he said in an interview to promote the musical. "I'd just left school and saw this wonderful film, which I saw was based on the books of Travers, so I got a few out, and it was nearly 30 years ago that I wrote my letters, as everyone in theatre did, to see if I could get the stage rights." Travers would make Mackintosh cool his heels for decades, finally agreeing to meet him in her Chelsea home in 1993. "I thought I was interviewing her, but she was interviewing me, completely vetting me, and after lots of questions she finally decided that I would be the one."

The production opened in London in 2004. The script was written by award-winning British writer, director and author Julian Fellowes, who has a very clear idea of what *Mary Poppins* is about, referring to it in a previous interview as "the Redemption of George Banks".

Brian Sibley, who knew Travers well, concurs. In a television special filmed last year, Sibley said: "*Mary Poppins* is totally about the Banks family and it says more about the parents than the children. Mr Banks is Goff, the promotion he should have had eludes him, and Mary comes to repair his life, to repair all of their lives."

Now she's coming to Queensland. After its sell-out run in Sydney, and with simultaneous performances in North America, the UK and Europe (about 7 million people have seen the show to date), Mary Poppins arrives at Brisbane's QPAC Theatre in December.

Schumacher says he and Mackintosh are excited to bring the production to Queensland, but he laughs when he recalls making what he calls "the big announcement". "So, when we know we're bringing *Poppins* to Australia, we do this live hook-up from Times Square to Melbourne, Cameron flies over from London to do it, and we announce to all these journalists and production people that this is it, that we're finally bringing the show back to where it all started.

"There was just this silence, the crickets were chirping, and Cameron and I look at each other and realise these people have no idea that P. L. Travers was Australian, that Mary belongs, in no small way, to them. But you know I think, or at

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least I like to think, she would be pleased that the story has come full circle, that *Mary Poppins* is coming home."

It's difficult to know if the mercurial Travers would be pleased. But looking at the astonished faces of the children watching the production around me - let's just say you will believe a woman can fly - perhaps it really doesn't matter who Mary Poppins was, or where she came from.


In my search for Mary, it seems only right to leave the last word to her creator, P. L. Travers, who, speaking about children's fears in the night, told the London *Observer* newspaper in 1966: "One of the best things that has ever been said about Mary is that there are very few books children can turn to, and one of these is *Mary Poppins*. That pleased me very much because it shows that perhaps this strong, dependable figure - whoever she is - can perhaps be relied on by a child."

The familiar sound of 'click" as the latch closed on the school gate was relived recently, as around 500 past & present students and staff and their family members stepped through the gates of the Allora State School on Saturday November 5th to celebrate "100 Years on Warwick Street", a century since the school was opened at the current site in 1911 after previously existing in Herbert Street.


Many months of preparation by organiser Robyn Draper was rewarded with lengthy line up of people who came to renew friendships, recall special school day memories, and pour through a treasure trove of school memorabilia. Former student Greg Patterson recalled fondly his school days within the grand timber buildings and sprawling school grounds, and the lifelong

### Looking Back... Allora's Past **Pioneer Woman**

In 1864 at the age of 22, Ellen Elizabeth Rowden married George Thomas Leney, a Royal Naval Crimean War veteran, in Paddington, London. Six months later they set sail on the long and rough journey to Australia. The voyage took six months and the meals consisted mainly of ships biscuits and salt meat. (Acceptable conditions for an ex-Royal Navy sailor but less so for a young London born woman)

On arrival in Queensland, George obtained work on the railway being built from Ipswich to Toowoomba. The Leney's lived in a tent and a camp oven was the only means of cooking. The couple's first child was born when the camp was in the vicinity of Laidley. The camp was later shifted to Toowoomba, the bullock wagon taking the route up the old "Toll Bar" road. Because of the state of the road, heavy items including Ellen's cabin trunk holding her lovely silk dresses and household linen, were off-loaded at the side of the road where they lay for six months before being recovered. The young couple and baby lived in the tent in Toowoomba with George continuing to work on the railway, returning home on week-ends. Ellen was terrified of snakes and the local aborigines.

After the birth of another child, the family moved to Headington Hill Station where George eventually attained the position



friendships bonded in those days of distant school yard memories. Greg was able to team up and relive those days from within the shadows of the Allora State School with former Year 10 class mates of 1967 Lindsav May, Marian Denny (nee Pitkin) & Tony Haig all still in the Allora area, Perry Pascoe attending from Toowoomba and Maree Guttosch (nee Shriek) travelling from Chicago, USA on the other side of the globe, at the Allora State School's "100 Years on Warwick Street Reunion".

Registration for past Allora State School students commenced

of overseer. The stone cottage that they lived in was a vast improvement on the tent. Five more children were born to Ellen and George while they were living at Headington Hill.

In 1879 George, Ellen and family moved to a 120 acre block of ground which was part of the Allora Exchange Lands to the south east of the town. Tragedy struck when a heavily pregnant Ellen had an accident when driving a wagon in the shift from Headington Hill to Allora, causing her to have a stillborn child.

The farm at Allora, which they called "Lipscomb", was built up from virgin soil. To make ends meet. George obtained

the job as a representative for a Brisbane machinery company. Ellen had the job of supervising the running of the farm. A busy time was during wheat threshing when she had to provide three good meals a day, plus morning and afternoon tea, for a team of 12 men plus hangerson

After rearing a family of ten children. George and Ellen retired to a new home, also called "Lipscomb", in Darling Street in Allora. George died in his 84th year and Ellen in her 88th year.

at 9.00 am, before the official opening by current school Principal Mr. Shaun Kanowski. The opening ceremony also included the cutting of a cake by the youngest student present, recent preschool enrolment Lewis May and 91 year Mrs. Marian Palmer of Noosa, the eldest former student present. Mrs. Betty Wiles read an extract from a book she has penned, on her days at the Allora State School from 1934 to 1943.

The result after months of planning "has made me very happy" said Mrs. Draper, "the concept for the reunion bred from a conversation between past pupils and their wish to get back in touch with their school". The event enjoyed great support, with people rolling in across the day, some having travelled significant distances. "It was wonderful to see so many past students from the 1930's, 1940's & 1950's" said Robyn, who has spent more than half her life at the Allora State School, firstly as a student and then a teacher from 1991.

Comparisons were made of "then & now", with the routine procedure of commencing class having changed somewhat to that in today's modern Warwick Street educational facility. Betty Wiles recalls "the big bell sounding at 9.15 am, fifteen minutes before school went in. This was so we could get ready to go into school. The same thing happened at big lunch when the big bell pounded loud and clear at 1.15 pm for us to get ready to march in to school at 1.30 pm. We always lined up and marched into school to music, usually with an older girl playing the piano and another playing the triangle". The method may have changed a from 1934 until 2011, but the students on finding their seats in any era are the beneficiaries of the high educational standards maintained over the 144 year history of the existence of an Allora State School.

Whether it was in the memorabilia room with a countless

beautifully manicured grounds or tucking into tea and scones in the modern catering building, the memories that at times drew a damp eye or laughter evident in all directions. ### Christmas Down Under on Palmerin, Warwick


Warwick Churches Together are again running the Christmas Down Under programme from Wednesday 14th to Saturday 17th December 2011 from 9.00am to 1.00pm.


